#### The B-G Board "Blog"

The 2012-13 school year proved very eventful for the Bainbridge-Guilford School District. Some of those events were routine; a new group of youngsters entered the school system in September, another group of students graduated in June, and a heck of a lot of both expected and unexpected things took place in the months in between.

The B-G administration and Board of Education held a number of public meetings in an effort to create the best budget possible, under less than ideal circumstances. It was difficult, to say the least, balancing the local needs created by a poor economy while addressing the financial realities coming out of Albany. We believe those meetings helped us to find that balance and were beneficial to both the board and the community.

After the budget vote, community members had the opportunity to participate in a survey. We genuinely appreciated all of the suggestions and feedback. In the last few months we have spent a good deal of time going over the survey results and, in an effort to cultivate open lines of communication with the B-G community, have decided to address some of the most frequently asked questions here in the *Blue & White*.

The most asked about item we found in the survey was the cost of transportation, so that is the issue we intend to tackle first.

As a school board, we rely on the research and the knowhow of two experts in this area: Ken Starr, Transportation Supervisor and Ken Wilcox, Assistant Superintendent for Business. At a recent Board meeting, Mr. Starr gave a presentation that detailed our District's options for buying buses. While we will not attempt to reproduce all of that information here, we will highlight the main points of Mr. Starr's presentation.

### MR. STARR'S PROPOSED FIVE-YEAR PURCHASE PLAN INCLUDED

- The price of a new bus
- The net state aid (89.5%)
- The cost to the District (10.5%)
- The average maintenance costs for five years
- The current trade in value of the 5-year old bus
- The estimated savings for B-G per bus

While some factors may change between now and 2018, the board is confident that the plan Mr. Starr recommended is our best option.

The reality of a rural, merged district is that our students spend a great deal of time on buses. Our primary concern, of course, is that our students are on the safest buses possible while they are being transported. As a bonus, Mr. Starr and Mr. Wilcox were able to create a plan, literally to the penny, that will actually be generating revenue for the District through the process of selling 5-year old buses as we replace them with new ones.

Community members who are interested in seeing the complete 20-page proposal are welcome to request a copy by contacting the District Office or visiting the District Website. A significant amount of time was invested in researching this plan and we are confident that even the most skeptical among us will be favorably impressed.

We will continue to submit articles to this newsletter as part of our effort to improve communications between the board and the community. As school curriculums change raising new challenges for teachers, students and the community alike, we believe the more correspondence the better.

B-G's motto is a tradition of excellence and we maintain that as our goal. We want B-G to reach its very best potential and believe that is only possible with an informed public and their participation.

### NEED A HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY DIPLOMA?

Call Afton Central School's Adult and Continuing Education Program at 607-639-2811 or 1-800-792-2145 for a *free* home study program. GRASP (Giving Ready Adults a Study Program) is available for people 21 years of age or older who cannot attend an adult continuing education class and who possess good reading skills. Students are tested to assess reading and math levels. Appropriate materials are sent to the student's home. The students work in the review books on their own, at their own pace and return completed assignments to the program every two weeks. Students must be motivated and able to work independently.

#### New BOCES Board Of Education President Elected



At the Reorganization Meeting of the Delaware-Chenango-Madison-Otsego BOCES (DCMO BOCES) Board of Education held Thursday, July 11, 2013 at the Support Services Center, Chenango Campus in Norwich, Margery Secrest was unanimously elected President. Margery Secrest was recently elected to a new three-year term as a member of the BOCES Board

of Education and was first elected to the Board in 2001.

A resident of Afton, Marge has been involved in education for many years, first as a teacher for 33 years teaching social studies and then English. She was an active participant in the Teachers' Association, retiring in 1983. In 1985, she began her board service as a member of the Afton Board of Education. Marge has served on the Afton Board since that time and has held the office of President since 1995. Marge has devoted her time to community efforts such as the Afton Planning Board spanning over three decades, the Indian Hills Girls Scout Council, the Chenango County Farm Bureau, serving as its Vice President since 2003, the church choir and other organizations.

Marge was selected as Outstanding School Board Member of the Year by the Chenango County School Boards Association in 1996, and presently serves as the BOCES representative on the Executive Board for the Association. In the Fall of 2009 Margery was honored as the Fifth recipient of the Marshman-Hall Commitment to Education Award.

#### NEW-NYS STAR Property Tax Relief

All New York homeowners receiving a <u>BASIC STAR</u> property tax exemption must register with the NYS Tax <u>Department in order to receive the STAR exemption in 2014 and subsequent years</u>. All BASIC Star recipients should receive registration instructions by mail. Visit the NYS tax website at <u>www.tax.ny.gov</u> to register. The registration deadline is December 31, 2013.

Senior citizens receiving ENHANCED STAR benefits are not affected by the new registration requirement. In order to continue to receive ENHANCED STAR, Seniors must continue to apply annually or participate in the Income Verification Program.

#### Jr.-Sr. HS Attendance Procedure

# ATTENTION PARENTS/GUARDIANS OF JR.-SR. HIGH SCHOOLERS: PLEASE POST THIS NUMBER: 967-6368

- This number should be called as early in the morning as possible on the day your child will be absent or tardy. It should be called each and every day that your child will be absent or tardy. Policy states it is the parent/guardian responsibility to make the calls. There is an answering machine, so you may call at any time, day or night. If the parent/guardian does not call in for the student, an attempt will be made to contact the parent/guardian.
- Parents/guardians are arriving unannounced at the Jr.-Sr. High School to pick up their child(ren). Policy states that students should present a note to the Main Office first thing on the morning of the day that they will be leaving. It is very difficult to have your child ready for pick-up without knowing ahead of time. If you find you need to take your child for a last minute appointment, you should call the number listed above and come in to sign your child out for the appointment.
- Notes to be excused during the school day should be presented to the Attendance Office in the High School Main Office in the morning when the student first enters the building. Notes not received first thing in the morning will be subject to verification. Students needing to be excused during the day but who have not brought in a note should have the parent/guardian call the Attendance Office at 967-6368. The parent/guardian will need to either fax a note or personally come in to pick up the student.
- A student who will be going on an extended absence—whether it be excused or unexcused—should complete
  an Extended Absence Form available in the Attendance
  Office. Some examples would be: horse shows, family
  vacation, 4H conference.
- The nurse will continue to assess ill students and call the parent/guardian if the student needs to go home. The parent/guardian will either come for the student or designate a person to pick up the student. Parents should discourage their children from calling to leave school without first seeing the nurse for assessment.



#### **Request for Pesticide Application Notice**

October 2013

Dear Parent, Guardian, and School Staff,

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are <u>not</u> subject to prior notification requirements:

- ♦ A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hour following an application;
- ◆ Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- ♦ Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- ♦ The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- ◆ The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- ♦ The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School will not allow the use of any pesticides that require notification unless an emergency exists. In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

If you would like to receive 48-hour prior notification of pesticide applications that are scheduled to occur in your school, please complete the form below and return it to the school. It was decided that the purchase of two bugles would be a very fitting tribute to Teddy, who played trumpet in the Greenlawn

Elementary Band.

The two beautiful silver-plated bugles made their debut at the Memorial Day services in Guilford and Bainbridge last May. One of the bugles was also played at a military funeral the following month. #### **Lunch With Music At Greenlawn**

On Monday, October 7 Greenlawn Elementary School will be implementing a *Silent Lunch* program. On the first Monday of each month, a musician or group of musicians will be playing their instrument(s) for our students during their lunch period. The idea is to take this opportunity to introduce them to many different instruments and music styles.

A lunchroom can be a very noisy place. Some studies have shown that the decibel level can reach the same level as a lawnmower. This Silent Lunch program creates an opportunity for our students to turn off their voices and open their ears and minds through musical performances. The students are expected to be silent during the performance. The musicians will play for the children while they eat their lunches.

# **Choose MyPlate**



#### 10 tips to a great plate

Making food choices for a healthy lifestyle can be as simple as using these 10 Tips.

Use the ideas in this list to balance your calories, to choose foods to eat more often, and to cut back on foods to eat less often.

balance calories

Find out how many calories YOU need for a day as a first step in managing your weight. Go to www.Choose MyPlate.gov to find your calorie level. Being physically active also helps you balance calories.

njoy your food, but eat less

Take the time to fully enjoy your food as you eat it. Eating too fast or when your attention is elsewhere may lead to eating too many calories. Pay attention to hunger and fullness cues before, during, and after meals. Use them to recognize when to eat and when you've had enough.

avoid oversized portions

Use a smaller plate, bowl, and glass. Portion out foods before you eat. When eating out, choose a smaller size option, share a dish, or take home part of your meal.

foods to eat more often

Eat more vegetables, fruits, whole grains, and fat-free or 1% milk and dairy products. These foods have the nutrients you need for health—including potassium, calcium, vitamin D, and fiber. Make them the basis for meals and snacks.

**5** make half your plate fruits and vegetables
Choose red, orange, and dark-green vegetables like tomatoes, sweet potatoes, and broccoli, along with other vegetables for your meals. Add fruit to meals as part of main or side dishes or as dessert.

switch to fat-free or low-fat (1%) milk
They have the same amount of calcium and other essential nutrients as whole milk, but fewer calories and

make half your grains whole grains

To eat more whole grains, substitute a whole-grain product for a refined product—such as eating whole-wheat bread instead of white bread or brown rice instead of white rice.

nods to eat less often

Cut back on foods high in solid fats, added sugars, and salt. They include cakes, cookies, ice cream, candies, sweetened drinks, pizza, and fatty meats like ribs, sausages, bacon, and hot dogs. Use these foods as occasional treats, not everyday foods.

compare sodium in foods

Use the Nutrition Facts label to choose lower sodium versions of foods like soup, bread, and frozen meals. Select canned foods labeled "low sodium," "reduced sodium," or "no salt added."

drink water instead of sugary drinks
Cut calories by drinking water or unsweetened beverages. Soda, energy drinks, and sports drinks are a major source of added sugar, and calories, in American diets.
