#### Superintendent's Message

The winter season and the holidays are just around the corner. The staff and students at B-G are working hard on our annual food drive and turkey drive. It is important to recognize that not all of our friends and neighbors always have enough food on their tables. If you are interested in contributing to this cause please call the school.

On Thursday, November 9 we recognized and celebrated our local veterans. A hearty breakfast was served at Greenlawn Elementary school consisting of pancakes, bacon, eggs, hash browns, fruit and turnovers to our 51 veterans. Each veteran also left with a gift bag full of cookies. This is one of the most important and special events we do during the year as a district. This has become an annual tradition at B-G and we look forward to welcoming even more veterans next year.

Recently the district's auditing firm, Raymond Preusser, CPA, P.C., conducted an audit of the financial statements, governmental activities, each major fund and the fiduciary funds of the district. The auditing firm feels that the financial statements referred to present fairly, in all material aspects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the fiduciary fund information of the B-G District. The audit produced no deficiencies in internal controls or noncompliance issues. This is great news for the district and a big thank you to our business office staff.

With the change of the seasons comes the change in sports seasons. We at B-G are proud of all of our fall athletes. Every sports team had successful campaigns with each varsity team moving on to sectional play. Our Girls' Varsity Volleyball team was crowned Section IV champions and then went on to win the New York State Class D Volleyball State Championship! Congratulations to coach Tami Selfridge and an outstanding group of young ladies. B-G will also welcome back indoor track for the first time in many years. We currently have 30 students signed up for the team!

Our technology team, led by Scott Graham, continues to navigate through the process of utilizing the Smart Bonds money our district was awarded. B-G will receive over one million dollars. However, to receive this funding the district has to update our technology plan, create a spending plan, upgrade the district's infrastructure, hold public hearings and gain BOE approval. After all of this, we submit our plan to the state on December 8 and wait around 8-10 months for approval. This is a lengthy process but well worth it as we continue to move in the direction of a 1:1 device initiative.

We have hired licensed forester Mike Gray who has begun the process of surveying the district's land on Searles Hill. The school district owns about 40 acres of timbered land and will be looking to Mike to guide us through the process of having the timber harvested and sold. Once the timber has been sold the district will move forward with a forestry plan to manage the upkeep and sustainability of the property. We will utilize district staff and students to assist in this process. As this land was a gift to the school it can never be sold.

Our afterschool childcare is up and running. The ASCP operates from 3:00-5:30 p.m. each day that school is in session. The students are able to work on school work, while also having time on the playground and structured play time. A snack is also provided to each student. The district is hoping to have above 30 students attending the program each day in order to sustain the program. We currently have about 20 students participating. We will continue to offer this service to our families and students until the end of the first semester. However, if our enrollment doesn't increase we might have to postpone the program until next fall. The program is open to students in grades preK-6.

The students have completed the first 10 weeks of the school year and we march on to the second quarter. Our first year working with Lourdes Hospital is going very well. Lourdes is our medical provider and also provides mental health services, athletic trainer services and substitute nurses as needed. We look forward to continuing this relationship in the future. #### **Alumni Spotlight**

#### **BRUCE WINSOR, ALUMNI, 1973**



As a student, Bruce Winsor was a threesport athlete and served as Senior Class President. He graduated from Bainbridge-Guilford Central School in 1973.

Bruce is a lifelong resident of Guilford. He and his wife, JoAnn, live in the house he grew up in where they raised their daughters, Rae and Kacie and many four legged family members. Give or take a few, he has

lived over 60 years in the Town of Guilford, as did his parents and grandparents before him.

Bruce had several types of jobs during his active working career, as a driver at Victory Markets with his father, then in the fuel industry as HVAC technician and dispatcher for Mirabito Fuel Group, and as a sales representative



for Agway Energy Products. He earned an Associate's Degree in Criminal Justice from Mohawk Valley College and worked for the Chenango County Sheriff's Office, serving in different capacities, including his role as an integral member of the Transition Team when the new correctional facility was built in 2006. Bruce retired from his position as Training/Correction Officer at the Chenango County Sheriff's Department in 2016. He was elected as Guilford Town Justice in 2017.

As was the case when Bruce was in school, he has been very active and involved in Guilford, the District and the outlying community in a variety of ways, over many years. As a young adult, he participated on several sports teams throughout Chenango County. His public and community service included 20 years on the Guilford Town Board, five years on the Bainbridge-Guilford School Board of Education, a member of and former chief for the Guilford Fire Department, coach for elementary wrestling and girls' softball programs, member of the Bainbridge Lions Club and the Norwich Rotary Club, volunteer for the Chenango United Way and committee volunteer for the ACS Chenango County Relay for Life. In 2004, Bruce was named Guilford Citizen of the Year, and regarding that award he said, "I was deeply honored to receive it; it meant a lot to me at the time and I remember it every year at Memorial Day . . . I am grateful to join the others who have been recognized before and after me." He has volunteered his expertise in HVAC services to the Guilford Klee House in the past, and more recently to his church.

If you ask Bruce what some of his fondest memories are of his time as a student at B-G, he would say, "The friendships I formed with my classmates, and the relationships with the teachers, coaches and staff are what I remember well." Those relationships formed the basis for his decision to remain in the District to live, work and raise a family.

Please encourage your child to do their very best on the State exams. Student scores are used to determine interventions and who may be recommended for accelerated classes. When we receive the results of these exams, reports will be sent home specific to your son/daughter's performance.

The testing window is much smaller this year, and it is very important to not schedule routine appointments for your child on the above scheduled testing dates.

#### **School Cancellation/Early Dismissal**

Prior to the beginning of the school day, in instances of school cancellation, parents and students will be notified by local radio and television stations, and the automated notification system. These same media sources will be used in situations where school will be dismissed early. Since phone lines must be kept open during emergencies, parents of Elementary students should expect their child to follow their family emergency plan. If no one is available at the intended destination, the student will be returned to either Guilford or Greenlawn.

#### **Family Emergency Plans**

At the beginning of the school year, parents will be asked to notify the school where their child should go in the event that a decision to close school early is made. During severe weather, it is suggested that parents have their mobile phones available or stay tuned to any of the radio stations listed below for release information.

#### LOCAL MEDIA BROADCASTING EMERGENCY CLOSING INFORMATION

#### A Message from the Jr.-Sr. High School Principal

With the recent tragedies in Las Vegas, New York City and Texas, my message is a review of Student and Staff Safety at Bainbridge-Guilford. To make sure we are prepared for emergencies, each building in our district will practice a number of Emergency Response Procedures (Drills) to make sure our students and staff are well prepared in the event we have a real incident. The practice of some of these drills are mandated by educational law, however a number of them are not required but deemed important by us to be prepared. Over the course of each school year, we will be practicing the following drills:

Shelter-In-Place—This procedure is used to shelter students and staff inside the building. An example of when this would be used is when bad weather is about to happen with damaging winds.

Hold-In-Place—This procedure is used to limit movement of students and staff while dealing with short term emergencies. An example of the need for this procedure would be when a student or staff member becomes ill or injured and needs ambulatory care to be taken to a medical facility.

Evacuation—This procedure is used to evacuate students and staff from the building. An often used example or another term for this is a "Fire Drill."

Lockout—This procedure is used to secure school buildings and grounds during incidents that pose an imminent concern outside of the school. An unusual example of this would be the sighting of a rabid or dangerous animal near school grounds.

Lockdown—This procedure is used to secure school buildings and grounds during incidents that pose an immediate threat of violence in or around school. Unfortunately the highlighted example in today's society is an "active shooter".

Early Dismissal—This procedure is when students are dismissed from school early. This typically occurs due to poor weather in which we try to get students and staff home before roads get bad. This is practiced in October by all schools in our BOCES to prepare families by having them arrange for coverage regarding student pick-up or drop off.

Site Evacuation—This procedure would occur when we need to leave one of our buildings. Our plan is to go to another location nearby that is both safe and able to house all our students and staff.

Again, we at B-G will annually practice all of these drills to prepare our students and staff in efforts to keep us all safe. We also want you to know that both local and state law enforcement are taking very active rolls in assisting us, training us and educating our administrators, staff and students in emergency response protocol. To help our efforts please make sure that we get emergency contact information from you as well as updated changes when they occur. Additionally, any custody agreements or changes to agreements need to be given to us when they occur. Finally, in the event of an emergency or drill please refrain from calling or texting your child or calling the school as this act could adversely affect your child, our staff and our communities safety. We will make every effort to disseminate necessary information via our website, phone calls or social media to inform parents/ guardians of situations that arise or protocols to follow.

#### January Regents Exam Notification

The January Regents examinations will be given at the Jr.-Sr. High School January 22-25.

Only High School BOCES students and High School students' grades 9 through 12 who are scheduled for Regents exams or local final exams need to report to school. Buses will run on the normal schedule. 7th and 8th grade students will not attend school this week.

BOCES classes will continue as usual for the entire week—BOCES students are encouraged to attend their classes, however please note there will NOT be a noon bus running to take students home.

In case of a delayed opening all tests (regents and local) will be given. Regent's exam students must be present by 10:00 a.m. to take their test. In the event of a snow day during Regents week, Regents exams for that day will not be given and local tests will be given on the following Monday.

#### Seven Teams to Participate in Odyssey of the Mind

The Odyssey of the Mind Program is in up and running at Bainbridge-Guilford for the 2017-18 season. Odyssey of the Mind is a creative problem solving competition. This after-school program is offered to interested students at the Greenlawn Elementary School and at the Junior-Senior High School. Once again, seven teams have formed and are preparing for the competition. The teams selected their problems and started the task of creating their solutions. Their goal is to be ready for the Regional Competition, which will be held on February 17, 2018 at the DCMO BOCES Campus in Trout Creek. This is an all day event and we would welcome you to come out and support the teams. Teams finishing in first place in their problem and division will go on to the State Finals on April 7, 2018 at SUNY Binghamton.

The Odyssey program divides teams into different divisions based on the ages of team members. Division I is open to students in grades K-5 and is a competitive division.

Our first Division I team has selected Problem 1— *Triathlon Travels*. In this problem, teams will ride and drive original vehicles in an Odyssey-style triathlon. They will try to score in *curling*, hit the right targets when *jousting* and *run track* by navigating a course in two directions. Between these events, the team will entertain the audience and the vehicle will change appearance. All of the action will take place in a team-created performance that features the vehicles' triathlon travels, a commentator and a coach. Team members include **Aiden Vermilyea**, **Owen Fleming**, **Anthony Pfaff**, **Jayden Ingham**, **Blake Tuttel**, **Clare Sullivan** and **Kayleigh Northrup.** Mrs. Melly and Mrs. Fleming are the coaches for this team.

Our next Division I team will be tackling Problem 3— *Classics... Mockumentary! Seriously?* In this problem, characters don't always agree as they recount the classic story where they appeared. The team will select a classic from the list and present different characters in a humorous documentary-style performance where details are added, denied, exaggerated and disputed. There will be interviews, behind-the-scenes clips and voice-overs that take the audience through the story and help present the events as they *really* took place. Team members include **Kaydence Brimmer, Mariah Miller, Kyle Patton, Roxy Megale, Cyrus Megale** and **Breona Ramsey-Bodell**. The coaches for this team are Mrs. Roach and Mrs. L. Miller.

Our next Division I team has selected Problem 5–A Stellar Hangout. In the outreaches of the universe, there is an Intergalactic Hangout where all sorts of creatures from different worlds stop, eat, refuel and relax. Teams will create a humorous performance centered on this science fiction hangout that includes original creatures, food, and a search for space treasure. There will also be a worker character, entertainment and a futuristic map at the hangout. #### **Guilford Open House-Wild West Style!**




#### **The Great Pumpkin Weight Contest!**

#### Flu Information



## **The Flu:** A Guide for Parents



Influenza (also known as flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. Flu is different from a cold, and usually comes on suddenly. Each year flu viruses cause millions of illnesses, hundreds of thousands of hospital stays and thousands or tens of thousands of deaths in the United States.

Flu can be very dangerous for children. CDC estimates that since 2010, between 7,000 and 26,000 children younger than 5 years have been hospitalized each year in the United States because of influenza. The flu vaccine is safe and helps protect children from flu.

#### What parents should know

#### How serious is flu?

While flu illness can vary from mild to severe, children often need medical care because of flu. Children younger than 5 years and children of any age with certain long-term health problems are at high risk of flu complications like pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus and ear infections. Some health problems that are known to make children more vulnerable to flu include asthma, diabetes and disorders of the brain or nervous system.

#### How does flu spread?

Flu viruses are thought to spread mainly by droplets made when someone with flu coughs, sneezes or talks. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. A person also can get flu by touching something that has flu virus on it and then touching their mouth, eyes, or nose.

What are flu symptoms?

Flu symptoms can include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills, feeling tired and sometimes vomiting and diarrhea (more common in children than adults). Some people with the flu will not have a fever.



#### **Protect your child**

How can I protect my child from flu? The first and best way to protect against flu is to get a yearly flu vaccine for yourself and your child.

- Flu vaccination is recommended for everyone 6 months and older every year.
- It's especially important that young children and children with certain long-term health problems get vaccinated.
- Caregivers of children at high risk of flu complications should get a flu vaccine. (Babies younger than 6 months are at high risk for serious flu complications, but too young to get a flu vaccine.)
- Pregnant women should get a flu vaccine to protect to protect themselves and their baby from flu. Research shows that flu vaccination protects the baby from flu for several months after birth.
- Flu viruses are constantly changing and so flu vaccines are updated often to protect against the flu viruses that research indicates are most likely to cause illness during the upcoming flu season.

#### Is flu vaccine safe?

Flu vaccines are made using strict safety and production measures. Millions of people have safely received flu vaccines for decades. Common side effects from the flu shot are soreness where the shot is given, headaches, muscle aches, and fever. These side effects are generally mild and go away on their own within a few days. A flu vaccine cannot cause flu illness. CDC and the American Academy of Pediatrics recommend an annual flu vaccine for all children 6 months and older.

#### What are the benefits of getting a flu vaccine?

- A flu vaccine can keep you and your child from getting sick. When vaccine viruses and circulating viruses are matched, flu vaccination has been shown to reduce the risk of getting sick with flu by about half.
- Flu vaccines can keep your child from being hospitalized from flu. One recent study showed that flu vaccine reduced children's risk of flu-related pediatric intensive care unit admission by 74%.

- Flu vaccine can prevent your child from dying from flu. A study using data from recent flu seasons found that flu vaccine reduced the risk of flu-associated death by half among children with high risk medical conditions and by nearly two-thirds among children without medical conditions.
- Flu vaccination also may make your illness milder if you do get sick.
- Getting yourself and your child vaccinated also can protect others who may be more vulnerable to serious flu illness, like babies and young children, older people, and people with certain long-term health problems.

## What are some other ways I can protect my child against flu?

In addition to getting a flu vaccine, you and your child should take everyday actions to help prevent the spread of germs.

Stay away from people who are sick as much as possible to keep from getting sick yourself. If you or your child are sick, avoid others as much as possible to keep from infecting them. Also, remember to regularly cover your coughs and sneezes, wash your hands often, avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth, and clean surfaces that may be contaminated with flu viruses. These everyday actions can help reduce your chances of getting sick and prevent the spread of germs to others if you are sick. However, a yearly flu vaccine is the best way to prevent flu illness

### If your child is sick

#### What can I do if my child gets sick?

## Talk to your doctor early if you are worried about your child's illness.

Make sure your child gets plenty of rest and drinks enough fluids. If your child is 5 years and older without long-term health problems and gets flu symptoms, including a fever and/or cough, consult your doctor as needed.

Children younger than 5 years of age – especially those younger than 2 years – and children with certain long-term health problems (including asthma, diabetes and disorders of the brain or nervous system), are at high risk of serious flu-related complications. Call your doctor or take your child to the doctor right away if they develop flu symptoms.

#### What if my child seems very sick?

Even healthy children can get very sick from flu. If your child is experiencing the following emergency warning signs you should go to the emergency room:

- Emergency warning signs of flu:
- Fast breathing or trouble breathing
- Bluish or gray skin color

- Not drinking enough fluids (not going to the bathroom or not making as much urine as they normally do)
- Severe or persistent vomiting
- Not waking up or not interacting
- Being so irritable that the child does not want to be held
- Flu symptoms improve, but then return with fever and worse cough
- Fever with rash

#### Is there a medicine to treat flu?

Yes. Antiviral drugs are prescription medicines that can be used to treat flu illness. They can shorten your illness and make it milder and they can prevent serious complications that could result in a hospital stay. Antivirals work best when started during the first 2 days of illness. Antiviral drugs are recommended to treat flu in people who are very sick (for example, people who are in the hospital) or people who are at high risk of serious flu complications. Antivirals can be given to children and pregnant women.

## How long can a sick person spread flu to others?

People with flu may be able to infect others from 1 day before getting sick to up to 5 to 7 days after. Severely ill people or young children may be able to spread the flu longer, especially if they still have symptoms.

#### Can my child go to school, day care, or camp if

he or she is sick?

No. Your child should stay home to rest and to avoid giving the flu to other children or caregivers.

## When can my child go back to school after having the flu?

Keep your child home from school, day care, or camp for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone. (The fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.) A fever is defined as 100°F (37.8°C) or higher.
