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Superintendent's Message

Happy winter! We have moved beyond the half-way point of the school year! I cannot believe how fast this year seems to be going. So many great things are happening at B-G!

First, I would like to start by congratulating the following students for their induction into the National Technical Honor Society: Rebeca Kramer, Camille Hawkins, Sean Jones, Scott Gabriel, Zoe DePew, Hunter Richter, Lindsey Barnhart, Rebecca Reyes, Owen Lambrecht and Daria Kozak. Hats off to an outstanding group of students. We are very proud of you and your accomplishments.

Also congratulations to our Varsity Girls' Basketball team for winning the Kazalski Basketball Tournament held here on December 28 and 29 and our wrestling team won the Windsor Christmas Tournament for the second year in a row out of 39 teams!

We seem to be having an increase in the number of cars passing stopped school busses. Please remember it is illegal to pass a stopped school bus on either side with their lights flashing! Violators will be prosecuted. We have had several close calls this year with cars illegally passing our busses and students nearly being struck.

While the winter season brings an increase in child sickness it is important to reinforce the importance of good attendance with your child. Student attendance is one of the factors that has an effect on school state aid. Currently our student attendance rate for Guilford is 91.8%, Greenlawn 94.6% and the MS/HS 93.9%. We would like to get each of our buildings at or over the 95% attendance rate.

We are continuing to work on and develop expanded learning opportunities for our B-G students. In the coming months we will be meeting with the Raymond Corporation in Greene to discuss how we might work together and what career

pathways we might develop. Could this be developing a student welding program on campus or internships for our students at Raymond? These are just some of the exciting conversation we are and will be having. We also working on starting an FFA program at the Jr.-Sr. High School.

The District continues to forge ahead with our proposed capital project. Please look for a more in depth article inside this issue of *The Blue and White*. We will be offering many opportunities for community questions and input.

Capital Project Update!

As many of you have heard the Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is embarking on a proposed Capital Project of \$16.5 million dollars. The last project the Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District put out to voters was in 1999 and like people's homes, the District facilities should be updated on a regular basis.

The scope and magnitude of this project has come about based on a required Building Condition Survey. All school districts are required to have this survey completed every five years. The survey informs the District of items that currently need attention or will need attention in the near future. The items are prioritized based on need and concern. Currently all three school buildings and the transportation facility will be affected. These structures are in need of fairly substantial renovations to become ADA compliant, to maintain a safer environment for our students and staff and to address failing systems. The District has hired the architectural firm of King and King and the Construction Management firm of LeChase Construction both from Syracuse, to help direct this project.

FOLLOWING ARE SOME HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PROJECT FOR EACH BUILDING:

JR.-SR. HIGH SCHOOL

- Exterior door replacements as well as masonry restoration to protect the envelope of the building.
- Building-wide roof replacement
- Interior renovations including a fitness facility for student and community use, new lockers, upgraded heating systems, interior door replacement, air-conditioning on second floor and in gymnasiums, shower renovations in locker rooms, new fire alarm system and master clock system
- Main entrance and perimeter sidewalk renovations for ADA compliance
- Drainage improvements around the perimeter of the building
- Replacement of hot and cold water piping

GREENLAWN ELEMENTARY

- Exterior door replacements as well as masonry restoration to protect the envelope of the building.
- Building-wide roof replacement
- Playground improvements
- Interior renovations including upgraded heating systems, interior door replacement, air-conditioning in cafetorium, new fire alarm system and master clock system, and water service upgrade

GUILFORD ELEMENTARY

- Exterior door replacements as well as masonry restoration to protect the envelope of the building.
- · Building-wide roof replacement

- Interior renovations to include interior door replacement, upgraded heating system, new fire alarm and master clock system, and an area of rescue on the second floor
- Replace fuel tank monitoring system
- Playground improvements
- Main entrance and perimeter sidewalk renovations for ADA compliance

JR.-SR. ANNEX

- Exterior door replacements as well as masonry restoration to protect the envelope of the building.
- Replace stairs to the athletic field and north parking lot improvements
- Interior renovations to include interior door replacement, upgraded heating system and new fire alarm and master clock system

BUS GARAGE

• New fire alarm system and master clock system

In the coming months I will be presenting to many community groups in each of the Bainbridge and Guilford communities to better communicate the information surrounding the Capital Project. We will also be offering residents two evening information sessions and building tours. The first information night for the community will be held on February 15, in the Jr-Sr High School building at 7:00 p.m. in the Auditorium. Our second information night will be on March 14, in the Guilford Elementary School Cafeteria at 7:00 p.m. Please look on the school website at www.bgcsd. org and our new Facebook page for up-to-date project info.

District residents will have the opportunity to vote on the \$16.5 million dollar project on March 22. Voting will take place from noon to 9:00 p.m. at the Greenlawn Elementary School in Bainbridge and at the Guilford Town Hall in Guilford.

The district has invested many months in putting this project together to present to our voters to address the most important items relative to student safety and maintaining our facilities. B-G Accepting Pre-K Applications

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is accepting applications for its Pre-kindergarten program. Only parents who are district residents with an age-eligible child may apply. To be eligible a child must be four years old prior to December 1, 2017 and cannot be five years old before that date. Applications must be received by 4:00 p.m. Friday, April 21, 2017 to be considered for selection. Selection of applicants for the available slots will be determined soon after this date.

Per New York State Regulations, selection for Prekindergarten slots for the 2017-18 school year will be done randomly after all applications have been received by the deadline if more than 36 applications are received. Assuming that State funding will be held at the same level for next year as last year, we will be able to accept a total of 36 students.

Similar to last year, our program will include two full day classes. Both classes are housed in the Guilford Elementary School. Each classroom has a Pre-K teacher and a classroom aide. Our program runs Monday-Friday from 8:05 a.m.-2:30 p.m. Children may not ride school transportation until they become four years old. Parents are responsible for transportation to and from school until their child becomes four years old.

The deadline for all Pre-K applications is Friday, April 21, 2017 at 4:00 p.m. Applications must be received at the main office of the Guilford Elementary School on or before this date. Applications may be picked up at Guilford Elementary or mailed to you upon request. For further information contact the Guilford Elementary School secretary, Kathi Ives at 895-6700.

Requests for special education services for home schooled students must be received by the District Office **no later than June 1** preceding the beginning of the next school year. The Board of Education will take official action on the requests at the first Board of Education meeting in June.

Alumni Spotlight!

FRANK DOOLITTLE





Frank Doolittle grew up on a family farm on Lyons Road outside of the Village of Bainbridge. He graduated from Bainbridge in 1933. He was actually a member of the Class of 1932, but was one of the students who was quarantined for the 1931-32 school year. Those students were determined to be carriers of diphtheria and they spent the year in what Frank fondly calls The Bug House, which was a building adjacent to the school. He has often commented that he never understood why they were quarantined at school and nowhere else! Frank also says that the main thing he remembers learning that year was how to play checkers.

A typical day in Frank's school-age life meant getting up early to do chores, then driving a team of horses pulling what was called a little lumber wagon that carried the milks cans from the farm to town. After delivering the milk to the creamery he would take the team to the livery, which was located in the area behind the current Fire House, go to school and then come back and get the horses and wagon and drive it home to help with the evening chores. There was little time to participate in after school activities, although he did participate in a boxing and wrestling group, which put on exhibitions in the school auditorium. In 1938 he married Wilma Gustafson, who graduated from Bainbridge in 1936, and they celebrated 68 years of marriage before her passing in 2006.

Frank owned the Trico Lumber and Handle Factory for many years and finished his working years with Texgas Petroleum before retiring in 1978. Frank still lives at home doing his exercises every day, following the Mets and the Yankees and viewing his *older* television programs. At 103 years of age we salute Frank Doolittle, one of our oldest Bainbridge-Guilford alumnus!

VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

A person shall be entitled to vote on the appointed date for the election of school district officials, and upon all other matters which may be in the form of a referendum, who is:

- A citizen of the United States.
- Eighteen years of age.
- A resident within the district for a period of thirty (30) days next preceding the meeting at which he/she offers to vote.

No person shall be determined ineligible to vote by reason of race, creed, color or sex, who has other qualifications in this section.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Personal registration of Voters is required for the annual vote. Registration will be held on May 9, 2017 from 2:00-7:00 p.m. at the Greenlawn Elementary School and the Guilford Town Hall. Voters may also register with the District Clerk.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Applications for absentee ballots are available at the District Office. Applicants must submit application to the District Clerk seven days before the election date if the ballot is to be mailed. Absentee ballots must be received by 5:00 p.m. on the day of the vote.

The District Office is located in the Jr.-Sr. High School. Office hours are 7:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m.





High School Student Council Leads Annual Food Drive

Support from the school and community was overwhelming! More than 95 families received more than material support but also a sense of hope and community spirit as they entered the New Year of 2017.

Planning for the drive began in the early fall. The plan for the high school was shared with the elementary and junior high student councils who also supported the drive in their own unique ways. The National Honor Society donated stuffing as well as coordinating the packaging of homemade cookies for each family.

At Greenlawn, 2,264 non-perishable food items were collected well exceeding the goal of 1,800. The class that collected the most items was treated to a private ice cream social. The PTO funded popcorn and a movie for all students!

At the junior and senior high school incentives were offered to encourage support of the drive. At the High School, a very lofty goal of 2,200 cans was set. Senior National Honor Society News

The members of the B-G Senior National Honor Society are chosen based on their superior academic record, their service to school and community, their leadership qualities and their upstanding character. Once a member of this organization, the students are urged to continue to serve as good leaders and to encourage others to do the same.

New members will be inducted into the B-G Senior National Honor Society on March 30. To be eligible for induction the following criteria applies:

- 1. Juniors and seniors with a cumulative average of 90.00 or higher are eligible. The average must be a *pure* 90, not a rounded 90. Students must have passed, unless legally exempted, the following courses and their accompanying Regents exams:
 - English 9 And 10
 - · Global Studies
 - Spanish 1 And Spanish 2
 - 2 Regents Sciences
 - 1 Regents Math Plus One Additional Math Course
- 2. Honor Society induction is held once a year in the spring after 1st semester grades are finalized.
- 3. Eligible students are asked to fill out and return by a specified date a Student Activities Information Form (SAIF) detailing their extracurricular school and community activities. This documentation will provide the faculty and selection committee with information to assess the Service, Leadership and Character criteria for Honor Society membership. If there are any extenuating circumstances that impact a student's participation in such activities, these should be noted on this sheet. The SAIF forms will be returned to the Honor Society Advisor. Failure to return the SAIF will indicate that the student does not wish to be considered for induction.
- 4. Brief interviews are then scheduled (generally 11th period, lunch or immediately after school) so that each eligible student has a chance to meet with the Faculty Selection Committee to summarize and discuss his or her activity sheet in light of the four criteria for Honor Society induction. Failure to meet with the committee will indicate that the student does not want to be considered for induction.
- 5. Summaries of the activity sheets will be presented by the Honor Society Advisor to the high school teachers, after which the faculty will rate each student on a scale of 1-5 in the categories of Leadership, Service, and Character. The faculty ratings will be collected and tabulated as input for the Honor Society Committee.
- 6. The Honor Society Faculty Selection Committee will average the ratings for each student in each category,

- after dropping one lowest score and one highest score in each category. Each average will be rounded to two places (example: 3.95). These ratings provide input to the Faculty Committee in its deliberations.
- 7. At this point the Faculty Committee votes on the student's selection. A student needs an average of 4.00 in each category to be voted on by the faculty committee. The only exception is if a student falls below the necessary average in any one category but his or her overall average still meets the required 4.00 level, a candidate may still be voted upon after discussion and with assent of the Faculty Committee. For this to occur, however, the candidate's OVERALL average of the three categories MUST STILL MEET THE REOUIRED 4.00.
- All candidates under consideration will be notified in person by a member of the Faculty Selection Committee regarding that committee's final decision.
- 9. After induction, members are expected to maintain a 90 average or higher. A member whose cumulative average has fallen below 90 after a ten-week marking period will be notified by the Faculty Selection Committee and will be requested to meet with them to determine ramifications.
- After induction, all members are expected to remain true to the NHS ideals of Scholarship, Leadership, Service and Character.

This year's Senior National Honor Society has been busy trying to live up to these ideals. A Red Cross Blood Drive was held in November where 42 pints of blood were collected. Another drive was held on January 6, adding 26 pints. There will be an additional Red Cross Blood Drive on Tuesday, March 7.

The Honor Society sponsored a Hat Day with the proceeds going to buy boxes of stuffing and containers for cookies to be put in the holiday baskets that were delivered to area families by the Student Council. Senior Honor Society members, with much appreciated help from Home and Careers classes, Yes! Leads members, and faculty and staff members, baked over 110 dozen cookies to add a little homemade holiday cheer to the baskets.

A new halftime activity is available at home basketball games, courtesy of the Honor Society members. For a donation of \$1, interested spectators can try to sink a half court shot. If they make it, they receive Honors Bucks to spend at the concession stand—as well as bragging rights! The money raised will help offset the money spent to help purchase the new bobcat mascot costume. Be on the lookout for Felix the Bobcat at upcoming events. Additional activities are being planned for the remainder of the school year.



State Testing at the Jr.-Sr. High School

January Regents Exams are now complete. Unlike most schools in New York State many of our students take Regents Exams in January as their class ending assessment. Most schools have traditional schedules where students' classes meet all year with their exams in June. Those schools primarily use January Regents Exams for students needing to retake exams. At B-G, we utilize a combination of semestered classes (courses done in half a year) along with yearlong classes. We have elected to use a hybrid schedule to maximize our staff and reduce the number of classes students focus on at one time. Our Sr. High students are able to take up to 10 credits per year and in the same schedule only have five classes to concentrate on at a time. Additionally, semestered classes mimic the course structure used in college.

Among the five required Regents Exams, English and U.S. History are the two in which many of our juniors complete in January. These two major Regents Exams are also offered in June where our students may additionally take Math and Science Regents Exams. We also offer retake exams at January. At the Jr. High level, the exams that equate to the Regents Exams are the New York State Assessments. These assessments are taken in English Language Arts (ELA) and Math in both 7th and 8th grades as well as the Science New York State Assessment taken in 8th grade. This year the ELA Assessments will be administered in March and the Math Assessments will be administered in May. The 8th Grade Science Assessment is administered in June.

Though these culminating exams have been scrutinized, their purpose is to assure that the same curriculum is being delivered by all schools across New York State and our students are held accountable to demonstrate they have obtained standard achievement. At the Sr. High, passing of the Regents Exams fulfill requirements for students to earn their diplomas. At the Jr. High, students performance on the State Assessments allow us to measure their academic progress and help us steer instruction and provide individual educational interventions. Ultimately these tests show that all students have learned the required amount of material and skills deemed necessary.

While these assessments are an important tool to evaluate student achievement, they are not viewed as the only objective of our educational focus. Our goals are and will always be to provide a well-rounded education for our children to be successful and productive citizens who are career and college ready when they graduate. Recently, changes have been made to the State Assessments to make them less stressful for our students. Additionally, we have been able to reduce testing of our students by eliminating the many benchmark exams that were used to evaluate teachers.

We ask for your total support to help our students do their best on these important assessments. Please encourage your son or daughter to do their best on all exams and do all you can to promote punctuality and good attendance to school.

The designated timeframe for ELA goal growth and skill building is **Tuesdays and Wednesdays**, **January 17-March 24**. Focus on math skills will run **April 3-28**. Students will report to the cafeteria for snack at 3:05 p.m. followed by instruction 3:15-4:05 p.m. **Students must be picked up at 4:05 p.m. from the Greenlawn lobby.**

During the ELA focus, students and adults will be working together to develop activities to promote growth toward goals, following the rigorous 10-week schedule below:

- Guided practice of passages with Multiple Choice questions
- 2. Guided practice of passages with Short Response questions
- 3. Independent practice of passages with Multiple Choice questions
- 4. Independent practice of passages with Short Response questions
- 5. Independent practice of passages with Multiple Choice questions
- 6. Independent practice of passages with Short Response questions
- 7. Guided and independent practice of Extended Response questions
- 8. Guided and independent practice of Extended Response questions
- 9. Drill and practice
- 10. Strategy review

Snack will be provided. Students will be grouped according to grade level and total participation numbers. If after-school activities are canceled, this program will be canceled as well. Another commitment letter will follow in March regarding Math goal and skill growth.

On Wednesday, March 8, the Guidance Office will host an 8th grade parent information night at 6:30 p.m. in the High School Auditorium. At this meeting we will discuss requirements for graduation and what options your child has regarding selection of high school courses.

Students will be touring BOCES Harrold Campus on March 15. The purpose of the field trip is for student to tour the Harrold Technical Education Center and learn about the variety of technical educational programs offered. This visit is helpful for students when considering options for their high school four year plan. BOCES technical educational programs are available to student during their junior and senior years of high school.

In mid-March, a letter with specific dates and times that guidance counselors will be available to meet with you and your child to develop a four-year plan for high school will be sent home. Guidance staff would like to meet with each student and a parent/guardian individually to develop a four-year plan. The purpose of this plan is to map out what courses your child will take in grades 9-12. The four-year plan is the first step in helping your child make a decision about their plans after high school. Parental/guardian input and support is essential in helping your child realize their goals. There will be day and evening appointments available. Individual meetings usually last approximately one half hour.
