Superintendent's Message

I would like to begin this first address with a thank you to our students, staff and community for a great start. A new school year is a time to celebrate the possibilities of new beginnings while also taking time to reflect on what we can learn from our past.

Over the past three years, our District has made significant progress in addressing the hard issues of financial inequities in school funding across New York State. Three budget cycles ago, the District was in the midst of a 1.7 million dollar structural deficit. The commitment of the Board of Education, the District Budget Advisory Committee and our administrative team to address this structural deficit required envisioning a financially strong school district, offering more than just a basic education to our students and our community.

As an organization we are not in a position to return to business as usual; however, we are able to provide opportunities and access to new learning opportunities and experiences that three years ago would have seemed unlikely. The Common Core calls for students to be college- and careerready. For many of us at Bainbridge-Guilford, college- and career-ready is about more than passing a multitude of tests. It is about providing real opportunities and experience for our young people to experience what a college class would be like or what working at a major corporation like Amphenol would entail. It is introducing our youngest students to the joys and excitement of math, science and technology through project based learning or providing opportunities to participate in student leadership summits sponsored by our student council.

Moving forward, we plan to make similar gains in the soft issues of connecting with our faculty and staff and in including our community more in what we do. Through team building sessions with all of our faculty and staff on conference days, to working with parents and community members to open up programs and resources to the greater school-community connectedness, we are now in a position where we can look outside our school walls to both provide and receive support from our communities.

While our current school culture is viewed by some as too corporate and business-like, I think most would agree that increased academic rigor and enhanced professional accountability are necessary in our schools as it is in many facets of public life. However, we are comfortable in acknowledging that these higher standards are only part of what we must do to provide our students with growth opportunities necessary to excel in our rapidly changing global society. That said, I acknowledge that we can always improve as we strive to create as many of these quality options for children as possible. I am always open to working with my district colleagues to explore ways we can continue to improve for the sake of the children that we serve; always keeping in mind that we have to balance the needs of our children and District with what taxpayers can afford.

One of the areas I intend to focus on in the next few years is improving our communication systems. It is important that our community and our staff have timely and accurate information as our programs and resources evolve. Please follow us on our new website at www.bgcsd.org. I plan to provide an update at least every two weeks to the superintendent's page. The next entry will be an overview of the financial changes the District has experienced, and how we are in a very different place than three years ago.

Again, thank you all for a great start to the school year.

Yet another school year has begun and the Board of Education is very pleased to announce a few new things our District has to offer. As our motto states, B-G has a *tradition* of excellence and thanks to the great efforts and collaboration between our Board, administrators, teachers, support staff, parents, local businesses and community members we are happy to continue.

In the Jr.-Sr. High School one of the major additions is our Machinist training program in collaboration with DCMO BOCES and the Amphenol Corporation. As a BOCES course, the program is currently open to B-G and Oxford students this school year and is housed at B-G. The course has grown to simultaneously address a call from the state for more career readiness courses and a focus on application skills, while providing practical benefits for our local community. Through generous donations from Amphenol and the countless hours our faculty and staff spent planning, we are able to pilot the class this year with an expectation to have it fully up and running for the 2015-2016 school year. Students in this course will learn how to machine and manufacture various products made from an array of materials including wood and metal. At the end of the course, there will be an opportunity for students to participate in an internship at Amphenol. It is our hope that this new course will tie in nicely with our already successful Business and Marketing class, which would create an opportunity for students to design, build and market something from scratch.

Furthermore, we are excited to have added enough college and dual-credit courses to our schedule that we have students aiming to graduate with an Associates degree a month prior to their high school graduation. This has been a work in progress for several years and we were very pleased to receive an outline detailing how a student would go about achieving this goal. Presently we have eight current seniors striving to obtain the entire Associates degree and many more that will graduate with a great deal of college credits. We wish them luck as they pursue their goals and applaud their initiative in taking on such a rigorous program.

Greenlawn also has some exciting program changes. The highlight would likely be the creation of an elementary Computer/STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) course. The class, which will be offered with music and art, will focus on teaching the children everything from identifying the parts of a computer, to keyboarding, basic coding and programming, robotics and beyond. Since technology is such an enormous and important part of our world, we are very pleased to be exposing our students to it at a very young age. Additionally, with students in 2nd-6th grade learning these advanced skills, we are hopeful that our High School technology programs will be able to progress even further as these highly proficient students advance through the grades.

This year both Guilford and Greenlawn students will receive additional in-house counseling services, which was a primary community goal as we faced the fiscal challenges over the past three school years. Our Board fully recognizes the changing demographics in our community and a need for more counseling services. We now have a designated Social Worker at the Guilford school, servicing PK-1st grade students and families, and two guidance counselors at Greenlawn, providing services to 2nd-3rd and 4th-6th graders.

As you can see, we have a lot of exciting opportunities for our students this year and we would like nothing more than to continue to share with our community as these various programs develop further. One of our new Board goals is to provide more opportunities for the school and community to connect in meaningful and positive ways. That being said, the Board invites you to visit us by attending a Board meeting or joining us at the various activities that occur within our District. In order to have the strongest district possible, the Board has prioritized finding more ways to collaborate with our community, which will in turn help our children to learn and grow to the best of their abilities.

As all children have strengths, weaknesses and possess their own uniqueness, the same holds true for the adults that surround these children. We must continue to work together while respecting and embracing all that we have to offer one another. It is our belief that a strong, diverse and supportive community leads to a well-rounded, top-quality district, which we believe is a mutual goal of both the district and community.

Adult Basic Education/ High School Equivalency

Afton Adult Education sponsors two classes per week in many area schools and libraries. You may join a class at any time. Classes are free and the work is individualized.

For those unable to attend a class, there is a program offered through the mail called GRASP (Give Ready Adults a Study Program). This program is designed for motivated people 21 years of age, or older who work well on their own, and possess good reading skills.

Jr.-Sr. High School Attendance Procedure

Attention Parents/Guardians of Jr.-Sr. High Schoolers: Please Post this number: 967-6368

- This number should be called as early in the morning as possible on the day your child will be absent or tardy. It should be called each and every day that your child will be absent or tardy. Policy states it is the parent/guardian responsibility to make the calls. There is an answering machine, so you may call at any time, day or night. If the parent/guardian does not call in for the student, an attempt will be made to contact the parent/guardian.
- Notes to be excused during the school day should be presented to the Attendance Officer in the High School Main Office when the student first enters the building in the morning. Notes not received first thing in the morning will be subject to verification. If you find you need to take your child for a last minute appointment, you should call the number listed above or fax a note and then personally come in to sign your child out for the appointment. It is very difficult to have your child ready for pick-up without knowing ahead of time.
- A student who will be going on an extended absence—whether it be excused or unexcused—should complete an Extended Absence Form available in the Main office from the Attendance Officer. Some examples would be: horse shows, family vacation, 4-H conference.
- The nurse will continue to assess ill students and call the parent/guardian if the student needs to go home. The parent/guardian will either come for the student or designate a person to pick up the student. Parents should discourage their children from calling to leave school without first seeing the nurse for assessment.



Request for Pesticide Application Notice

October 2014

Dear Parent, Guardian, and School Staff,

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hour following an application;
- Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25; or
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps and hornets.

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School will not allow the use of any pesticides that require notification unless an emergency exists. In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

Everyday Preventive Actions That Can Help Fight Germs, Like Flu

CDC recommends a three-step approach to fighting the flu.

CDC recommends a three-step approach to fighting influenza (flu). The first and most important step is to get a flu vaccination each year. But if you get the flu, there are prescription antiviral drugs that can treat your illness. Early treatment is especially important for the elderly, the very young, people with certain chronic health conditions, and pregnant women. Finally, everyday preventive actions may slow the spread of germs that cause respiratory (nose, throat, and lungs) illnesses, like flu. This flyer contains information about everyday preventive actions.



How does the flu spread?

Flu viruses are thought to spread mainly from person to person through droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze, or talk. Flu viruses also may spread when people touch something with flu virus on it and then touch their mouth, eyes, or nose. Many other viruses spread these ways too.

People infected with flu may be able to infect others beginning 1 day **before** symptoms develop and up to 5-7 days **after** becoming sick. That means you may be able to spread the flu to someone else before you know you are sick as well as while you are sick. Young children, those who are severely ill, and those who have severely weakened immune systems may be able to infect others for longer than 5-7 days.

What are everyday preventive actions?

- Try to avoid close contact with sick people.
- If you or your child gets sick with flu-like illness, CDC recommends that you (or your child) stay home for at least 24 hours after the fever is gone except to get medical care or for other necessities. The fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.
- While sick, limit contact with others as much as possible to keep from infecting them.
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that may be contaminated with germs like the flu.
- If an outbreak of flu or another illness occurs, follow public health advice. This may include information about how to increase distance between people and other measures.





What additional steps can I take at work to help stop the spread of germs that can cause respiratory illness, like flu?

- Find out about your employer's plans if an outbreak of flu or another illness occurs and whether flu vaccinations are offered on-site.
- Routinely clean frequently touched objects and surfaces, including doorknobs, keyboards, and phones, to help remove germs.
- Make sure your workplace has an adequate supply of tissues, soap, paper towels, alcohol-based hand rubs, and disposable wipes.
- Train others on how to do your job so they can cover for you in case you or a family member gets sick and you have to stay home.
- If you begin to feel sick while at work, go home as soon as possible.



- Find out about plans your child's school, child care program, or college has if an outbreak of flu or another illness occurs and whether flu vaccinations are offered on-site.
- Make sure your child's school, child care program, or college routinely cleans frequently touched objects and surfaces, and that they have a good supply of tissues, soap, paper towels, alcohol-based hand rubs, and disposable wipes on-site.
- Ask how sick students and staff are separated from others and who will care for them until they can go home.



Everyday preventive actions can help slow the spread of germs that can cause many different illnesses and may offer some protection against the flu.
