Superintendent's Message

We are heading out of winter and looking forward to spring. While this hasn't been the school year any of us hoped for, great things continue to happen on the BG campus. Our students are busy during their days on and off campus.

The district continues to navigate through the pandemic and strive for a safe environment for our students and staff. A huge thank you goes out to the Chenango County Department of Health and our local DCMO BOCES who we work very closely with. Their guidance during this trying time has been unending.

We are excited to announce that the B-G District will be returning all students to campus, five days a week. We have been doing this in phases so we can work out any wrinkles as we transition to all students coming back. On March 1 we welcomed back all of our Kindergarten students to campus four days per week and on March 15, all of our 2nd grade students came back four days per week. On April 12 we will welcome back Pre-K, Grade 1, Grade 3 and Grade 12. ALL STUDENTS in ALL GRADES will return five days a week the week of April 19!

BG athletes are excited to see our sports teams back in action. Our bowling, basketball and indoor track teams have wrapped up a very successful winter season. This has been a tremendous effort by everyone to bring sports safely back to campus.

In the coming months we will be wrapping up the district's multi-year Capital Project with work at the Jr-Sr High School. The final pieces of the construction project will be to replace the bleachers in the MPR, repair the floor, paint the walls and replace the wall mats at each end. The new bleachers will have handrails incorporated for people to more safely navigate up and down the bleachers. We will also be stripping the MPR gymnasium floor back to raw wood, replacing the damaged boards, and repainting the lines. The timeline for completion will depend on the availability of some of the supplies.

And finally, we have been working for several months now on the 2021-2022 school budget. The financial future for schools is forecasted to be bleak for the next three to five years. The BG schools will be eliminating several positions due to attrition and have been trimming where possible. There will be more information on the BG school budget in the near future.

Thank you for your continued support during this very difficult school year. I can't thank our families enough for working with us as we look to the light at the end of the tunnel.

Moving to a small town school after going to a school that graduated an average of 800 students each year, was different, but I was so lucky that it was Bainbridge-Guilford CSD that I graduated from. At BG

I found so many positive reasons to love a small school. The students all knew each other, even if they weren't in their same grade, and they went out of their way to make me feel welcome. The teachers took the time to know me and were able to provide me the guidance that formed my career. I quickly realized that I had been given a great opportunity, one I most likely would not have found in the big school I moved from.

At BG I took my first business classes, with Mr. Bakoon and Mrs. Branham. My other favorite class was Economics with Mr. Ashworth. I had no idea that those would be the classes that decided my path in life. I took every business class that BG had to offer my junior and senior year. Mr. Bakoon's accounting class and Economiccs with Mr. Ashworth were what made me want to major in Accounting and Economics at Oneonta State, and work towards my CPA. BUDGET HEARING

A budget hearing will be held at the Jr.-Sr. High School Auditorium commencing at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 11, 2021

VOTER REGISTRATION

Personal registration of Voters is required for the annual vote.

No person shall be entitled to vote there whose name does not appear in the register of the school district, except those persons who registered to vote pursuant to the provisions of Election Law § 5-612. (Qualified voters who are registered with the County Board of Elections are eligible to vote without further registration.) Persons otherwise qualified to vote who voted in any annual vote conducted within four calendar years before the preparation of the register need not personally register for this vote.

Registration will be held on May 11, 2021 from 2:00-7:00 p.m. at the Greenlawn Elementary and at the Guilford Elementary schools. Voters may register with the District Clerk, 18 Juliand Street, until May 13, 2021. Office hours are 7:30 a.m.-4:00 p.m.

The register of the school district shall be filed five days before the date of the vote in the office of the District Clerk, located at 18 Juliand Street, Bainbridge, New York where it is open for inspection by any qualified voter of the district between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., each day up to and including the day set for the vote, except Sunday.

VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

A person shall be entitled to vote on the appointed date for the election of school district officials, and upon all other matters which may be in the form of a referendum, who is:

- 1. A citizen of the United States.
- 2. Eighteen years of age.
- 3. A resident within the district for a period of thirty (30) days next preceding the meeting at which he/she offers to vote. (Legal residence is determined by the fixed and permanent home of the voter. Property ownership alone does NOT equal residency. Ownership of real property alone does not qualify an individual to vote in the election of that district.)

No person shall be determined ineligible to vote by reason of race, creed, color or sex, who has other qualifications in this section.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

A voter who is registered and who may be unavoidably *ABSENT FROM THE COUNTY* of residence because of his/her duties, occupation, business, vacation, attendance at college, sickness, disability or detention in jail or prison, may obtain and submit an application for an absentee ballot.

The procedure for obtaining an absentee ballot is:

- Obtain and submit an application for an absentee ballot.
- If the ballot will be mailed the application must be received no later than the SEVENTH DAY BEFORE THE ELECTION (May 11, 2021).
- Upon completion of the application, the ballot will be given to the applicant or, in the case of a written request, will be mailed to the applicant.
- Completed ballots MUST BE received by the District Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election (May 18, 2021).

CANDIDATE VACANCIES FOR SCHOOL BOARD

Petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the Board of Education must be filed with the Clerk of the District between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. not later than April 19, 2021. The following vacancies are to be filled:

- A three-year term (July 1, 2021-June 30, 2024), presently held Tina Ammon
- A three-year term (July 1, 2021-June 30, 2024), presently held Keith Hanvey
- A three-year term (July 1, 2021-June 30, 2024), presently held Rebecca Sullivan

Petition information is available on the district website or by contacting the District Office. Each petition must be addressed to the Clerk of the District, be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the District, shall state the residence of each signer, and the name and address of the candidate. Vacancies upon the Board shall not be considered separate specific offices. The individuals receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected to the vacancies.

B-G Accepting Pre-K Applications at Guilford Elementary School

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is accepting applications for its Pre-kindergarten program. Only parents who are district residents with an age-eligible child may apply. To be eligible a child must be four years old prior to December 1, 2021 and cannot be five years old before that date. Applications must be received at the main office of the Guilford Elementary School by 4:00 p.m. Friday, April 30, 2021 to be considered for selection. Selection of applicants for the available slots will be determined soon after this date. Per New York State Regulations, selection for Pre-kindergarten slots for the 2021-22 school year will be done randomly if more than 36 applications are received.

Similar to last year, our program will include two full day classes. Both classes are housed in the Guilford Elementary School. Each classroom has a pre-K teacher and a classroom aide. Our program runs Monday – Friday from 8:00AM to 2:30 PM. Children may not ride school transportation until they are four years old. Parents are responsible for transportation to and from school until then.

A message from the Jr.-Sr. High School Principal

As we work through the COVID pandemic and this difficult year of school, please know our teachers and support staff are doing everything they can to continue to provide a solid education for our students. In addition to all of us learning and doing new methods of instruction we have all had the extra duties of implementing and maintaining the safest and healthiest learning environment we can through strict adherence to national, state, and county guidelines.

At the end of last year, our school district rolled out one-toone digital devices for all our students enabling them to learn
remotely whenever needed. At that time, our teachers learned on
the fly how to teach remotely and then began this year spending four professional development days learning the platforms
of Google Classroom and Zoom instructional video meetings.
Teachers continue to plan and deliver instruction in different
formats as we have in-person instruction, remote instruction
and the combination of the two. This takes extra planning and
preparation. We know many students learn best at school and
we are trying to get students additional help through Wednesday
teacher's office hours and help from our wonderful support staff
which includes our teacher's aides and licensed teacher assistants.
Many of our staff are spending hours at a time helping students
both in person and via Zoom.

As we hope to be turning the corner on the worst of the pandemic and look for decreased positivity rates and a reduction in the spread of the disease, we are attempting to bring back more students for four days of instruction and started in January having interscholastic sports. Again, we will and can only do what we can while maintaining the safest environment for our students and staff.

As we move toward the end of the school year, many of our year ending activities will continue to be postponed or occur in a format that reduces the number of attendees or are done remotely. However, we must still maintain our focus on our students getting the instruction and help they need to be successful in their academics. As noted previously, many more students are struggling to pass their classes as they are unable to attend school in person. Even though we know these are hard times, our students really need to step up and participate by attending ZOOM sessions when necessary and following through with their assigned school work. They also must take advantage of the opportunities given by their teachers to get help, whether it is through attending office hours or scheduling separate help with teachers, teacher's aides or licensed teaching assistants.

To close, I always say we have great students and great staff. Together, we have to work hard to be successful in our academics while maintaining the utmost safe and healthy environment. Please contact the school if we can help you help your child. Also, please complete the Powerschool Home Health Check-In for every day students are expected to participate in school instruction.

What's Happening at Greenlawn!




GREENLAWN COUNSELING UPDATES JANUARY-APRIL

In March and April all students participated in personal safety lessons. The rest of the school year will be focusing on using coping strategies, summer safety, and transitioning to different schools and grades.





GREENLAWN STUDENT COUNCIL


