Superintendent's Message

Voting for the 2014-2015 Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District budget is right around the corner. In contrast to the past two budget cycles, our proposed spending plan for this year does not include any program or staff reductions. In fact, this year we are proposing to enhance several program areas, providing increased opportunities for our students to meet the rapidly changing demands placed on them by an increasingly global world. As we work toward defining our vision of what Bainbridge-Guilford should be I offer the following goals for your consideration.

All students reading on grade level by the end of 3rd grade: As a District, our primary program goal is for all students to be reading on grade level entering 4th grade. Students encounter a significant shift in both the purpose and demands placed on them in 4th grade. NYSED's adoption and implementation of the Common Core does not mean that our students are automatically coming to our schools more prepared for these rigorous demands. As a District we remain committed to providing local solutions to these increased demands. While our teachers are trained in and often implement parts of the NYSED Learning Modules into their instruction, the decision to do so will continue to be made at the building level.

All students with knowledge of critical reading, effective writing and fundamental math skills by the end of 8th grade: More important and alarming than the impact of the Common Core on education, is the demand for foundational instruction in basic literacy skills across the curriculum and a sound understanding of mathematical principles in our rapidly changing global economy. As we work to ensure that all of our students have basic reading skills as they enter fourth grade, we need to ensure that our students, intermediate level and middle level, learn to apply these skills to ever increasingly demanding content. Not to prepare for New York State tests, but to provide each child with an opportunity to choose career paths and life skills that align with his or her individual talents and life goals.

College and career ready programming options: The District is working hard to collaborate with local businesses and regional colleges. Last year we launched the Business Manufacturing Technology program. We are also looking to provide our college bound students with an opportunity to graduate from high school with an associate's degree.

Active Participation: The level of student participation in our athletic teams and extra-curricular clubs is a source of pride for our community. The addition of several credit bearing physical education electives to our high school program has extended these options for many of our older students. We fully intend to maintain our commitment to these important programs and opportunities.

Over the past three years the District has made challenging and difficult decisions. These decisions have provided us with a basic level of financial stability for the next several years. While no one can predict the future or the intentions of our legislative leaders, it is our hope that those in Albany will do the right thing and restore the Gap Elimination Adjustment (GEA).

BOE Blog

It is that time of year again: days are getting longer, some robins have made their way North, daytime temperatures are rising above the single digits and school boards around the State are considering next year's budgets. Now, three out of those four things are pretty positive; however, the B-G School Board always seeks to get grades higher than a 75%, and so we would like to take this opportunity to *talk shop* with the community.

Board members understand that both Bainbridge and Guilford are in difficult economic times. We appreciate that neither businesses nor residents can afford the hardships caused by constantly rising taxes. This is as true in terms of school taxes as it is in every other area we pay taxes in.

The B-G School District operates in the context of not only our small towns, but also under influences coming from Albany and Washington, D.C. A resident may be a registered Democrat, Republican, or perhaps an Independent and still question if the State and/or federal government treat rural school districts such as B-G fairly. Last year, for example, a wide range of residents got together to lobby the State for fairer treatment for B-G and, with help from Assemblyman Cliff Crouch and Senator Tom Libous, this effort got results.

The mandates in public education, from the state or federal level, are often well intentioned. We all want our students to receive the type of education that prepares them to be successful after graduating; however, sometimes mandates do not seem to be a good fit for B-G because the focus is to fix a problem we may not have. Many mandates are addressing issues at larger, urban schools and really have little use in a small, rural school like B-G. The costs of these mandates, useful to B-G or not, have to be included in the budget.

For the past few years B-G has dealt with increases in State mandates, declining revenues and increases in operating costs. Some tough choices had to be made and people, programs and students were/are affected; however, since the last budget cycle, B-G has been able to capitalize on some changes to health care, reorganization of personnel, plus there is now talk at the state level to increase aid and restore the Gap Elimination Adjustment. All of this is working in favor for B-G. We as a Board feel that we have passed the *low point* and are now on an upswing.

There can and should be diverse opinions regarding what makes B-G the best school in our region. That diversity provides the Board members with different ways to evaluate what is essential for our


School District. This includes determining what types of courses and *after school* programs the students' benefit from, and the community supports. For example, athletics, music and art are all areas beyond reading, writing and arithmetic that B-G students have traditionally excelled at. Some of these are attractive to large numbers of students, while others may appeal to a smaller number. But if that smaller number includes students who are not otherwise connected to the school, we must evaluate that.

Looking forward, our goal is to provide the education to our students that our community expects, provide students with the appropriate after school programs the community will support, and to make sure that students who want to stay in the Bainbridge/Guilford area are able to. Thus, as a board, we are trying to promote a stronger relationship between our school and the businesses in our area. What are the educational and training focuses that these businesses are looking for in future employees? How can we work together for all of our benefits?

With that in mind, the Board is looking for input from the B-G community again this year. Attend a Board meeting, join the budget advisory committee, or contact a Board member directly. This input is used by the Board, its committees and the administration staff to develop the budget and create long term district plans and goals. This definitely includes input from those who view things differently from us. Indeed, even amongst the Board members, there are wide ranges of opinions on most of the issues that we must consider. No two people ever think just alike—for that would mean that only one of them is actually thinking.

With all the things you have to do, why should you come to the polls on Tuesday, May 20 to vote on the proposed school budget and cast your ballot in the school board election? Here are seven reasons from the New York State School Boards Association.

WHY VOTE?

✓ BECAUSE YOU CAN.

In many nations of the world, and in most states of our union, citizens do not have the right to vote on the spending plans developed by their school districts.

✓ BECAUSE YOU SET AN EXAMPLE.

The students we serve notice whether or not the adults in their lives exercise their civic responsibilities. We set an example whether or not we vote.

✓ BECAUSE YOU CONTROL PUBLIC EDUCATION.

You get to decide each year on the quantity and quality of educational programs and services provided in your community.

✓ BECAUSE YOU SHOW RESPECT FOR WHAT EDUCATORS DO.

Working with all the students who show up is a very difficult challenge. By taking the time to vote, you acknowledge this challenge.

✓ BECAUSE YOUR RESPONSE IS NEEDED.

Your school board has developed a spending plan based on input from district employees and community members of budget advisory committees. These folks spent hundreds of hours considering options and making spending decisions for your consideration. Respond by voting.

✓ BECAUSE PUBLIC EDUCATION MATTERS.

Our public schools educate by far the greatest number of our next generation—those to whom we will be turning over the reins of government and business, and those who will be caring for our generation as we get older.

✓ BECAUSE YOUR COMMUNITY AND ITS CHILDREN DEPEND ON YOU.

The folk wisdom that “it takes a whole community to raise a child” fits here. You share the responsibility to see that all children are educated. While you may not be actually involved with what occurs in classrooms, you can make your opinion known on what happens there by voting.

BUDGET HEARING

A budget hearing will be held in the Jr./Sr. High School Auditorium commencing at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 13.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Personal registration of Voters is required for the annual vote. Registration will be held on May 13, from 2:00-7:00 p.m. at the Bainbridge Town Hall and the Guilford Town Hall. Voters may also register with the District Clerk until May 15.

VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

A person shall be entitled to vote on the appointed date for the election of school district officials, and upon all other matters which may be in the form of a referendum, who is:

1. A citizen of the United States.
2. Eighteen years of age.
3. A resident within the district for a period of thirty (30) days next preceding the meeting at which he/she offers to vote.

No person shall be determined ineligible to vote by reason of race, creed, color or sex, who has other qualifications in this section.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

A Voter who is registered and who may be unavoidably ABSENT FROM THE COUNTY of residence because of his/her duties, occupation, business, vacation, attendance at college, sickness, disability or detention in jail or prison, may obtain and submit an application for an absentee ballot.

The procedure for obtaining an absentee ballot is:

- Obtain and submit an application for an absentee ballot.
- If the ballot will be mailed the application must be received no later than the SEVENTH DAY BEFORE THE ELECTION.
- Upon completion of the application, the ballot will be given to the applicant or, in the case of a written request, will be mailed to the applicant.

Completed ballots MUST BE received by the District Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election.


Jr./Sr. HS Students of the Month

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
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
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Jr. High School Guidance Corner
