

Whoo's Learning About Owls?













The 2/3 Multi-agers at Greenlawn learned all about owls during the month of December.

They researched different species of owls and found out about their characteristics, defenses, adaptations, habits, and diet. The multi-agers found this interesting fact about owls: they swallow their prey whole and regurgitate the parts that they can't digest. This is where owl pellets come from. We dug a little deeper into this idea by dissecting owl pellets in class. Students were given bone charts and tools to find out what their owls ate. They were very intent on figuring out the contents of their pellet in order to solve the mystery!

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

We are heading out of winter and looking forward to spring. While this hasn't been the school year any of us hoped for, great things continue to happen on the B-G campus. Our students are busy during their days on and off campus.

The District continues to navigate through the pandemic and strive for a safe environment for our students and staff. A huge thank you goes out to the Chenango County Department of Health and our local DCMO BOCES who we work very closely with. Their guidance during this trying time has been unending.

Starting March 1, if we can safely carry it off, we will be bringing some of our students back to campus four days per week. The district has begun planning for this event. Our school reopening committee has met to discuss the process of how we will be bringing students back and make sure we have thought this through from every angle. There are many factors to consider in order to do this. The social distancing of students on the bus, in the classroom and in the cafeteria. The creation of additional classrooms for learning space and making sure each student has his/her own school supplies. Much more info will be coming home as we move closer to this date. Again, we will not be doing this if COVID numbers spike or we can't do this safely.

In the coming months we will be wrapping up the district's multi-year Capital Project with work at the Jr-Sr HS. The final pieces of the construction project will be to replace the bleachers in the MPR, repair the floor, and paint the walls. The new bleachers will have hand-rails incorporated for people to more safely navigate up and down the bleachers. We will also be stripping the MPR gymnasium floor back to raw wood, replacing the damaged boards, repainting the lines, and replacing the mats at hanging each end. The timeline for completion will depend on the availability of some of the supplies.

And finally, we have been working for several months now on the 2021-2022 school budget. The financial future for schools is forecasted to be bleak for the next three to five years. The B-G schools will be eliminating several positions due to attrition and have been trimming where possible. There will be more information on the B-G school budget in the near future.

Thank you for your continued support during this very difficult school year. I can't thank our families enough for working with us as we look to the light at the end of the tunnel.

B-G Accepting Pre-K Applications at Guilford Elementary School

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is accepting applications for its prekindergarten program. Only parents who are district residents with an age-eligible child may apply. To be eligible a child must be four years old prior to December 1, 2021 and cannot be five years old before that date. Applications must be received at the Main Office of the Guilford Elementary School by 4:00 p.m. on Friday, April 30, 2021 to be considered for selection. Selection of applicants for the available slots will be determined soon after this date. Per New York State Regulations, selection for prekindergarten slots for the 2021-22 school year will be done randomly if more than 36 applications are received.

Similar to last year, our program will include two full day classes. Both classes are housed in the Guilford Elementary School. Each classroom has a pre-k teacher and a classroom aide. Our program runs Monday-Friday from 8:00 a.m.-2:30 p.m. Children may not ride school transportation until they are four years old. Parents are responsible for transportation to and from school until then.

Applications will be mailed to you upon request. For further information contact the Guilford Elementary School secretary, Michele Sherwood at 895-6700.

BUDGET HEARING

A budget hearing will be held at the Jr.-Sr. High School Auditorium commencing at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 11, 2021.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Personal registration of Voters is required for the annual vote.

No person shall be entitled to the vote there at whose name does not appear in the register of the school district, except those persons who registered to vote pursuant to the provisions of Election Law § 5-612. (Qualified voters who are registered with the County Board of Elections are eligible to vote without further registration.) Persons otherwise qualified to vote who voted in any annual vote conducted within four calendar years before the preparation of the register need not personally register for this vote.

Registration will be held on May 11, 2021 from 2:00-7:00 p.m. at the Bainbridge Town Hall and the Guilford Town Hall. Voters may register with the District Clerk, 18 Juliand Street, until May 13, 2021. Office hours are 7:30 a.m.-4:00 p.m..

The register of the school district shall be filed five days before the date of the vote in the office of the District Clerk, located at 18 Juliand Street, Bainbridge, New York where it is open for inspection by any qualified voter of the district between the hours of 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m., each day up to and including the day set for the vote, except Sunday.

VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

A person shall be entitled to vote on the appointed date for the election of school district officials, and upon all other matters which may be in the form of a referendum, who is:

- 1. A citizen of the United States.
- 2. Eighteen years of age.
- 3. A resident within the district for a period of thirty (30) days next preceding the meeting at which he/she offers to vote. (Legal residence is determined by the fixed and perma-

nent home of the voter. Property ownership alone does NOT equal residency. Ownership of real property alone does not qualify an individual to vote in the election of that district.)

No person shall be determined ineligible to vote by reason of race, creed, color or sex, who has other qualifications in this section.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

A Voter who is registered and who may be unavoidably ABSENT FROM THE COUNTY of residence because of his/her duties, occupation, business, vacation, attendance at college, sickness, disability or detention in jail or prison, may obtain and submit an application for an absentee ballot.

The procedure for obtaining an absentee ballot is:

- Obtain and submit an application for an absentee ballot.
- If the ballot will be mailed the application must be received no later than the SEVENTH DAY BEFORE THE ELECTION (May 11, 2021).
- Upon completion of the application, the ballot will be given to the applicant or, in the case of a written request, will be mailed to the applicant.

Completed ballots MUST BE received by the District Clerk not later than 5:00 PM on the day of the election (May 18, 2021).

CANDIDATE VACANCIES FOR SCHOOL BOARD

Petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the Board of Education must be filed with the Clerk of the District between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. not later than April 19, 2021. The following vacancies are to be filled:

- A three-year term (July 2021-June 2024), presently held by Tina Ammon
- A three-year term (July 2021-June 2024), presently held by Keith Hanvey
- A three-year term (July 2021-June 2024), presently held by Rebecca Sullivan

Petition information is available on the district website or by contacting the District Office. Each petition must be addressed to the Clerk of the District, be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the District, shall state the residence of each signer, and the name and address of the candidate. Vacancies upon the Board shall not be considered separate specific offices. The individuals receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected to the vacancies.

School Budget Information!

Budget season has begun here at Bainbridge-Guilford. If you are interested in hearing and learning more about the different areas of the 2021-2022 school budget, budget information will be presented at each of the Board meetings for the next couple of months. In January, presentations were made on the Athletics, Buildings & Grounds and Transportation areas of the budget.

We welcome any community members who would like to join us as we move through the various areas of the budget working towards a final spending plan to present to tax payers for vote in May. COVID restrictions (mask wearing, social distancing and visitor questionnaire) will be in place. We hope to see you there!

Important Notices for Home School Parents

Transportation requests for students attending nonpublic schools (e.g., Holy Family, Valley Heights Christian Academy, etc.) must be received by the district office **no later than April 15** preceding the beginning of the next school year. All students requesting transportation must have the required immunizations for attending public school. The Board of Education will take official action on the requests at the May Board of Education meeting.

Requests for special education services for home schooled students must be received by the district office no **later than June 1** preceding the beginning of the next school year. The Board of Education will take official action on the requests at the first Board of Education meeting in June.

Please submit your letter of intent to home school **no** later than August 15.

BGA Dollars for Scholars®

BGA Dollars for scholars is a local grassroots chapter that has been working to help Bainbridge-Guilford and Afton students for 15 years now. Dollars for Scholars[®] is a national nonprofit volunteer organization that provides local graduating seniors with financial assistance to help them pursue higher education.

In 1958, an optometrist in Fall River, Mass., had a simple but profound idea—if everyone in his community gave just a dollar to an educational fund, it would be enough to help nearly every student in the community attend college. Dr. Irving Fradkin called his plan "Dollars for Scholars," and it has expanded into what today is the nation's largest non-profit, private-sector scholarship and educational support organization—Scholarship America.

Through the hard work of several community members, we were able to start a local chapter that has awarded \$115,815 in scholarships to 257 graduating seniors from both Afton and Bainbridge-Guilford Schools. We are celebrating our 15 year anniversary in the middle of a pandemic and our communities continue to step-up! Despite being unable to hold our annual phone-a-thon, donations are still coming in. If you have not yet mailed a check or visited our website, please consider doing so today. Also note, applications for the class of 2021 will be opening up online at the end of January and will remain open through April. We encourage students to visit bga.dollarsforscholars.org and set up an account to begin the application process.

Greenlawn Elementary School Counseling Program

The last few months have been busy in our counseling offices! We continue to support students and families through the winter months by connecting them with community resources. If you have a need, please contact Lori Basso, school social worker at 967-6374. We are continuing to develop social skills, coping skills, and school readiness and success in small groups and individual sessions.

Students in grades 2-5 were able to participate in presentations provided by The American Red Cross in December via Zoom. The Pillowcase Project presentation is a classroom-based presentation that teaches students to: identify the best ways to stay safe during emergencies that can occur in their communities; identify the best ways to prevent and stay safe during a home fire; use coping skills to help manage stress during emergencies and in everyday situations; gain confidence in their abilities to be prepared for emergencies through hands-on activities; use their knowledge to act as advocates for emergency preparedness in their homes and communities; and discuss the role science plays in emergency preparedness. Ask your children what they learned about emergency preparedness!

Classroom lessons are happening both in-person and via video on the counseling google classrooms. Topics include coping skills, friendship, and the wellness triangle (physical, social, and mental wellness). Please be aware that all students will be taught personal safety (abuse prevention) and alcohol/substance abuse prevention in the coming months. Greenlawn students continue to work really hard during these times and families have been very flexible and understanding. The faculty and staff at Greenlawn are excited to be able to teach students in person and hope for the days when more students can be in the building. As the New Year begins and keeping with our Growth Mindset, Greenlawn students are completing their 2nd set of individual goal sheets and will work with their teachers to achieve these goals.

We were able to work with the Red Cross and offer the Pillow Case Project to our students virtually. The Pillow Case Project helps to prepare students for events that accompany emergencies and natural disasters. The students really enjoyed this program and we thank the Red Cross for being creative and presenting in a virtual way. Additionally, Ag in the Classroom will begin with our students grades 2nd, 3rd, and MA. This program will be virtual as well, but Cornell Cooperative Extensive does a great job modifying the activities and bring great learning experiences to our students.

Mrs. Jenkins and Mrs. Ives worked on combining art with a science lesson as part of the 5th grade space unit in science. In Mrs. Ives' science class students had been learning about galaxies and the formation of stars, which included the life cycle of stars (types and phases they go through). For this specific lesson and activity, students were focusing on galaxies and nebulas (regions in galaxies where stars form). This included viewing many NASA photos of galaxies and nebulas. Students had to choose a real galaxy and insert an image on a google slide. Students had researched facts about their galaxy and added them to

the slide in an information box. Students had to "discover" a new nebula in a region in their galaxy, create brackets, an arrow, and labels on the image showing where their region and nebula was located and give them each a name. Then during art class, students used watercolors to paint their own nebulas (the one they had discovered). According to Mrs. Jenkins the 5th grade students painted their nebula's in art class using a series of watercolor techniques such as "wet on wet" and splatter painting. The students were encouraged to use their Chromebooks to find the nebula they had chosen to use as a reference and inspire their painting. For all our virtual learners, Mrs. Jenkins made a video on how to do this project and demonstrated the various techniques that she also demonstrated in class. Art supplies were sent home for virtual learners to complete and return the project. The watercolor painting represented the "newly discovered nebula." Students were then asked to create a writing piece pretending to be an astronomer that made an amazing new discovery in their galaxy. They had to include where they worked, what they had discovered, where and when it was discovered, 3 facts about nebulas, and how they were going to share their great discovery with the world. This writing piece was typed onto the google slide and printed out and attached to their watercolor paintings. These beautiful nebulas and informational pieces will be displayed in the hallways at Greenlawn.

It was a great way to use interdisciplinary skills and concepts. The teachers are excited to try another cross curricular activity for 6th grade science in the spring.

Attention 8th Grade Students and Parents

Time is quickly approaching when your child will be entering 9th grade and taking high school credit-bearing courses. There are activities that will be taking place to help you and your child prepare to make important decisions about high school course selection and planning after high school.

On Wednesday, March 3, the Guidance Office will host an 8th Grade Parent Information Night at 6:30 p.m. via Zoom. At this meeting we will discuss requirements for graduation and what options your child has regarding selection of high school courses. A Zoom link will be mailed to parents/guardians and emailed to students.

Although details are not known at this time, all 8th grade students will be exposed to the Career and Technical education programs offered by our BOCES District. Students will have the opportunity to take these programs beginning in 11th grade.

A letter with specific dates and times that guidance counselors will be available to meet with you and your child to develop a four-year plan for high school will be sent home with report cards in January. Guidance staff would like to meet with each student and a parent/guardian individually to develop a four-year plan. The purpose of this plan is to map out what courses your child will take in grades 9-12. The four-year plan is the first step in helping your child make a decision about their plans after high school. The meetings will take place via phone or zoom.

Parental/guardian input and support is essential in helping your child realize their goals. There will be day and evening appointments available. Individual meetings usually last approximately one half hour. Please contact Joanne Moxley at 967-6320 with any questions.

The food drive allowed approximately 90 families to receive a big tote of food, a turkey, a bag of toys, laundry detergent and yogurt donated by Chobani. These holiday care packages were delivered by staff members on four buses on December 16. Thanks to all of our student groups and staff who took part in this gigantic effort of giving and we send a special thanks to all who donated food, toys and/or money for the holiday deliveries!

The January Regents Exams were cancelled so, as in June, for any students slated to take a Regents Exam in January, they will earn an exemption for that Regents requirement as long as they pass the class attached to that exam. We have not heard anything yet about grades 3-8 State Assessments or June Regents Exams and continue to prepare our students for those assessments. In 7th and 8th grades, the State Assessments will be taken through computer-based testing and we have recently done simulations to test our systems and to have students practice small portions of the exams.

Regarding instruction, with our students learning in three different models including some students coming four days a week, some coming two days a week, and students learning remotely we have all had to plan, deliver and receive instruction in different ways. Students are struggling to pass classes and it is mostly due to poor attendance when learning remotely and not doing their school work. We offer help outside of classes but students are not attending. Students will be retained and/or not earn credits for classes they fail. Please check your child's Powerschool grades regularly and monitor attendance and their school work.

In addition, we have had to implement the COVID safety protocols and have done quite well keeping our staff and students healthy; however, we cannot emphasize enough the requirement for parents to do the Powerschool Home Health Check-In for each child before they come to school. By answering the questions in the screening which take less than a minute, you as parents have the guidance of when to keep your child(ren) home from school. We are finding that students who need to go home because of illness or COVID-like symptoms have not filled out the morning health check-in.

We will end by noting we have implemented a successful pre-season sports preparation for our student athletes. From October into December in which students were given the opportunity to participate in Fall, Winter and Spring Sports Skill Sessions, workouts in our new Fitness Rooms and/or conditioning workouts. We averaged around 70 students attending each day and know while helping to prepare them physically for possible sports seasons to come, these opportunities have lifted their spirits. We thank all our coaches and athletes for making this a success and encourage them to continue in this opportunities as we wait to hear what we can or cannot do in the area of extracurricular activities.

WEAR YOUR MASK CORRECTLY

- · Wash your hands before putting on your mask
- Put it over your nose and mouth and secure it under your chin
- Try to fit it snugly against the sides of your face
- · Make sure you can breathe easily
- Do not place a mask on a child younger than 2







USE A MASK TO HELP PROTECT OTHERS

- Wear a mask over your nose and mouth to help prevent getting and spreading COVID-19
- Wear a mask in public settings when around people who don't live in your household, especially when indoors and when it may be difficult for you to stay six feet apart from people who don't live with you
- Don't put the mask around your neck or up on your forehead
