### **AHERA** Notification

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District has completed the inspection of its facilities to determine if asbestos is present and if any action is needed to avoid potential health hazards.

A management plan has been developed in compliance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Alert (AHERA) to insure that the school district continues to provide and maintain a safe environment for students, employees and visitors.

#### THE PLAN INCLUDES

- Training of maintenance staff to prevent disturbance of asbestos;
- Provisions for periodic re-inspection and surveillance; provisions for abatement activities performed by trained personnel.
- Annually school districts are required to notify parent, teacher, and employee organizations of the availability of their management plans.

## Important BMI information 2015-2016 School Year

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As part of a required school health examination, a student is weighed and his/her height is measured. These numbers are used to figure out the student's body mass index or BMI. The BMI helps the doctor or nurse know if the student's weight is in a healthy range or is too high or too low. Recent changes to the New York State Education Law require that BMI and weight status group be included as part of the student's school health examination. A sample of school districts will be selected to take part in a survey by the New York State Department of Health. If our school is selected to be part of the survey, we will be reporting to New York State Department of Health information about our students' weight status groups. Only summary information is sent. No names and no information about individual students are sent. However, you may choose to have your child's information excluded from this survey report. The information sent to the New York State Department of Health will help health officials develop programs that make it easier for children to be healthier.

If you do not wish to have your child's weight status group information included as part of the Health Department's survey this year, please print and sign your name below and return this form to your child's School Nurse by October 31.

## My School Bucks!

The Food Service Department at the Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District has made a change to a new secure online payment service through mySchool-Bucks. This service allows you to deposit money to your child's school meal account and view balance and purchase information for up to ninety days. By having money in each child's account prior to entering the cafeteria, we find that lunch lines move faster allowing your child more time to eat and be with friends.

#### To access this service:

- 1. Go to the District web site at *www.bgcsd.org*.
- 2. Click the Departments tab and go to the Food Services link.
- 3. Click the mySchoolBucks link.
- 4. On the mySchoolBucks website you can create an account and add money to your child's school meal account. You will need your child's name, school, and cafeteria pin number. The instructions listed on the back of this page will guide you through the process.

#### Things to know:

- If you have more than one child in the District you can handle all online payments using the same online account.
- Payments may be made with a Visa, MasterCard, and Discover credit or debit card. You may also make a payment using an e-check.
- A small convenience fee of \$1.95 per transaction will be assessed. Parents placing money into multiple meal accounts will only be assessed the \$1.95 fee once per deposit transaction. The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District will not profit from the use of this site.

Please Note: You may fund up to \$120 per child, however, a family may pay for all of their children with a single transaction.

We are confident that mySchoolBucks will benefit you, your child and our District. If you choose not to take advantage of the online payment service you may continue to make advance payments via check, which should be made payable to BG School Lunch Fund. Please remember to write your child's full name on the check.

## **Request for Pesticide Application Notice**

October 2015

Dear Parent, Guardian, and School Staff,

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hour following an application;
- Anti-microbial products;
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- The application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25; or
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps and hornets.

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School will not allow the use of any pesticides that require notification unless an emergency exists. In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.

If you would like to receive 48-hour prior notification of pesticide applications that are scheduled to occur in your school, please complete the form below and return it to the school. ## Jr.-Sr. High School Attendance Procedure

## ATTENTION PARENTS/GUARDIANS OF JR.-SR. HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

#### Please Post this number: 967-6368

- This number should be called *as early in the morning as possible on the day* your child will be absent or tardy. It should be called each and every day that your child will be absent or tardy. Policy states it is the parent/guardian responsibility to make the calls. There is an answering machine, so you may call at any time, day or night. If the parent/guardian does not call in for the student, an attempt will be made to contact the parent/guardian.
- Notes to be excused during the school day should be presented to the Attendance Officer in the High School Main Office when the student first enters the building in the morning. Notes not received first thing in the morning will be subject to verification. If you find you need to take your child for a last minute appointment, you should call the number listed above or fax a note and then personally come in to sign your child out for the appointment. It is very difficult to have your child ready for pick-up without knowing ahead of time.
- A student who will be going on an extended absence whether it be excused or unexcused—should complete an Extended Absence Form available in the Main office from the Attendance Officer. Some examples would be: horse shows, family vacation, 4H conference.
- The nurse will continue to assess ill students and call the parent/guardian if the student needs to go home. The parent/guardian will either come for the student or designate a person to pick up the student. Parents should discourage their children from calling to leave school without first seeing the nurse for assessment.


## **Principal Michele Shirkey Retires**

# **Cell Phone Safety**

Top Ten Tips for Teens

1. Only give out your cell phone number to people you know for sure you can trust.

**2.** Do not take any cell phone pictures or video that are sexual in nature. First off, if they involve nudity or partial nudity, they are illegal and classified as child pornography - a felony offense in most states. The intent of the parties does not matter, nor does whether permission was granted. Secondly, they have the tendency to get into the hands of the wrong people. Think about your reputation.

3. Do not send texts or capture pictures or video on your cell phone that you wouldn't feel comfortable sharing with your parents.

**4.** Ask yourself how you'd feel if the text you sent or the picture or video you captured were broadcast all across the school, and all across the Internet. Even if you personally don't send it around, others can and often do.

**5.** Remember that all of the text, photos, and videos you create with your phone are saved and available as **digital evidence**. They are either stored on the servers of your cell phone provider, or on your cell phone provider's web site in your individual web-accessible account, or on the flash memory or SIM card of your phone and on other phones - even if you have deleted them.

**6.** Schools can take your cell phone when they have reasonable suspicion that it has been involved in some violation of school policy or the law.

**7.** Never text and drive. No text is worth losing your life over, or taking someone else's. If something is urgent, pull the vehicle over to a safe place before dealing with it.

**8.** Remember that having a cell phone is a privilege and not a right. Treat it as such. Appreciate that your parents have allowed you to have one (and often purchased it for you), and you'll earn more of their respect. Many youth have sabotaged their future (e.g., admission into college, scholarships, job opportunities, legal problems and costs, criminal prosecution, being placed on sex offender registries) because they have misused computers or cell phones. It is NOT worth it.

<u>**13 year old Female from Florida**</u> Some random guy was texting me and was asking me weird questions. I was scared. I told my mom and we called the cops.

**9.** Don't respond to text messages from numbers and people you don't know. Learn how you can block certain individuals (via their cell phone numbers) from contacting you. Don't subject yourself unnecessarily to people who are mean to you when you can keep them from sending you any messages.

**10. Keep your cell phone keypad locked** (and the PIN or password safe and private), so that others can't grab it, unlock it, and use it to get you into trouble when you're not looking.
