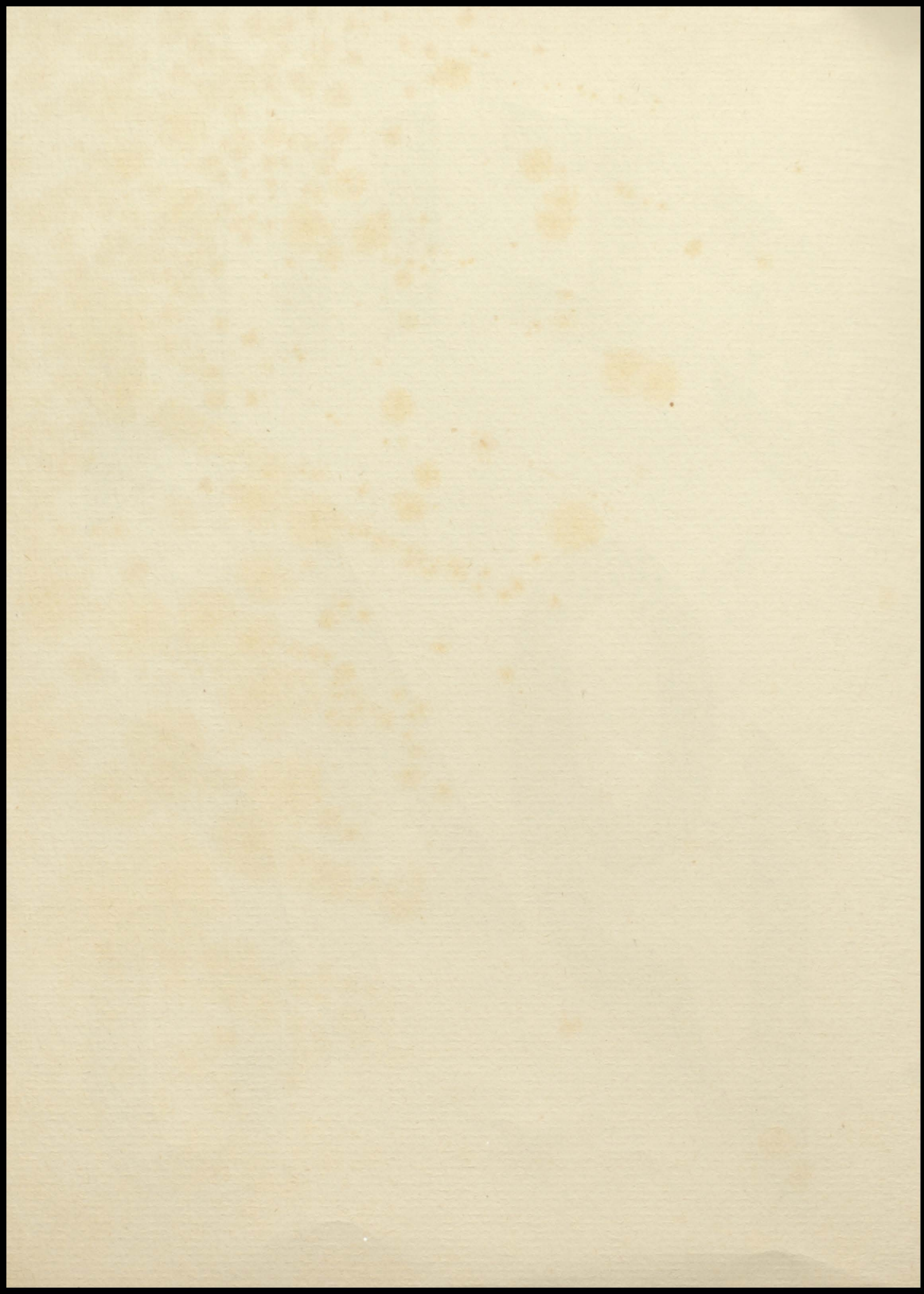

Mrs. Thorp and Miss Marion entertained next in honor of Mrs. Schick who left us before Christmas to live in Johnson City where her husband is now employed.

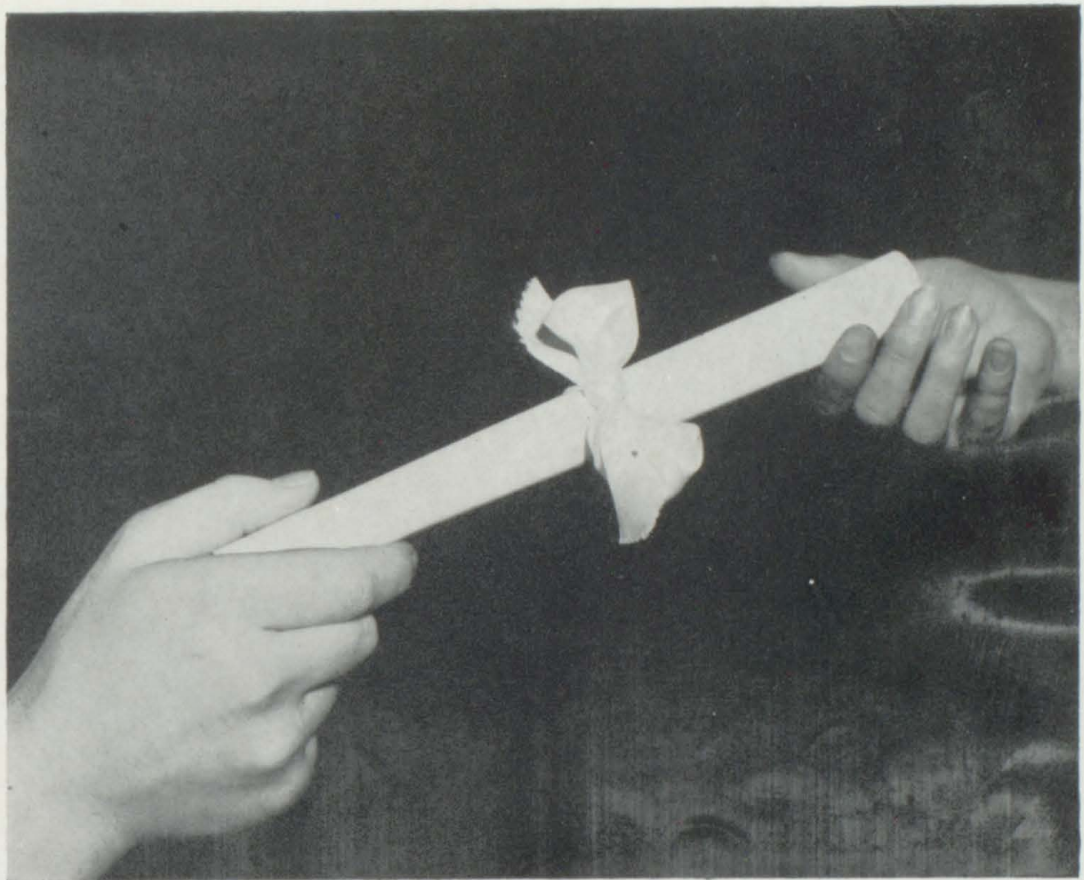

"CLASS OF 1948"

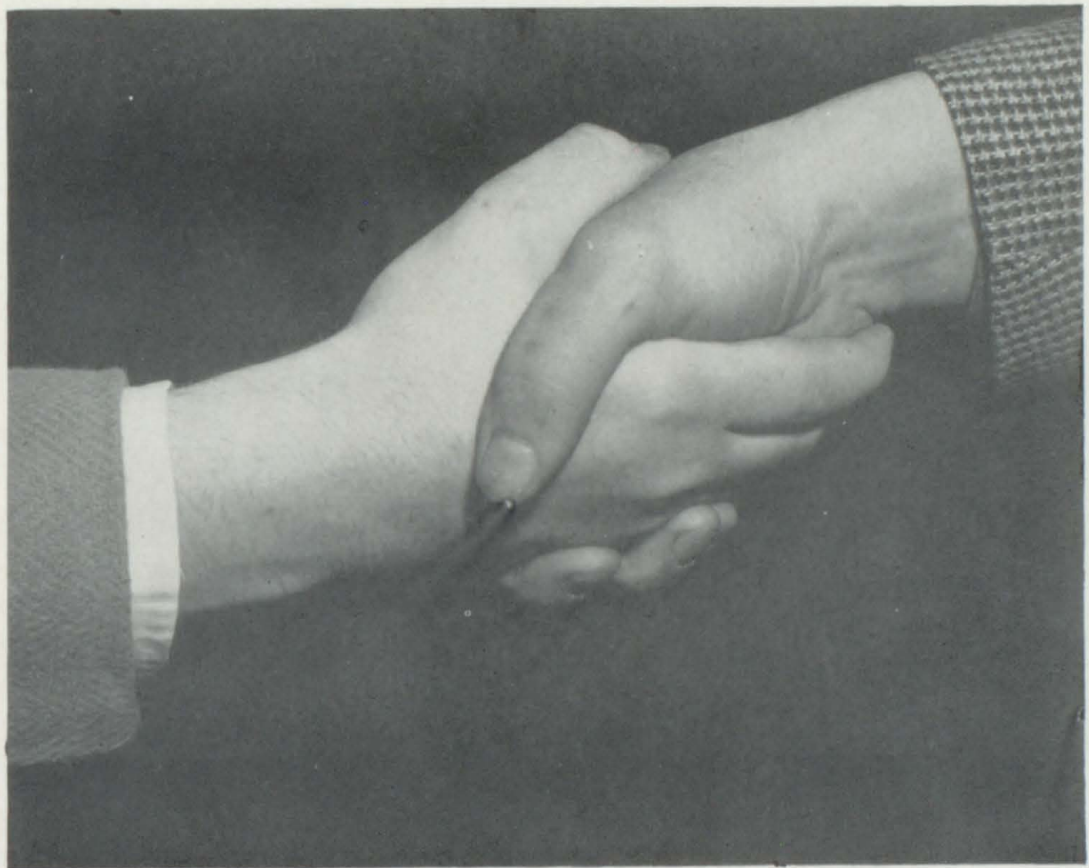

FOOTBALL

The first practice was called the fifth of September. The first two weeks of practice were very mild due to the lack of equipment. During the third week of practice Rex Thornton fractured his collar bone which prevented him from playing in any of the games.

Captain Albert Carpenter played all the back field positions at one time or another and developed into an outstanding backfield player.

John Sejerson won himself a "first string" center position and was very outstanding on the defense.

Stephen Smith was another good backfield man playing left halfback and quarterback.

The all-star game was played at Deposit under the lights. The players chosen from Bainbridge were Al Carpenter, Steve Smith, Don Simonds, John Sejerson, Jack Lord. Our team played very well with Al Carpenter making a touchdown. Bud Lee, Hanford Engel and Jack Lord and Don Sundstrom broke into the starting line-up late in the season and showed considerable improvement. Don Simonds starting at right end played a very outstanding game against Deposit scoring our only touchdown. The team had a very drastic season winning none and losing six.

BASKETBALL 1945 - 1946

Up to and including February 8th Bainbridge is leading the Duration League with nine wins in ten games. The Jayvees have won five and lost five. In two non-league games the varsity won one and lost one. The Jayvees won two. Varsity scores were 22-27 with Guilford winning and a 43-41 win over Chenango Forks. The Jayvees won 30-18 and 30-46.

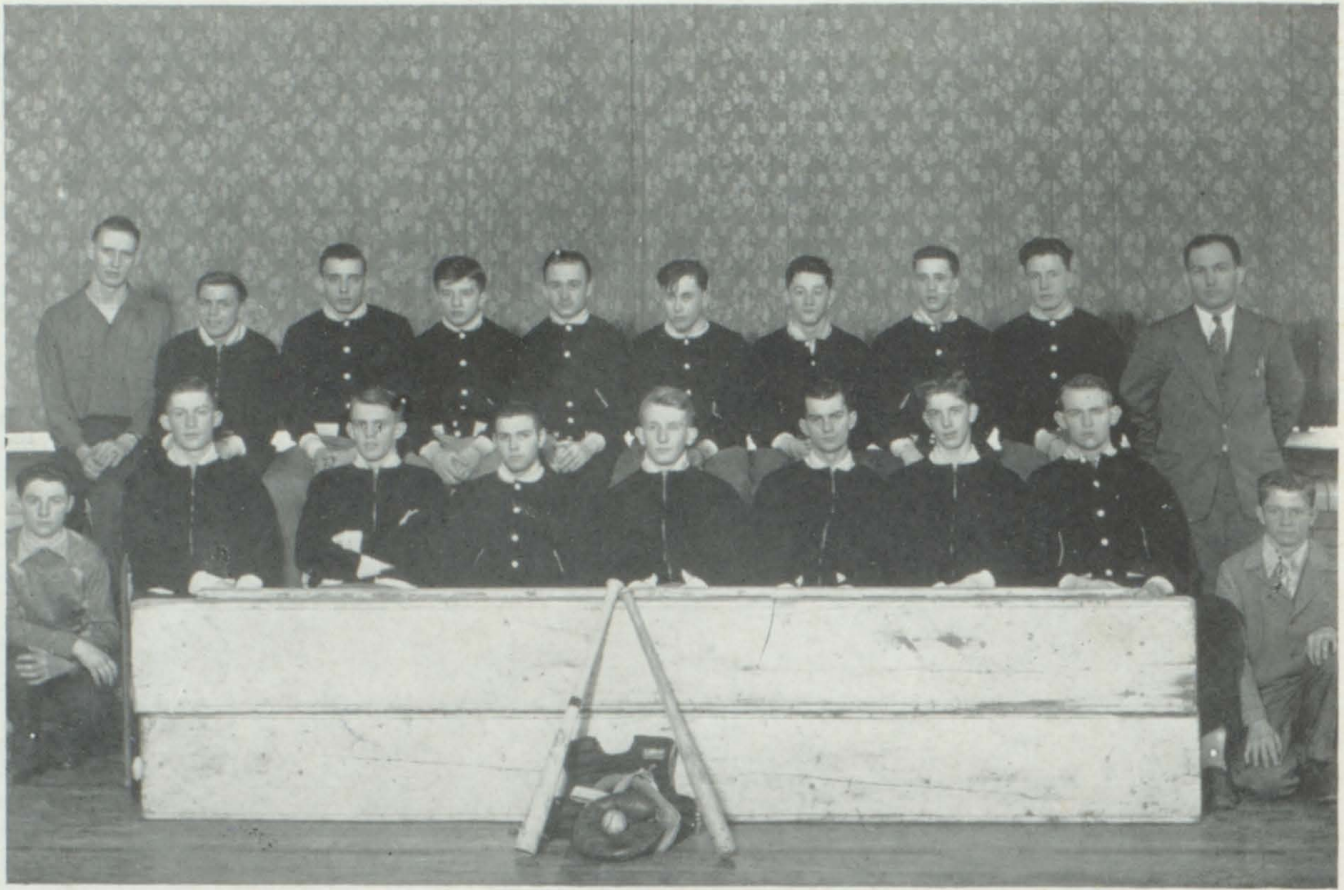
Captain John Sherman has done a good job leading the team. Two Jayvee members were moved up to the Varsity to replace D. Taft and E. Rowe who left for the armed forces. These two players were Cliff Wade and Karl Salzberg.

In our first and eighth league games we beat Deposit twice, first 28-25 and then 30-29. The Jayvees lost 18-19 and 17-47. Afton lost twice 40-21 and 40-32 as the Bainbridge Jayvees lost 24-30 and 29-43. Harpursville lost two Varsity games 44-27 and 51-21, Jayvees 34-14 and 42-24.

Other league scores are: Varsity 24-16 over Greene, 35-32 over Sidney, 32-29 over and a 35-45 loss to Hancock. Jayvees 29-10 over Greene, 31-34 loss to Sidney, 21-19 over Windsor and 34-23 over Hancock.

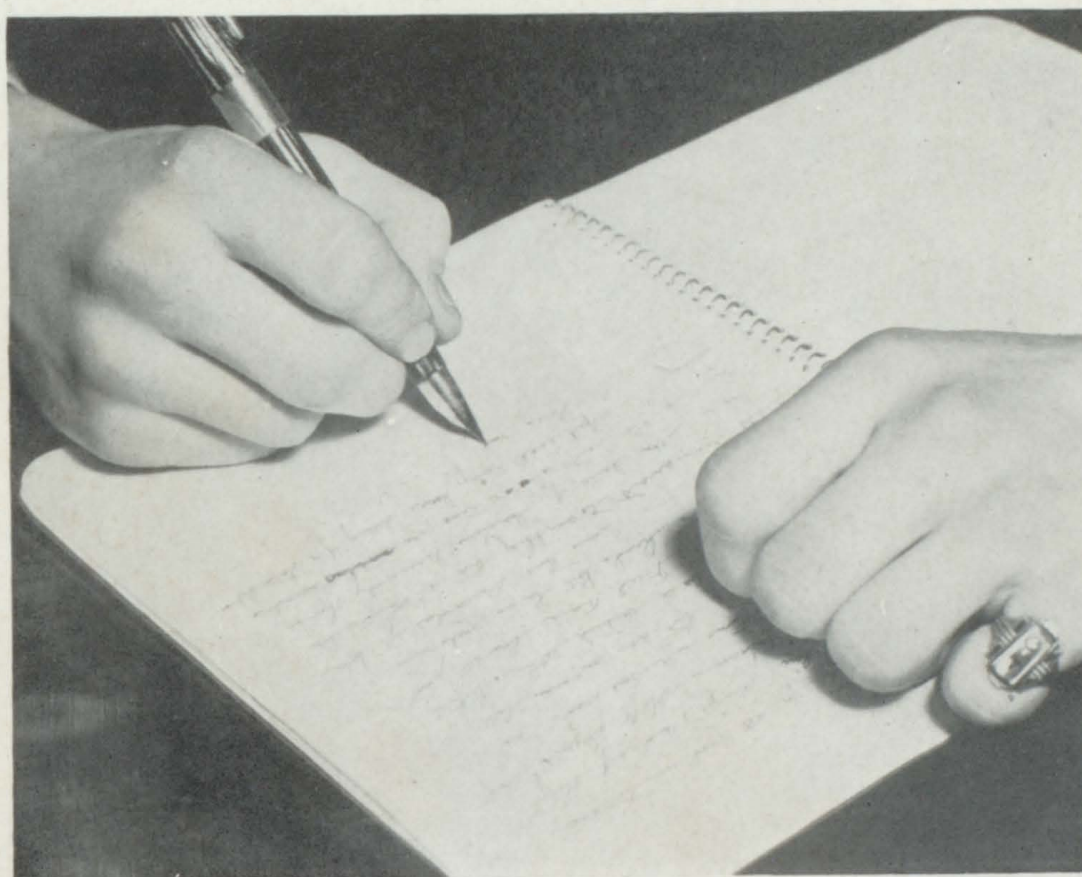

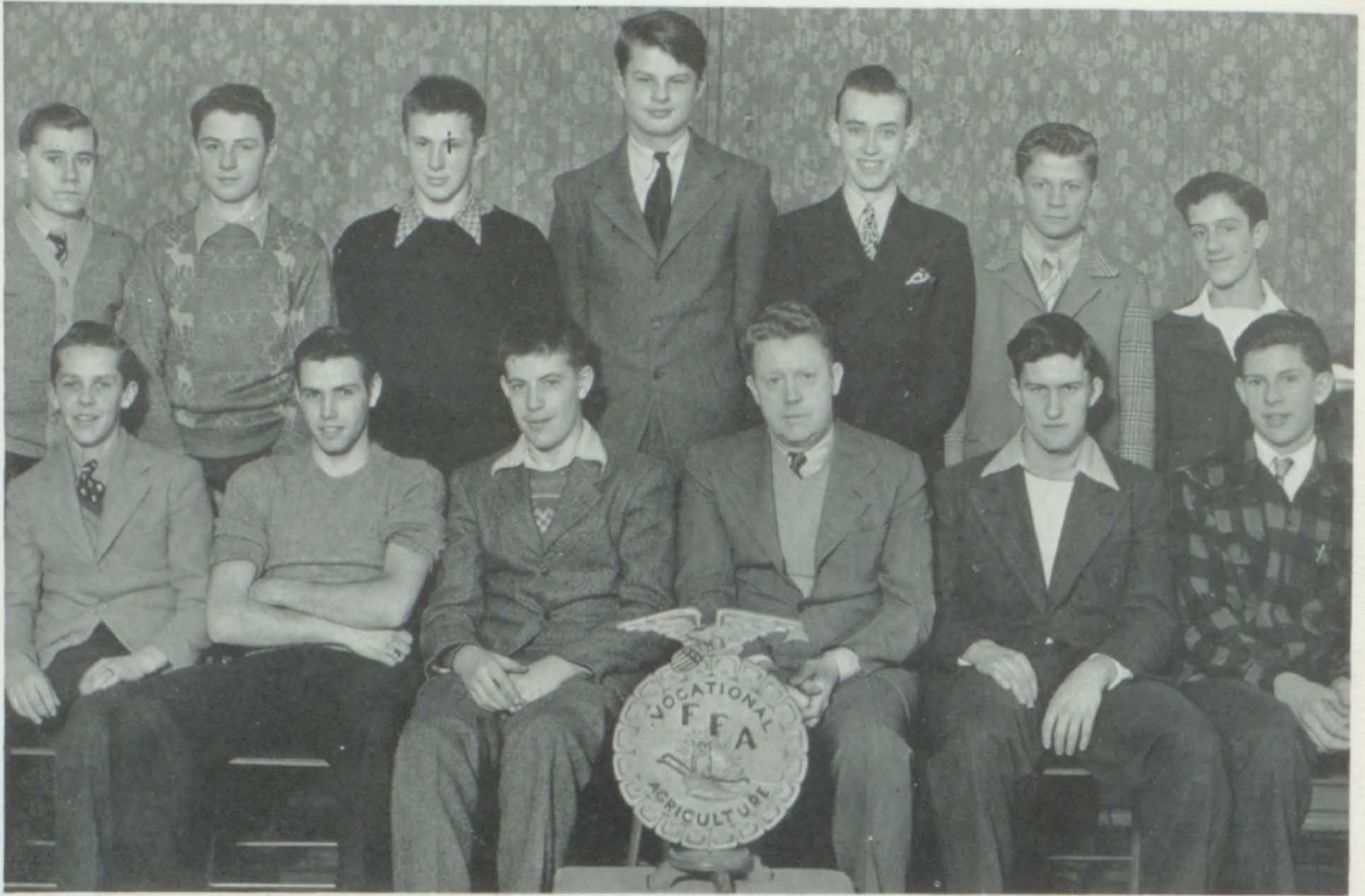
