




Now we are making our plans for our Senior Trip. We plan to leave the 7th of April and enjoy a week in New York City.

Twice a week the music teachers have either vocal music or rhythm band. Occasional walks and trips into the community furnish material for art, story telling, reading, activities and projects.



The second game, however, was dropped to the stronger Afton team. We then had a winning streak for the next two games with Chenango Forks and Whitney Point.






DRAMATIC CLUB





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
