She has become very old in appearance, but in earlier years she was a very attractive woman.

But when she did appear she did so with all the booming bomblast of the stage mother she portrayed. (She never did learn to say "grotesque" or "perambulater". Her strategically pitched voice was accompanied with an occasional giggle or gaffaw.

The second act always moved much too slow...but with much prodding and coaxing from the director, Jimmy finally kissed me...then, after a while he even retook these lines. Barbara and I never quite got through our fight scene without a giggle-spasm or the forgetting of lines. And we were always in fear that our oversize cups on our undersize saucers would slip, slide or fall with a resounding crash...

The "lawn" never was tacked down enough, thus everyone on stage tripped, letting out a stream of makeshift words in a steady flow (quite freely) aimed, as usual, at the production crew. And, then of course there was the time that the mats weren't tacked down at all-what happened?? My hoops pushed the chair, the chair pushed the grass, the grass slid, and I ended on the floor---exit Josie.

Then, Jimmy always had his little joke of coming into the act, or in the middle of an ardent love scene or violent fight scene and saying calmly, "Tennis anyone"? And Barbara Besaw never could stand still long enough for Jerry to make love to her. This perplexed Jerry to no end.

None of us shall ever forget the job that Johnnie Jones had substituting an English accent for his Southern accent. Or the times that Dick Jones had to retake entrances because his nose wasn't high enough.

Never before in anything else I had ever been in had we had the unsuspected action that we had in this production. This time the tables were turned, the boy's lipstick always came off on the girls (they didn't blot it). The love scenes always brought a becoming shade of scarlet to all concerned. The rugs always slipped, the fences were always insecure, the backdrop was always being raised or lowered because of contrary ideas concerning whether it should be used or not... then it happened!!! a member of the production crew wanted to be extra saving, so-o-o she mixed some oil with white lead and proceeded to give the freshly painted fences a coat of the mixture to serve as their second coat of paint. What a mess... Results? almost murder!!

The ninteenth finally arrived, the play produced, with of course the mistakes that must always appear to make the evening complete. It came off on schedule with a few non-script happenings. A fence fell over on to the footlights. Someone forgot to remove the pictures from my makeshift diary, a watering can was knocked over, and a side light broke throwing its shield whizzing by Pauline's ear-But she was a real trooper. She simply put on her shoes (which she had removed for the comforts of home), picked up her chair, moved it to a safer distance and proceeded to go on prompting the actors.

Result of the whole ordeal? Everyone tired-everyone enjoyed doing the play-But thank heaven it's over.

WHO WANTS TO BE A FARMER?

A good job for anyone, who likes to be his own boss, is farming. A farmer has no one to answer to, as one would have if he were working in a factory or some other business. Farming is a job for the man who likes to work outdoors, and who also likes working with animals. The larger part of the farmers' year is spent outdoors either preparing the soil for planting or reaping the harvest. The remainder of his year he spends taking care of his cows, chickens and what ever else he might have. But, farming has its difficult parts also. "A farmer's work is never done;" this is most true as I have found from experience. A farmer "gets up with the chickens"—some times earlier—and usually goes to bed a good deal later. The modern farmer has more free time than did the farmers of the past but still not as much as a person who works his eight hours and is through. The free time he does have is often spent on something concerning the farm and other times is spent watching television or perhaps going to the local school to a class play, etc. This life may seem hard, but for the man who enjoys it, it seems easy.

A boy can learn some of the fine points of farming in his high school. Most schools have a four year agricultural course for those who are interested. After high school there is a chance for the young men to go to college if they want. They can take either a two year or a four year course at Cornell, a State College, with tuition free, or at Delhi, a State technical institute, also tuition free. This encourages many boys to go to college when they otherwise might not go.

Another "school" for boys is experience. Experience is said to be the best teacher, and the best way to get experience is to work on a farm. A high school boy can easily get a job on a farm during the summer and even during school time. It is also possible to work one's way through college by working on a nearby farm. This way it is possible to gain experience on the farm as well as the classroom. After graduating from school, the ex-student can get a steady job as a farm worker for a couple of years to gain even more on-the-spot experience as a farmer before he buys his own farm.


This leads to another thought; a young man can save his earnings to put a down payment on a dairy farm or buy a small chicken farm which costs less and makes it possible to increase the beginning capital if the young farmer is a good manager. Starting off with a small farm will help the beginner know whether or not he is capable of continuing and in which type of farming he is more interested. Dairy farming is harder to get started in than chicken farming because of the large amount of capital required to get started. The main investment is in the cattle because they cost from \$ 300 to \$ 500 each. The equipment runs a close second if the farmer plans to have a good farm. The earnings of a farmer depend upon how good a farm he has, and how well he manages it and makes it pay.

A farmer can have as many luxuries as any other person. Many farmers have new cars and television sets; their work is made easier by modern farm equipment; such as, tractor, combines, and field choppers. Their profits are usually enough to put their children through college and to make their own life, as they grow older, easy and happy.
