









Our class advisors are Mr. Crandall, Miss Baker, Mrs. Corbin, and Mrs. Doyle.







We are looking forward to the traditional Cooperstown trip which we will be taking in June.






AND FOR YOUR SAFETY — THE FIRE SQUAD












The doors of B.C.H.S. were opened to the public for another Open House in May 20, 1957. All the teachers were on hand to talk with the parents.




WRESTLING SHOWS INCREASED POPULARITY





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
