
Those Untroubled Teens!


The Seniors Reminisce

Finn's Story

I was always interested in life in America, because my father had been there and told me all about it. My last year of high school we had a boy from Maryland stay in my home for seven weeks. He told me many interesting things that made me want to be an exchange student also.

At first I sent my biography and school record to Copenhagen, then my family and I were interviewed by a group of 8 people from all walks of life, such as teachers, bankers, etc. They had me speak English for them and had me tell them of my activities, at school and out.

After a wait of 2 to 3 months, I received a letter that informed me I was to go to the United States. A week after that I received a letter with the address and town. It hardly seemed possible that I would be going so far away.

From a group numbering 475, it was narrowed down to 150, of which 108 came to the United States.

I have not regretted coming to America, because everyone has treated me very well. I realize now that everything my father said was true. My classmates have made me feel so welcome.

I was very seasick on the way over, about three days. During that time I only ate apples and tea. Otherwise I enjoyed the crossing immensely. People from all over Europe were on board. The crossing took 10 days altogether.

When I arrived in New York, Mr. and Mrs. Day and Art Hager were waiting to greet me. I was pretty excited.

I had a very pleasant trip up, there was much scenery, and I was amazed at all the cars, both on the road and in used car lots. In that trip alone, I saw more big cars than I have ever seen in Denmark. We teenagers in Denmark have cars too, but mostly we ride bicycles.

I arrived in Bainbridge August 19. I had never been in a swimming pool before and enjoyed it very much.

I have had many pleasant experiences in America, meeting many new friends. I enjoy the people here very much, they are kind to me.

When I go back home, I will have many pleasant memories to take back to my family and friends.

My classmates here remind me so much of my friends at home. It is good to know that young people all over the world have so much in common.








Mrs. Butler will always be remembered with the highest regard in Bainbridge. She was not only a wonderful teacher and friend of her students, but was also active in affairs of her community.








Paul Hager accepting Echo Plaque from Mrs. Kinney, yearbook advisor.


Baccalaureate Sets the Stage for Graduation

This religious ceremony is always a touching one as the forerunner to graduation. Floral decorations handled by the Juniors added a lovely summer touch to the scene.


