Superintendent's Message

Spring is here! Even after a mild winter the district is ready for spring! With the winter so mild, the district had six unused Emergency Closing days built into this year's calendar. The district did decide to "use" two days, Monday, March 11 and Monday, April 8 and the weather necessitated a day on Thursday, March 21, 2024. This still leaves the district with three Emergency Closing days left, if needed.

A question I have received a few times is does the district have to give back unused days. Technically no, however, the state and local bargaining units determine the length of the school year. Districts cannot exceed 186 days, and some bargaining unit contracts only allow for 182 workdays.

With the end of winter comes the busiest time of the school year! Spring sports have started, budget season is upon us, plans are underway for graduation and prom, and our current Capital Project is commencing. During this year's budget hearing on May 14, 2024, I will review the scope of the Capital Project and discuss the phases and timeline for construction.

In the coming weeks please look for more information on the school budget in the district newsletter. I will also be discussing the budget in the local newspapers and my coffee in May. The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is YOUR district and I welcome your involvement in this process.

Congratulations to our graduating seniors. This time of year is bittersweet for us. We are excited for our students to head off to college, or a career or the military, but we will miss all that they have brought to us as a bobcat. The district is confident our students are graduating college and career ready.

A Message from the Jr.-Sr. High School Principal

We are approaching the end of the third quarter of the school year. This year has been good. We have had a mild winter, and the majority of our students are doing well academically and behaviorally. Outside of the school day, many students are taking advantage of the many extracurricular activities B-G has to offer. Additionally, students are using our Fitness Center both during the day, in Physical Education classes, and after school with their sport teams or just staying after to work out.

As we move towards the end of the school year, there are three things we would like to ask for help with; support of our expectations at sporting events, refraining from texting/calling your son and/or daughter during the school day, and speaking to your son and/or daughter that the use of AI (Artificial Intelligence) to complete school work is cheating.

Though our winter sports seasons have ended, I feel compelled to revisit our last home Boy's Basketball Game. Unfortunately, we lost to Marathon in the first round of sectional play. However, a bigger disappointment, was the behavior of a few of our fans and then the reaction by a few adults. We at B-G want and encourage our students to CHEER for all our teams, players, and coaches. This is reviewed at the start of school in grade level meetings and presented to our students that we want our student cheering section to be LOUD, PROUD, and POSITIVE! Negative comments are not acceptable and go against the philosophy and concept of good sportsmanship. We want the outcome of contests to be decided by the abilities and preparation of our athletes and their teams and not by fans affecting the other team through negative comments, noise, or actions. At all times we want our Bobcats to demonstrate and model participation with class. JEERING is strongly deterred and against our rules thus we will continue to address these situations and work to squelch such behavior as it is unbecoming and goes against the purpose and goals of high school athletics.

Parents and guardians, though our cell phone policy is one where students are allowed to have their phones during the day with each teacher administering cell phone rules/policies specific to their classroom, we need your help. We have had a major problem with students texting their parents/guardians to go home during the school day

for whatever reason. Students should not be going home except for excused reasons such as illness, medical or dental appointments, or bereavement purposes. For illness situations, students need to go to the school nurse, Ms. Seymour, and she will decide whether the student should go home. At that time, the parent/guardian would be contacted by our nurse to arrange a ride home. Additionally, please refrain from texting students during the school day. Students are in classes most all day and should be focused on their learning and doing schoolwork rather than their cell phones.

Finally, with the everchanging world of technology, we now have Artificial Intelligence (AI) that can generate written word, spoken word, and even visual images and video. There are many AI programs that are being used by students to write essays or do their schoolwork. The problem with use of AI is that it is not our students' thoughts, ideas, or learned information but that of a computer. Anything generated by AI is a substitute to what our students have learned or know. It is cheating and an obstacle for us as educators in determining what our students have learned and what are their true abilities. Our students do not seem to see the use of AI as cheating but rather an easy way to complete their work. In the future we as a district will be developing policies specific to AI. However, for now, please discuss the inappropriateness of using AI for schoolwork and that it is viewed as cheating.

As spring is upon us, we will need your support to monitor and push your child(ren) to keep working hard. Please positively support our athletes. Please refrain from texting your son and/or daughter during the school day. Also, please speak to your son and/or daughter about AI.

The end of the school year is near, and we want all students to finish strong. State Assessments will be occurring now through June. Regents Exams may be a requirement for graduation thus students need to take them seriously. AP Exams occur in May and with good outcomes can lead to students earning college credit. With good attendance and good effort our students will be well prepared for their state assessments.

Guilford student's tasted maple fluff and syrup, took a seat in the bulldozer, learned about reverse osmosis, and how much work it takes to collect sap from a tree and turn it into syrup. Each class then went home with maple syrup for their classroom. Following their sessions, seniors were invited to a catered lunch at the Bainbridge Community Center. Staff reported


that they had a great time interacting with their students in a new way and students said the day was informational, fun and that it was cool to learn things outside of academics from their teachers.




SCHOOL BUS SAFETY TIPS

School bus transportation is safe.

In fact, buses are safer than cars! Even so, last year, approximately 26 students were killed and another 9,000 were injured in incidents involving school buses. More often than not, these deaths and injuries didn't occur in a crash, but as the pupils were entering and exiting the bus.



STAY AWAY from the bus until it comes to a complete stop and the driver signals you to enter.

PLACE TO WAIT for your bus, away from traffic and the street.

KEEP A SAFE DISTANCE

between you and the bus. Also, remember that the bus driver can see you best when you are back away from the bus.

BE AWARE of the street traffic around you. Drivers are required to follow certain rules of the road concerning school buses, however, not all do.

WHEN BEING DROPPED OFF,

exit the bus and walk ten giant steps away from the bus.

USE THE HANDRAIL to enter and exit the bus.


