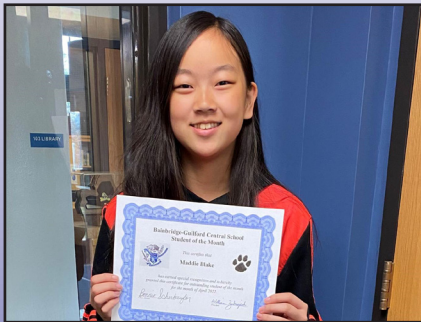

Dairy Science Students visit Hanehan's Farm

On May 6 Dairy Science students attended a field trip to Hanehan Family Dairy Farm. Hanehan's is a family farm with 2,600 head of cattle. They have one of the longest barns in the state at 1180 feet long. In 2018 the farm moved its milking method from a double 10 with milking 900 cows to a carousel parlor. Students were able to see how ergonomic the milking methods were and how happy the cows were.

As part of the tour, Hanehan's pointed out how they try to recycle all the water they use while milking to prevent waste and how their cattle are grouped based on age and milking production. As part of the tour the class was able to see the newborn calves. Rachel, our tour guide, told us there are about 110 calves drinking milk at any given time.

Hanehan's also does direct sales of pumpkins and corn so be on the lookout this summer!

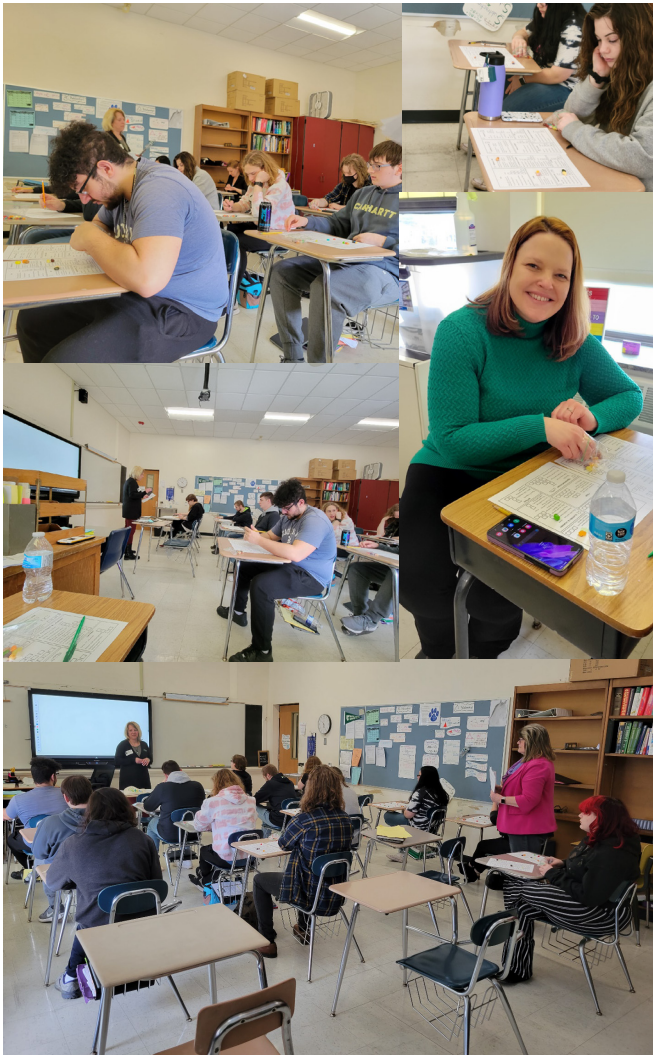
SFCU provides a Financial Education/Wellness Program, free of charge to area school districts.

TC3 Living Environment Class Experiments with Planaria

The TC3 Living Environment students experienced a unique research opportunity this year as a result of cooperation between Dr. Carrie Adler's lab at Cornell University



and the TC3 Concurrent Enrollment Biology program. Dr. Adler's lab studies regeneration in planarian flatworms, which are animals that have the ability to regrow parts of their bodies when they are injured. One of the mechanisms the lab uses to understand regeneration is RNA interference, which prevents normal regeneration.

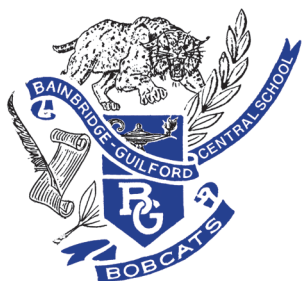
Students in the TC3 class followed a research protocol designed by the Adler Lab, using materials and planarians provided by the lab. Their goal was to compare regeneration after injury in a control group and an experimental group. The experimental group was fed liver containing an inhibitor that prevents production of a protein that controls formation of the tail in a worm when it regenerates. As a result, everywhere the worm is injured it grows a new head. The students are working on lab write-ups to share the results of their research.
