Message from the Superintendent!

Recently, the District found out that our very own Bainbridge-Guilford High School is ranked 208th within New York! There are approximately 1,200 public high schools in the State. Statewide, students have the opportunity to take Advanced Placement coursework and exams. The AP participation rate at Bainbridge-Guilford High School is 35% and our graduation rate for last year was 92%. A huge thank you to all district staff, our B-G families, and the students for achieving this honor. We are proud of you!

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District has enjoyed welcoming back all students to five days per week instruction. Starting in April, B-G halls were again buzzing with students on campus each weekday. This has been very uplifting for the students, staff and families in the B-G community.

This has been a tremendous effort by the administration and staff. Our number one goal is to keep our students and staff safe, and we will continue to adhere to the strict safety guidelines that we have in place. All COVID protocols will continue to be enforced.

The social/emotional well-being of our students and staff are a top priority. This has been a tremendously difficult year for everyone and any bit of support and “normalcy” the District can offer is of the utmost importance. In order to fill

any academic gaps created during the pandemic, B-G will be offering summer school this July for students in grades K-8. Summer school will run from Tuesday, July 6-29 with no Friday classes.

Budget season is winding down. The District and Board of Education would like to thank the entire Bainbridge-Guilford School Community for their continuing support of the school budget. This has been an extremely difficult budget year with the unexpected costs surrounding COVID amounting to a whopping \$252,000!

In recent weeks you might have heard of the stimulus funds coming to school districts. While there is a specified amount coming to each district, the funds are grant-based and **do not** impact the general fund budget. The funds will be used to supplement the budget, NOT supplant. More information will be forthcoming as it becomes available as well as a community forum to let people weigh in on spending ideas for these funds.

Graduation will be upon us shortly. More details will be forthcoming as the June 26 date gets closer.

Please take the time to enjoy the summer season and thank you all for your flexibility during this difficult year.

2021 Town of Bainbridge Recreation Programs

The Town of Bainbridge will be resuming their summer youth programs this summer after not offering these programs last summer due to Covid-19. The Playground Summer Program will again be offered at the Greenlawn Elementary School in conjunction with the free breakfast and lunch program. Children ages 5-10 years are eligible to participate. In this program children will be fed free breakfast and lunch along with playing games inside and outside, using playground equipment, arts and crafts and other assorted activities. Children can be dropped off at 8:30 a.m. and must be picked up by 12:00 noon. This program will run from June 28 thru August 6. Parents may sign up their children at the Bainbridge Town Clerk's Office or bring their children to the program and sign up there. The cost for this program is \$20 per student.

The Bainbridge Town Pool will also resume swimming lessons and family swim time. The opening day and swimming times will be posted on the Bainbridge Town Facebook page when they have been finalized. The fee for swimming lessons is \$20 for Bainbridge residents and \$25 for non-residents. There is no fee for free swimming times.

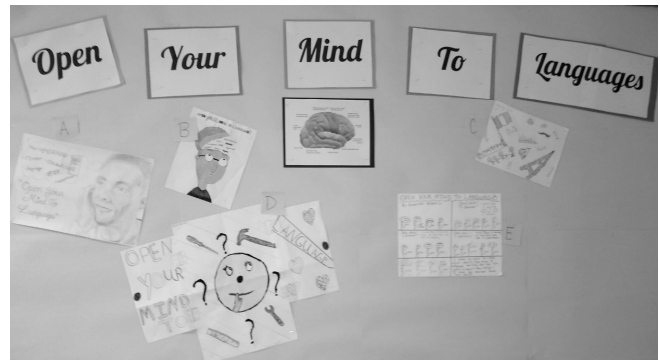

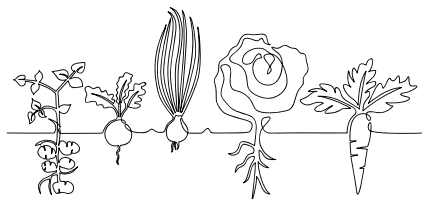

The Odyssey of the Mind program was a success at Bainbridge-Guilford for the 2020-21 school year. Odyssey of the Mind is a creative problem solving competition. The program is offered to all interested students at the Greenlawn Elementary School and at the Jr./Sr. High School. We had five teams that endured many struggles and persevered this year, as competitions were not held in person. All NYS competitions were done virtually. Teams had to create their solutions, record them and then submit them online to NYSOMA, along with all their paperwork and description of the team's solution. These solutions were scored for both regional and state competition. Bainbridge-Guilford had the most teams represented at our region 13 competition. Thank you to all the teams and coaches for working through the struggles of this year and representing us so well.

The Odyssey program divides students into different divisions based on their ages. We had one team competing at the Division I level, which is open to students in grades K-5. Mrs. Cuozzo's team selected Problem 3—Classics... OMER and the Beanstalk. Odyssey of the Mind gives the description of the problem. *Storybooks come alive when a special bean grows into a magic "beanstalk" that takes*

a youngster into a storybook land. There, a creative host will guide them around as they meet different storybook characters and encounter objects from selected stories that exist together in this mystical land. 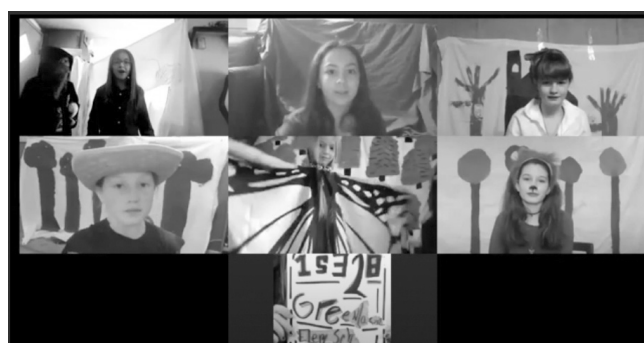

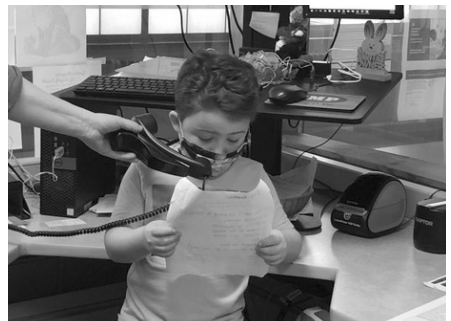
GREENLAWN NEWS!
