

Superintendent Message

Timber! In previous *Blue and White* newsletters I wrote about the District harvesting the timber on our Searles Hill property. We have retained forester Mike Gray to lead us in this process. At this point it has been determined that there is about 70,000 board feet of harvestable lumber. The stand of trees is predominantly red oak. We are at the point now of accepting bids and continue to move forward with this exciting endeavor. Please look for additional information in upcoming issues of the *Blue and White*.

Our work on the District's capital project continues. We are currently fine tuning plans for the new fitness center, determining the effect of the upcoming project on summer activities and student placement, and submitting architectural plans to New York State for approval. We are being told that work should commence later this coming spring and will last for approximately two years. Upcoming community coffees, Board of Education meetings and newsletters will be used to keep you informed of progress with this project.

On Friday, January 12 we held a celebration in the Jr.-Sr. High School gymnasium for our New York State Champion Volleyball team. Team members were presented with jackets, Coach Tami Selfridge received a plaque for being named Section 4 Coach of the year and team captains **Miranda Anderson** and **Abigail Selfridge** unveiled the state champion banner which will now hang in the gymnasium. The entire BG community is very proud of our volleyball team.

I would like to recognize and thank the Raymond Corporation in Greene. Raymond is donating welding stanchions and equipment so that we can offer welding courses to our students in grades 9-12. It is our hope this will begin second semester for our students. The students and staff are very excited for this new program and none of this would be possible without the generosity of both the Raymond Corporation and the continued support of The Amphenol Corporation in Sidney for their generosity to our students over the years.

It is almost time again for the New York State Assessments for students in grades 3-8. The past few years BG has had about 30% of our students district-wide *opt-out* of taking these tests. Unfortunately, this then creates data that is skewed and not as useful for the district. The school uses this data to help in determining gaps in student learning, the formation of our RTI tier groups and academic support classes, as well as the purchase of educational support materials. I have talked with many parents and understand the concerns associated with these assessments. New York State has shortened the length of the tests and decreased the number of days and tried to listen to parent and teacher concerns. Please continue to involve the District in your decision if you choose to opt your child out.

The school year seems to fly by so quickly. We continue to keep the Palmatier family in our thoughts over the loss of their son, Brandon. Please reach out with any questions, suggestions or concerns you might have. My email is *tryan@bgcsd.org* and on Twitter *@Timothy88346075*.

We are also moving forward with training our teachers to utilize Google Classroom, which allows students to collaborate in real-time within the learning environment. We have also piloted several classes, where students are already engaging with this technology. It is our goal to provide the best technology available in order to move our entire educational community into the 21st century, as well as prepare students for college and careers of the future. A Message from the Jr.-Sr. High School Principal

We are very excited and proud to acknowledge our Varsity Girls' Volleyball Team who became the first B-G team to win a State Championship. Our Girls' Varsity Volleyball Team amassed a match record of 17 wins to 1 loss, they were Tournament Champions at the Dryden Tournament, finished first in the silver division of the Union-Endicott Tournament, finished second overall at the Johnson City Tournament and placed second overall at the Windsor Tournament. The team was also MAC League Champions, Section IV Class D Champions, Regional Class D Champions and in the end won the New York State Class D Championship by beating Panama three games to one in the State Tournament held in Glens Falls in November.

At the State tournament, Erica Selfridge and Alexis Carr were selected to the Class D State Tournament Team and Abigail Selfridge was selected as the Tournament Most Valuable Player for Class D. For season play, Abigail and Erica Selfridge achieved first team Class D All-State Status and Zamira Caldwell achieved third team All-State Status. Our Volleyball team is coached by head coach Tami Selfridge along with volunteer coach Cadi Barber. Ms. Selfridge was recently recognized as the Section IV Girls' Volleyball Coach of the year. The members of the State Championship Team include: Miranda Anderson, Bree Barber, Zamira Caldwell, Alexis Carr, Samantha Ceresna, Kristen Chambers, Makenna Clark, Makenna Cole, Marissa Cuozzo, Mckeyli Decker, Makenzie Drown, Leah Gregory, Sasha Lamoree, Taylor Parsons, Abigail Selfridge and Erica Selfridge. Additionally, the team earned New York State Public High School Athletic Association Scholar Team Status by our team having enough of our players earning a 90 or higher overall Grade Point Average (GPA). All our players had over a 90 (GPA) with a team average of 98.

When the team won the State Title, upon their return from Glens Falls, the town and community gave them a Lights and Sirens parade led by the Bainbridge Fire Department and the New York State Police with many people greeting the team and enjoying pizza at the soccer field parking lot as the first significant snow fell from the sky. Our school also held a pep rally on Friday, January 12 to celebrate the team's remarkable accomplishments and to unveil a State Championship Banner and a Podium to display their State Championship Plaque. The banner now hangs in our main gymnasium and the plaque will be displayed inside the main entrance to the school. We are extremely proud of our State Championship Team, Players and Coaches!

District-wide, we proudly announce the grand opening of the *Bobcat Boutique*. Each of our buildings officially opened their branch of the boutique on January 2.

The *Bobcat Boutique* is a room at each building where all students can *shop* for clothes as well as hygiene items at the High School and Greenlawn. All items in the boutique are free! At the High School and Greenlawn, the boutique will have established hours for students to shop, along with the availability throughout the day to get items when an emergency arises. At Guilford, staff members will refer students to get items from the boutique.

All items for the boutique have been donated and are new or gently used. Also, we will be cleaning and placing Lost and Found items in the boutique. The Lost and Found collections will be cleared out the last day before breaks—March 23 and the last school day in June.

Finally, any time a student picks up an item from the boutique, they will be given a receipt to make parents aware that the items they are bringing home came from the boutique. We are excited to have these *shops* in each building and we are very passionate about providing this opportunity for our students.

PLEASE CONSIDER BECOMING A MEMBER OF THE B-G BOOSTER CLUB



Attention 8th Grade Students and Parents

Time is quickly approaching when your child will be entering 9th grade and taking high school credit-bearing courses. Several activities will be taking place to help you and your child prepare to make important decisions about high school course selection and planning after high school.

On Wednesday March 7, the Guidance Office will host an 8th grade parent information night at 6:30 p.m. in the High School Auditorium. At this meeting we will discuss requirements for graduation and what options your child has regarding selection of high school courses.

Students will be touring BOCES Harrold Campus in March. The purpose of the field trip is for student to tour the Harrold Technical Education Center and learn about the variety of technical educational programs offered. This visit is helpful for students when considering options for their high school four-year plan. BOCES technical educational

programs are available to student during their junior and senior years of high school.

In mid-March a letter with specific dates and times that guidance counselors will be available to meet with you and your child to develop a four-year plan for high school will be sent home. Guidance staff would like to meet with each student and a parent/guardian individually to develop a four-year plan. The purpose of this plan is to map out what courses your child will take in grades 9-12. The four-year plan is the first step in helping your child make a decision about their plans after high school.

Parental/guardian input and support is essential in helping your child realize their goals. There will be day and evening appointments available. Individual meetings usually last approximately one half hour.

B-G Accepting Pre-K Applications

The Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is accepting applications for its Pre-kindergarten program. Only parents who are District residents with an age-eligible child may apply. To be eligible a child must be 4-years-old prior to December 1, 2018 and cannot be 5-years-old before that date. Applications must be received by 4:00 p.m. Friday, April 20 to be considered for selection. Selection of applicants for the available slots will be determined soon after this date.

Per New York State Regulations, selection for Prekindergarten slots for the 2018-19 school year will be done randomly after all applications have been received by the deadline if more than 36 applications are received. Assuming that State funding will be held at the same level for next year as last year, we will be able to accept a total of 36 students.

Similar to last year, our program will include two full day classes. Both classes are housed in the Guilford Elementary School. Each classroom has a Pre-K teacher and a classroom aide. Our program runs Monday-Friday from 8:05 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Children may not ride school transportation until they become four years old. Parents are responsible for transportation to and from school until their child becomes 4-years-old.

The deadline for all Pre-K applications is 4:00 p.m. Friday, April 20. Applications must be received at the Main Office of the Guilford Elementary School on or before this date. Applications may be picked up at Guilford Elementary or mailed to you upon request. For further information contact the Guilford Elementary School secretary, Kathi Ives at 895-6700.





Alumni Spotlight Miranda Materazzo — BG Class of 2012



Miranda Materazzo is a native daughter to Bainbridge, where she was raised her entire childhood. Her father also went to B-G, and she noted that they even shared some of the same teachers. Throughout her time here, Miranda was actively involved in numerous clubs and activities like the Drama Club and the Yearbook Club. These experiences were the catalyst for her desire to become a journalist: "I think [those activities] helped give me an idea that I

might want to pursue journalism, or at least photography. I knew I wanted to study journalism . . . because it was the kind of job where I would get to write every day." This passion for language showed throughout her high school career, as she excelled in her English classes every year.

I asked Miranda to tell me a bit about her experiences after high school, what opportunities she seized and how she fared socially, transitioning from a smaller school to a larger one. She stated, "I studied Journalism at Ithaca College and even got to do a semester abroad. I can honestly say that it was the coolest four months of my life; I lived in London and visited Paris, Athens, Amsterdam, Edinburgh and Stonehenge!" Miranda added that she made some wonderful friends in college, but that doing so what not without difficulty in the beginning. "It can be a pretty stark contrast from a small high school like B-G, where you may have had the same 50 or 60 classmates since kindergarten" and that clubs and activities were great places for her to "find [her] tribe."

Knowing that journalism is a difficult and competitive field in which to excel, we both knew that her dream job wouldn't fall into her lap. However, Miranda's work ethic, discipline and realistic outlook on achieving success served her well in these years after college. When asked about her post-secondary job experience, she discussed working in food service, which wasn't her field of choice, but it was necessary at the time. One significant learning experience that came of this was that it gave her a new level of respect and appreciation for those who work in service and maintenance fields, knowing that these are demanding jobs in their own right. After graduation, Miranda returned to the comforts of home, as so many college graduates do today, and found herself at ACCO in Sidney, another path that wasn't part of the plan but was necessary. "I also did freelance work for the Tri-Town News during that time. I only made \$25 per article, but it gave me the experience I needed to get the job I currently have. I now work at the Watertown Daily Times, up in the Thousand Islands." Miranda has a keen understanding of the concept that one must start somewhere and through hard work and dedication, earn a place in the higher ranks. In the long term, Miranda hopes to "work at a magazine, where you're usually given time to write really in-depth investigative stories."

To close the interview, I asked Miranda what advice she would give to current B-G high school students. She said this: "enjoy being a student while you can! It sounds cliché, but there really is no other time like it."


B-G Students Display Artwork at Hartwick College



With the bitter cold temperatures in January, it is hard to imagine, but spring is coming soon and with spring comes the New York State ELA and Math tests.

At Greenlawn the 3-6 NYS ELA exam is scheduled for administration April 11 and 12 and the 3-6 NYS Math exam is scheduled for administration May 1 and 2. Greenlawn students have been working diligently with their teachers on curriculum to prepare them for success on the exams as well as their individual goals. The New York State Board of Regents has reduced the number of days of 3-8 testing from three days to two days beginning with the Spring Exams in 2018. This change will allow for students to spend less time testing and more time getting back to their instructional time. The faculty, staff and students encourage each other to work hard on these tests and use them to guide instructional practice and individual goal setting. Students use these results, benchmark data, and academic grades to formulate goals on their individual goal sheets. Using a growth mindset, Greenlawn focuses on student's belief that they can achieve anything and understand that effort makes them stronger.

Greenlawn Supplemental After-School Learning!

- Active engagement and participation in activities
- Appropriate behavior at all times: Inappropriate behavior will result in immediate program dismissal
- Parent pick-up is required at 4:15 p.m.—unless students will be staying for the ASCP

The designated timeframe for goal growth and skill building is Tuesdays and Thursdays, November 28-April 26. ELA and Math skills will be the focus for the length of the entire program. Students will report to the cafeteria for snack at 3:05 p.m. followed by instruction 3:15-4:15 p.m. Students must be picked up at 4:15 p.m. from the Greenlawn lobby. (Unless students will be staying for the ASCP)

TARGETED AREAS

During this program, students and adults will be working together to develop activities to promote growth toward goals, following the targeted areas below:

- Guided and independent practice of passages with multiple choice, short response, and extended/constructed response questions
- Vocabulary review
- Strategy review
- Drill and practice
- Annotation and showing work when solving problems

Snack will be provided. Students will be grouped according to grade level and total participation numbers. If after-school activities are canceled, this program will be canceled as well.


Kinder Assembly at Guilford!
