In addition to taking multiple AP classes throughout her high school career, she has also taken advantage of several concurrent enrollment and online courses offered through

Tompkins Cortland Community College. As a result of her academic achievements, Abbi has maintained a consistent standing on Principal's Honor Roll through all four years of high school, is a current member of the National Honor Society, and will be graduating with over 60 college credits, including an Associate's degree in math and science from Tompkins-Cortland Community College.

Where is spring? It seems like this has been a very long winter for us here in the Bainbridge and Guilford areas. Rest assured, the Farmer's Almanac says spring is coming. We have many exciting things happening at school and I think we are all looking forward to warmer weather.

Our athletes have wrapped up a very successful winter sports campaign. All of our winter sports teams made it to sectional play. Our very own **Cameron Luca** was a member of the NYS Champion Bowling Team, our Boys' Volleyball Team was crowned MAC champions, and our Girls' Basketball Team lost a heartbreaker by two points to Watkins Glen in the Section IV Basketball Tournament Championship. A huge congratulations to our wrestling coach Brandon McNaught for being named the NYS wrestling coach of the year!

Our B-G students are the best! Recently graduation rates for schools in New York State came out and Bainbridge Guilford has a graduation rate of 93.2%. Also, our students with disabilities have a graduation rate of 87.5% and again, B-G is on top in Chenango County and 33rd in the entire State! This is a testament to an amazing staff and great kids.

Spring sports have started, NYS testing will begin shortly and our process for the Capital Outlay project of LED lighting in the Jr.-Sr. HS classrooms has begun. The new lighting should pay for itself after three years. This is one of the many ways the District is moving in the *green* direction. 


### Drama Club News!

## 7 Reasons to Vote on May 16

With all the things you have to do, why should you come to the polls on Tuesday, May 16 to vote on the proposed school budget and cast your ballot in the school board election? Here are seven reasons from the New York State School Boards Association.



### WHY VOTE?

- **Because you can.**

In many nations of the world, and in most states of our union, citizens do not have the right to vote on the spending plans developed by their school districts.

- **Because you set an example.**

The students we serve notice whether or not the adults in their lives exercise their civic responsibilities. We set an example whether or not we vote.

- **Because you control public education.**

You get to decide each year on the quantity and quality of educational programs and services provided in your community.

- **Because you show respect for what educators do.**

Working with all the students that show up is a very difficult challenge. By taking the time to vote, you acknowledge this challenge.

- **Because your response is needed.**

Your school board has developed a spending plan based on input from district employees and community members of budget advisory committees. These folks spent hundreds of hours considering options and making spending decisions for your consideration. Respond by voting.

- **Because public education matters.**

Our public schools educate by far the greatest number of our next generation—those to whom we will be turning over the reins of government and business, and those who will be caring for our generation as we get older.

- **Because your community and its children depend on you.**

The folk wisdom that “it takes a whole community to raise a child” fits here. You share the responsibility to see that all children are educated. While you may not be actually involved with what occurs in classrooms, you can make your opinion known on what happens there by voting.

### “ALL IN FAVOR” CAST YOUR VOTE FOR STUDENT SUCCESS!

Your School Board makes the decisions that determine how your community’s children are educated and how your tax dollars are spent. Voting for school board members is a simple but powerful way to support student success and strengthen your community.

Every child enrolled in the school district is reason for you to vote in school board elections. The overall quality of your local schools, both now and in the future, rests with decisions made by the board of education. You want the best and the brightest of your fellow citizens in charge.

The decisions made by the School Board affect virtually every important aspect of local schools, from boundaries to bus schedules, curriculum to clubs, funding to field trips. Voting in school board elections means your voice is represented in those choices.

Everyone, not just parents, has a stake in the success of public schools. When schools are strong and students succeed, everyone benefits. Voting in a school board election is an investment in the future of kids, of our community and of the nation.

Good school board candidates have the following qualities, skills and experience:

- A vision and goal for academic achievement for all students.
- Understanding that the school board’s role is about the big picture—setting the direction of the district and providing oversight and accountability—not the day to day management.
- Focus on a broad range of school district concerns.
- Personality style to work effectively with other Board members.
- Skills and background that help present diversity of the community.
- Commitment to children. Even in the face of opposition.

Local school board members are elected. A petition with a minimum of 25 signatures must be presented to the District Clerk 30 days before the election date. Candidates must be 18 years old, qualified voters in the school district, and residents of the district continuously for one year. Board members cannot be employed by the Board or live in the same household with a family member of the same school board. For more information on obtaining a petition, contact the District Office.

## Budget Vote/Election Information

### CHANGE IN VOTE LOCATION

Voters in the Bainbridge voting district will cast their ballots at the Greenlawn Elementary School from Noon-9:00 p.m. on May 16, 2017.

### BUDGET HEARING

A budget hearing will be held at the Jr.-Sr. HS Auditorium commencing at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 9, 2017.

### VOTER REGISTRATION

Personal registration of Voters is required for the annual vote. Registration will be held on May 9, 2017 from 2:00-7:00 p.m. at the Greenlawn Elementary School and the Guilford Town Hall. Qualified voters who are registered with the County Board of Elections are eligible to vote without further registration.

### VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

A person shall be entitled to vote on the appointed date for the election of school district officials, and upon all other matters which may be in the form of a referendum, who is:

1. A citizen of the United States.
2. Eighteen years of age.
3. A resident within the district for a period of thirty (30) days next preceding the meeting at which he/she offers to vote.

No person shall be determined ineligible to vote by reason of race, creed, color or sex, who has other qualifications in this section.

### ABSENTEE BALLOTS

A Voter who is registered and who may be unavoidably ABSENT FROM THE COUNTY of residence because of his/her duties, occupation, business, vacation, attendance at college, sickness, disability or detention in jail or prison, may obtain and submit an application for an absentee ballot.

#### The procedure for obtaining an absentee ballot is:

1. Obtain and submit an application for an absentee ballot.
2. If the ballot will be mailed the application must be received no later than the SEVENTH DAY BEFORE THE ELECTION.
3. Upon completion of the application, the ballot will be given to the applicant or, in the case of a written request, will be mailed to the applicant.

Completed ballots MUST BE received by the District Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

### CANDIDATE VACANCIES FOR SCHOOL BOARD

Petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the Board of Education must be filed with the Clerk of the District between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. not later than April 17, 2017. The following vacancies are to be filled:

- A three-year term ending June 30, 2017 presently held by Jeanne Shields
- A three-year term ending June 30, 2017 formerly held by Gary Smith

Petition information is available on the district website or by contacting the District Office. Each petition must be addressed to the Clerk of the District, be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the District, shall state the residence of each signer, and the name and address of the candidate. Vacancies upon the Board shall not be considered separate specific offices. The individuals receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected to the vacancies.

## District Looks Towards Leasing Busses

This year the district will be seeking voter approval to lease two large passenger diesel buses as we retire/trade-in buses 29, 37 and a smaller 22-passenger bus. While this is a new venture to us at B-G, many local districts are already enjoying the cost savings associated with the leasing process. With voter approval in May the District can realize savings of nearly \$6,000 on each of the two larger buses and \$3,000 on the 22-passenger bus. I feel it is very important to present taxpayers with cost savings measures and leasing buses is a way we can save the district money.

### WHY LEASE?

- There would be maintenance savings with leasing buses because the district would assume no cost for the upkeep of the buses other than oil, filter, headlights or vandalism. Brakes, tires and parts would be the responsibility of the company.
- There is no need to purchase many of the new, required diagnostic tools that are needed to work on the buses.
- There would be no need for a fiscal agent or bond counsel.
- No large upfront payment with leasing buses (roughly \$17,000 for each big bus instead of \$107,070). After aid approximately \$3,900/yr. for each big bus to lease versus \$24,610 to purchase. We are looking at five-year leases.
- Our 22-passenger bus is \$54,667 or \$12,573 after aid and \$2,047 per year to lease.
- Leasing will allow us to create a newer fleet and completely flip our existing fleet in five years.
- Leasing can bring consistency, predictability and even expenditures for the district.

### WHY DIESEL?

- Today's clean-diesel school buses are 20 times cleaner than buses of 2003
- Produce near zero emissions and achieve Emissions performance near equivalent of alternative fuels
- Are extremely reliable
- Require no new infrastructure
- Get better fuel economy
- Will keep our fleet evenly split between propane buses and diesel 6/7
- We no longer receive the NYSERDA (New York State Energy Research and Development Authority) grant for propane buses due to it no longer being available, however, we do still receive a NYSERDA fuel credit.

### LEASING QUESTION/ANSWER

- Q. Is school bus leasing a state aid-able expense in NYS?**  
A. Yes, Leasing is state aid-able in NYS.
- Q. Can a district purchase equipment at the end of the lease?**  
A. If the lessor is willing to offer equipment for sale, then a

district could conduct a local bid and purchase the same equipment back. This would be an aid-able purchase of used equipment, as long as all bus purchase laws and regulations are followed.

**Q. Is voter authorization needed to lease buses in NYS?**

- A. Yes and No. It is needed for a lease of 1 year to 5 years. It is not needed for a lease of less than a year.

**Q. I recently learned that the Bainbridge Guilford Central School District is looking to lease two diesel buses this year instead of propane buses as in the past. Is this the direction the district is heading?**

- A. That information is correct. This spring we will be looking to lease two International diesel buses from Leonard Bus Sales. There are several reasons why the district is looking at diesels this year instead of propane:
- There is no longer a NYSERDA incentive given to districts for propane
  - Propane buses can't travel the distances that diesel buses can without refueling and it is often times difficult to find propane refueling stations
  - We want to keep our fleet evenly split
  - Diesel emissions have become extremely clean
  - Propane buses aren't allowed in the tunnels traveling to NYC

While this spring we will ask voters to approve two diesel buses this does not mean we won't purchase propane buses in the future. Thank you for a great question and please email or call with any questions or suggestions you might have.

## Alumni Spotlight!



Dr. Michelle Gifford, a dentist practicing in the heart of Bainbridge, now services the town that helped her grow into the successful practitioner she is today. Twenty-five years ago, in 1992, she stepped off the stage at her very own B-G graduation, excited for what college would hold. Her higher education would take her to Lemoyne, a prominent New York college, where she would go on to receive a bachelor's degree in biology. After Lemoyne, she moved on to receive her doctorate in Dental Medicine from the University of Buffalo. With her new degree in dentistry she could hypothetically go anywhere she wanted to set up. In her own words, "every town needs doctors, dentists, lawyers, teachers and accountants." In fact, even her family said they doubted she'd ever come back. Yet, she returned to her little home town in upstate New York.

She says that people were the real draw. Something about the people in Bainbridge just kept her wanting to be here, around those who had helped her achieve all she could. She reminisced fondly of how many opportunities she was given at Bainbridge, including music and year-book editor, and how that environment allowed you to do as much as you wanted. She said her experience at B-G was great! On top of her taking advantage of many of the extracurricular activities offered, she took as many AP's and as many business classes as she could. Through all this, she was supported by the people in the Bainbridge community. Even after leaving for college she kept in contact with her friends, even though back then it wasn't as easy as a Facebook friend request. By the time she had graduated dentistry school most of her friends had returned to Bainbridge to start careers here. With her family being here too, it just seemed right to come back.

"Not every dentist can say that their Kindergarten teacher is their patient" she said proudly, "but I can!" She said that that's not her only patient who used to be a teacher. Not only that, friends, family, and people she's known her whole life. She feels like she is giving back to the people who raised her, if only in a little way. In one more attempt to give back she offers some advice to B-G students, "My advice to students graduating would be to dream big, you are not limited because you came from a small town. Apply to that dream school, there is a way to make it happen."

Those words echo her own story. Allowing those around her to help her reach her goals, then returning to the community to support those who encouraged her.

## Safety Efforts Earn B-G Safety Excellence Award

Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is one of 136 school districts and Board of Cooperative Education Services in the state to receive the 2017 *Titanium with Honors School Safety Excellence Award*, the highest level of recognition offered by the Utica National Insurance Group.

The honor, presented annually, recognizes school districts' safety efforts as they work to help keep students, staff and visitors safe. Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District received its' award at Utica National's 37th annual school safety seminar in Binghamton. For over 40 years, Utica National has kept kids and school staff safe and currently insures more than 300 school districts in upstate New York alone.

Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District officials accepted a certificate to commemorate the district's safety efforts and a \$500 award for use in furthering those efforts. This is the 14th time B-G has received this award.

Utica National's School Safety Excellence Award Program has three levels—titanium, platinum and gold—in which schools can earn a meritorious distinction by meeting specific criteria to enhance overall safety. Through the program, schools with their own transportation, schools with contract transportation, and BOCES are evaluated. Categories covered include bullying prevention programs, playground safety and other areas, and are measured using specific quantifiable surveys. "Safety and health concerns continue to be a priority in our school districts," explained Brian Saville, Resident Senior Vice President in Utica National's Educational Institutions Unit. "Districts that go 'above and beyond' to provide a safe, healthy and focused culture for learning are to be applauded, and we're pleased to count Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District among them."

The school district would like to specifically thank Director of Facilities II, Howard Thomson, and the members of the Health and Safety Committee for their ongoing efforts to make Bainbridge-Guilford a safe place for faculty, students and staff.

## Jr.-Sr. High School Attendance Procedure

### ATTENTION PARENTS/GUARDIANS OF JR.-SR. HIGH SCHOOLERS

**PLEASE POST THIS NUMBER: 967-6368**

- **This number should be called as early in the morning as possible** on the day your child will be absent or tardy. It should be called each and every day that your child will be absent or tardy. Policy states it is the parent/guardian responsibility to make the calls. There is an answering machine, so you may call at any time, day or night. If the parent/guardian does not call in for the student, an attempt will be made to contact the parent/guardian.
- Parents/guardians are arriving unannounced at the Jr.-Sr. High School to pick up their child(ren). Policy states that students should present a note to the Main Office first thing on the morning of the day that they will be leaving. It is very difficult to have your child ready for pick-up without knowing ahead of time. If you find you need to take your child for a last minute appointment, you should call the number listed above and come in to sign your child out for the appointment.
- Notes to be excused during the school day should be presented to the Attendance Office in the High School Main Office in the morning when the student first enters the building. Notes not received first thing in the morning will be subject to verification. Students needing to be excused during the day but who have not brought in a note should have the parent/guardian call the Attendance Office at 967-6368. The parent/guardian will need to either FAX a note or personally come in to pick up the student.
- A student who will be going on an extended absence—whether it be excused or unexcused—should complete an Extended Absence Form available in the Attendance Office. Some examples would be: horse shows, family vacation, 4-H conference.
- The nurse will continue to assess ill students and call the parent/guardian if the student needs to go home. The parent/guardian will either come for the student or designate a person to pick up the student. Parents should discourage their children from calling to leave school without first seeing the nurse for assessment.

## Message from the Jr.-Sr. High School Principal

As I near the end of my twelfth year as the high school principal and just spent an evening with 8th graders and their parents at the 8th Grade Parent Information Night my message will be on the wonderful things Bainbridge-Guilford has to offer our students. Prior to my start as principal, my first year at B-G was in the position of Dean of Students. When I applied, interviewed and accepted the position of Dean of Students I was very impressed by all B-G offers for a smaller school and the importance placed on academics accentuated with a pass grade expectation of 75.

As I moved on to become the principal I carried forward my pride and desire to lead our school in offering great things by providing opportunities and access for our students to a well-rounded education and choices for learning, fun, and career paths.

Our small rural school is one of few that offer chorus, band and orchestra. In addition to Marching Band we have a Pep Band, a Jazz Band and Color Guard. Our school offers the traditional sports as those schools around us along with Boys' Volleyball, Badminton and Table Tennis. We offer Drama Club, Ski Club, Spanish Club, Yes! Leads and Student Councils to both Jr. and Sr. High School students. We offer both a Jr. and Sr. Honor Society and compete in the Envirothon and Odyssey of the Mind. We also produce our Yearbook through the Yearbook Club. Finally, we offer enrichment activities each day in the form of Intramurals at both Jr. and Sr. High, Weight Room and Computer Lab.

In academics we offer strong core subject instruction along with electives in Art, Health, Music, Physical Education, Family and Consumer Science, and Technology. Our 11th period is a time for both enrichment and extra help. We offer over twenty dual credit college classes, more college courses via online learning and four Advanced Placement courses. About a third of our students in 11th and 12th grade travel to BOCES each day to participate in various Career and Technical Education programs (Trade Type Careers). Additionally we offer a two year Machine Tool Technology Program on site. We have had five students graduate with an Associate's Degree from TC3 in two years and look to have eight more gain this degree this school year. Many more students earn over 24 college credits and the majority of our seniors graduate with more than 25 high school credits. Also, in summer we offer students a chance to take Driver's education.

Although we offer much to our students, the greatest thing we have, which makes the biggest impact on our students learning and growth, is a highly trained staff that are caring and compassionate. Our staff in transportation, cafeteria, maintenance, instruction and administration are at B-G because they love working with students and sincerely want our students and our school to be the best. It has been my

pleasure and one of our most important duties to find, hire and train the best candidates in every employment opening we have. As people retire or leave we have worked diligently to find the best people to be the difference makers in your child's education.

The goal of our 8th Grade Parent Information Night is to review what we offer and what is both necessary and available to students moving into high school on their journey to graduation. We share available sports, activities and clubs along with credit requirements, regents' requirements, pathway options, and available courses in each subject area. This information meeting is the set-up for students to then meet with a school counselor to pencil in their high school four year plan.

When presenting at the information night or to our Board of Education and anytime we interview potential employment candidates, I am filled with pride as I always share the wonderful things we offer our students. I always tell everyone we have wonderful staff and wonderful students. Thank you Bainbridge-Guilford for my opportunity to be your High School Principal and for all the support this community continues to give to our school district.

## **Afton & Bainbridge-Guilford YES LEADers Team Up to Bring Awareness to Injuries and Prescription Drug Abuse**

(Afton, NY) Over 400 community members turned out for “Dinner, Dessert and Direct Talk”, an opiate information event co-sponsored by the YES LEADS groups at Afton and Bainbridge-Guilford High Schools.

Along with a free pizza dinner, attendees heard from a panel of experts that included Senator Fred Akshar, Dr. Garcia Pierre-Pierre of Lourdes Sports Medicine, Local Chiropractor Dr. Dobby Crisell, Athletic Trainer Dan Sheffer, Matt Skojec of Chenango County Behavioral Health, Athletic Coach Robb Munro, James Everard of Chenango County Drug Court and Megan Vogt.

The panel covered topics including the alternative methods to recovering from an injury, the risks and dangers of prescription drug dependence, and the link between opiates and long-term heroin use.

The program was hosted by special guest emcee, Senator Fred Akshar.

"Knowledge is one of the most powerful resources to prevent prescription drug abuse in our community," Akshar said. "It's amazing to have YES LEADers dedicate their time and efforts to organize this event to help families further understand this widespread epidemic."

The evening was organized by the 60 YES LEADers from Afton and Bainbridge-Guilford High Schools. In addition to handing out dinner and setting up the program, YES LEADers were on hand to supervise elementary students in open gym and talk to them one-on-one about the importance of making safe choices.

At the beginning of the school year, YES Safe Choices was selected from a group of national youth organizations and coalitions to train YES LEADers in “The pHARMING Effects” presentation. Developed in conjunction with the Cardinal Health Foundation, this pilot program focuses on new ways to educate middle school students about the dangers of prescription drug abuse and their long term connection to heroin.

Afton and Bainbridge-Guilford’s YES LEADS groups were two of the six who volunteered to bring this valuable training into their middle schools and will present The pHARMING Effects in the coming weeks.



#### **School bus transportation is safe.**

In fact, buses are safer than cars! Even so, last year, approximately 26 students were killed and another 9,000 were injured in incidents involving school buses. More often than not, these deaths and injuries didn't occur in a crash, but as the pupils were entering and exiting the bus.



## SCHOOL BUS SAFETY TIPS

**Stay away** from the bus until it comes to a **complete stop** and the driver signals you to enter.

**Stay away** from the bus until the driver gives his/her signal that it's ok to approach.

**Keep a safe distance** between you and the bus. Also, remember that the bus driver can see you best when you are back away from the bus.

Have a safe place to wait for your bus, **away from traffic and the street.**

**Be aware of the street traffic around you.** Drivers are required to follow certain rules of the road concerning school buses, however, not all do.

When being dropped off, exit the bus and **walk ten giant steps away** from the bus.

**Use the handrail** to enter and exit the bus.

4. We learned that problem-solving using I-Care rules protects friendships!






