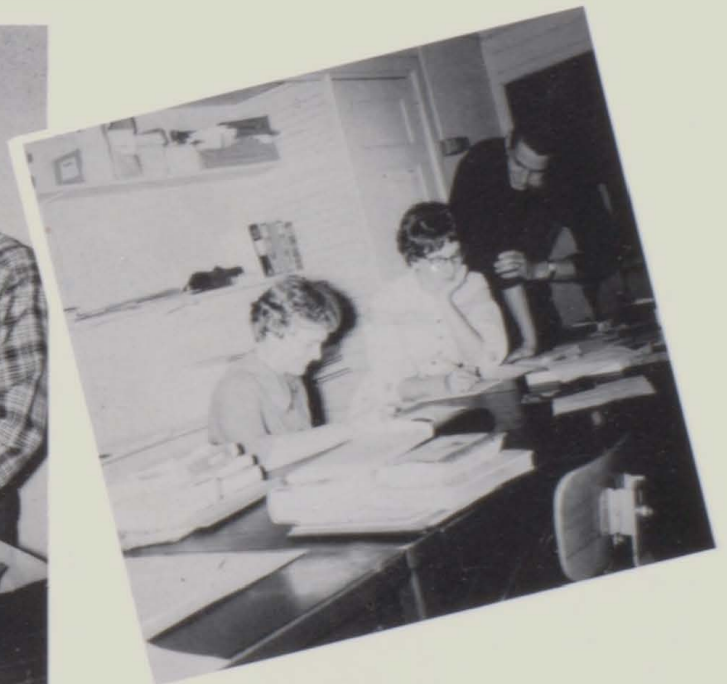

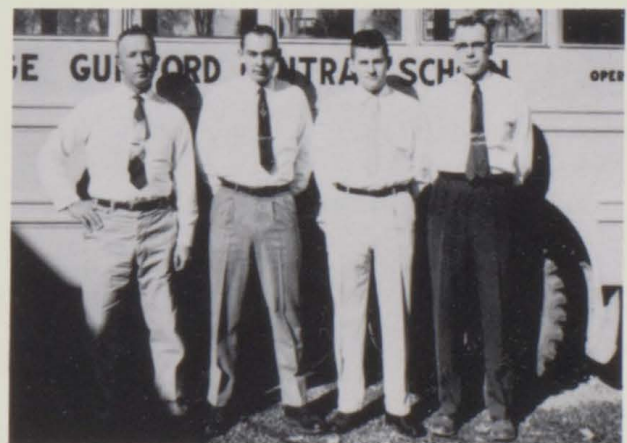

BUS DRIVERS

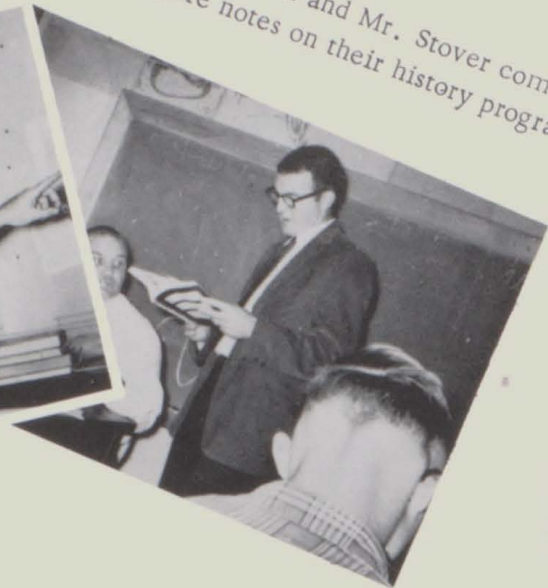

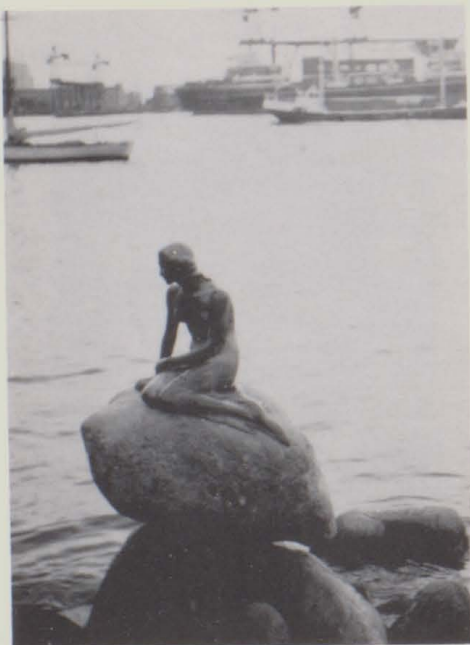

I remember how happy I was to be going to Denmark as an American Field Service exchange student. I was very proud to represent Bainbridge and the United States.

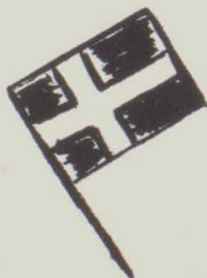
My fondest memories of my summer in Denmark are those of my Danish home, Kjelvang. It was there that I came to love my Danish family, the Lunds. My Danish parents were always ready to show me "how the Danes do it." My Danish brother, Jens, loved music, and we often had "song fests" around the piano in the living room. My favorite member of my Danish family was my sister, Anna. We spent many hours together talking, laughing, and hoping that the summer would never end.

Maybe I'm prejudiced, but I believe that the Jutland peninsula is one of the prettiest places in the world. Tivoli is a wonderful maze of fountains, flower beds, lights, rides, and gaiety where young and old lose their hearts.

I received my American Field Service Scholarship in June, 1961. I knew that America was a big country - bigger than Costa Rica, and I was very anxious to see how large my new home town would be. My father and I tried to find Bainbridge on a map, but it was very hard. I find it is a small town, especially compared to San Jose, the capital of Costa Rica.

It was dark the night I arrived at the Binghamton airport on August 30. Every time we came to a town, I would wonder, to myself: "Is this town Bainbridge?" My family had to laugh when we arrived, because I was so surprised to see the long drive-way of my new home, that I said: "We must be lost."

My father owns a shoe factory, and also a shoe store. I went to school for six years at Vitalia Madrizal, and then I went right into high school at Colezio Superior de Sinoritas.

We have some very different customs in Costa Rica, like our University Week in July. We have dances every day, and the last dance is for the coronation of the queen. It is a very happy week, especially for the lucky girl who is chosen queen. Christmas is a little different, too. It is a very festive occasion, with parties and celebrations all day long. We have dancing in the street and the government sets up an amusement park for everyone to enjoy. On Christmas Eve, while we are sleeping, our parents and relatives put gifts at the foot of our beds.

I am having much fun learning how to dance the different ways. In Costa Rica, we dance the cha cha, but it goes much faster.

I enjoy eating very much, and American food, m-m-m-m-m, I like. All ready I feel like an American student, especially when I use the "slang." I thank the American Field Service for bringing me to such a wonderful, friendly town as Bainbridge. I hope very much that Americans and Costa Ricans may always be good friends.

In the face of past history, present problems, and future possibilities, it seems that the human race should do a little growing up on Earth before it attempts the stars. In the matter of behavior humanity has not progressed very far from the days when it ate bananas and lived in trees.

WORLD OF THE FUTURE

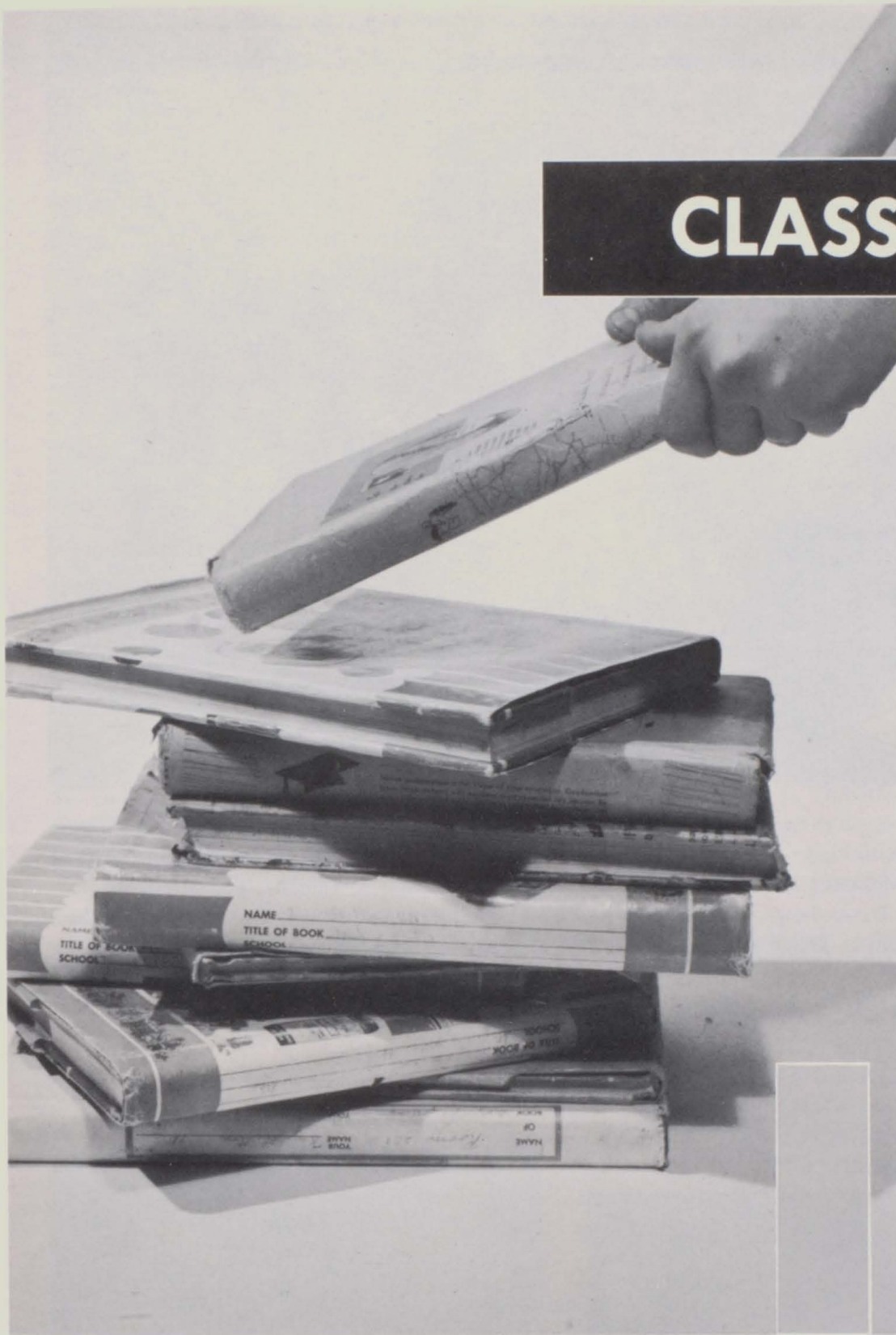

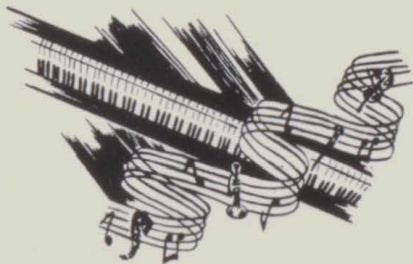

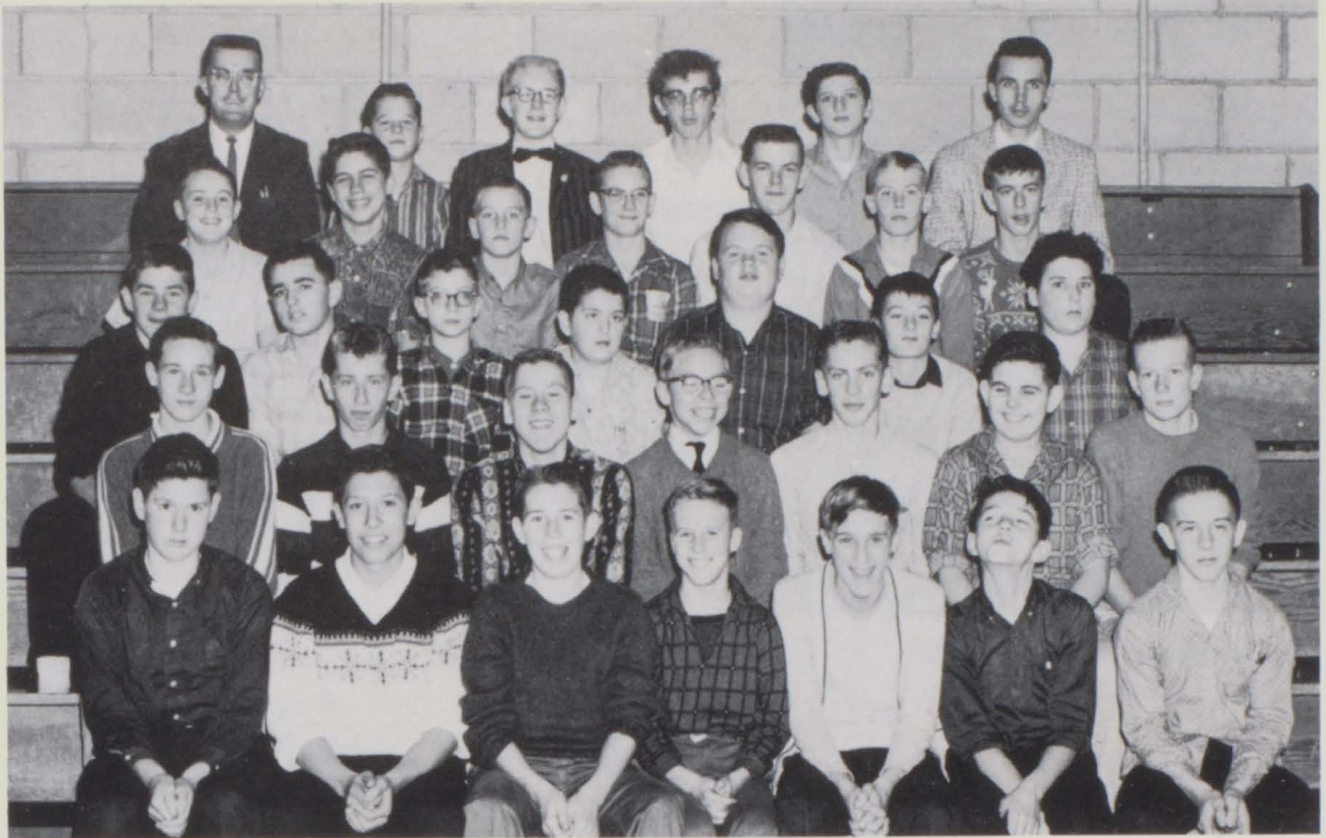

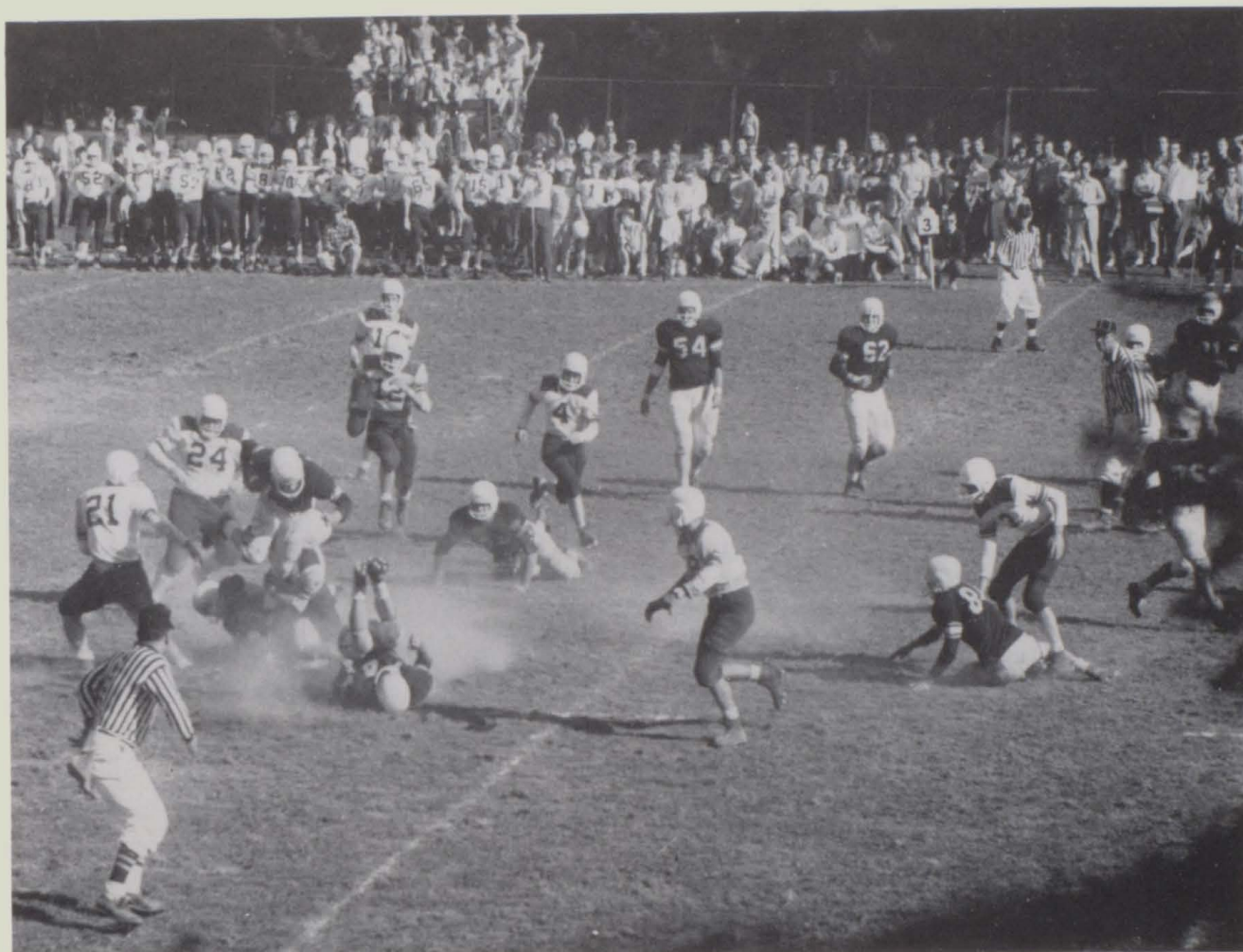

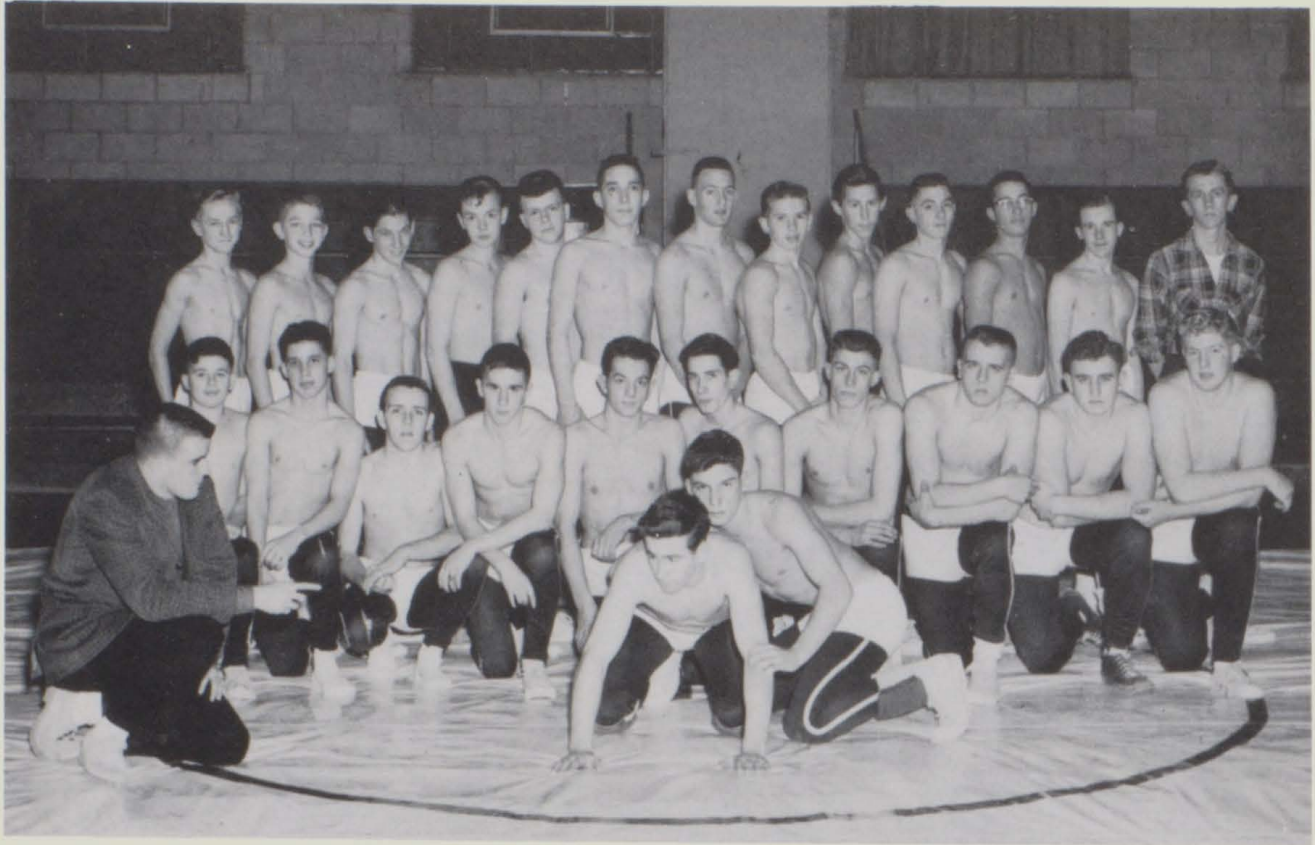

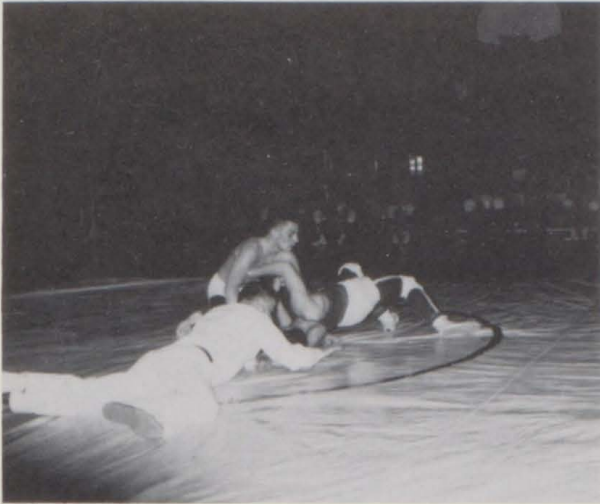
WRESTLERS LEAD THE LEAGUE

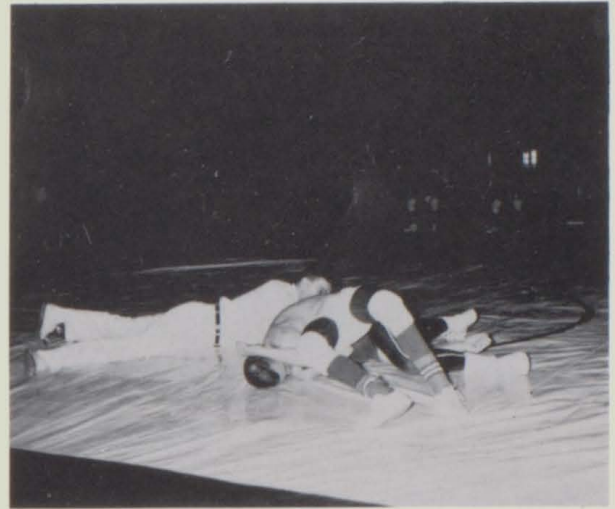

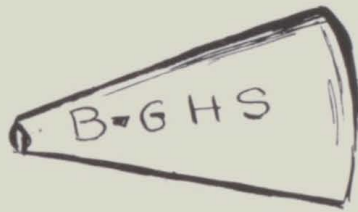

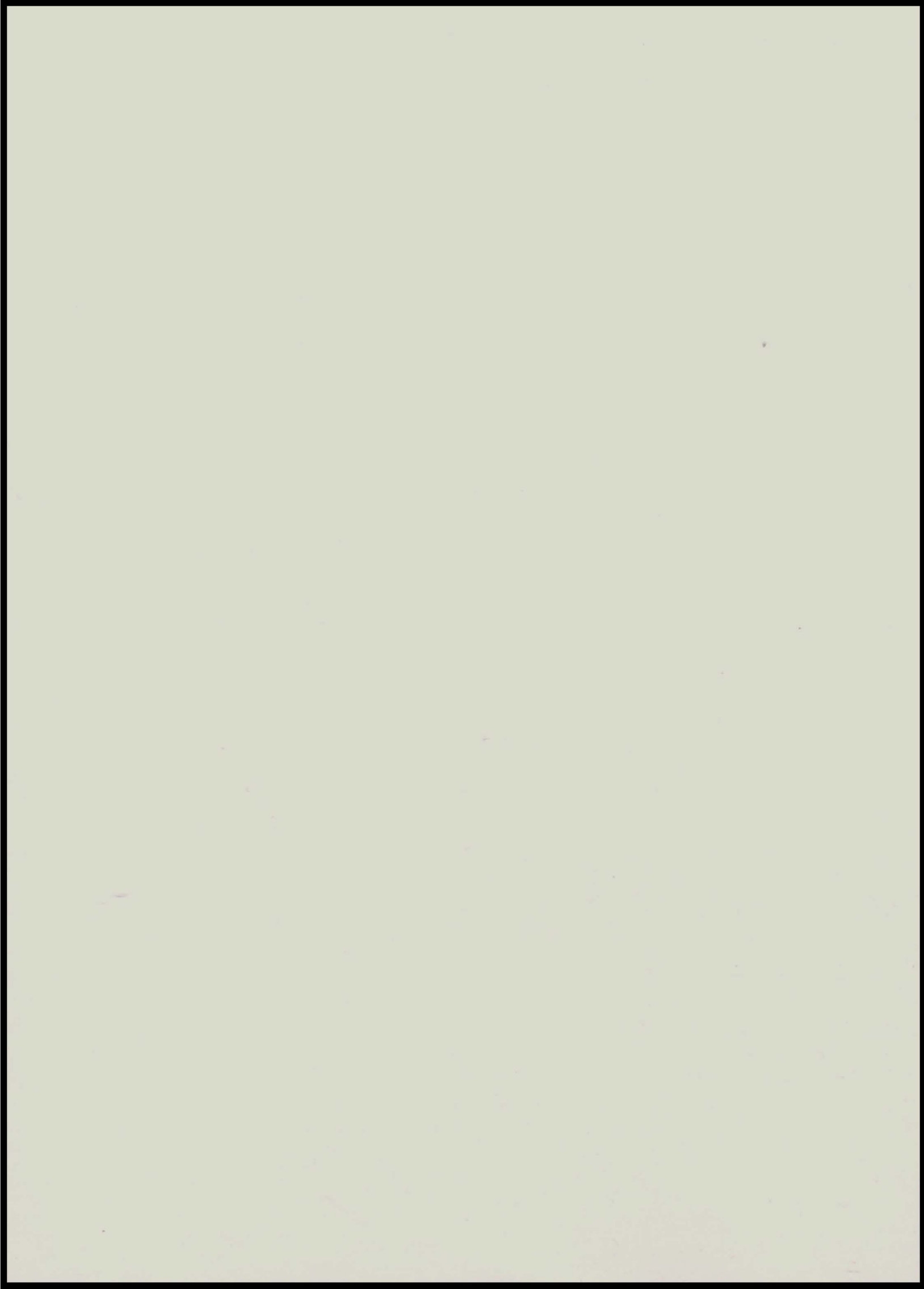
THE CLASS OF '62 STEPS INTO THE FUTURE

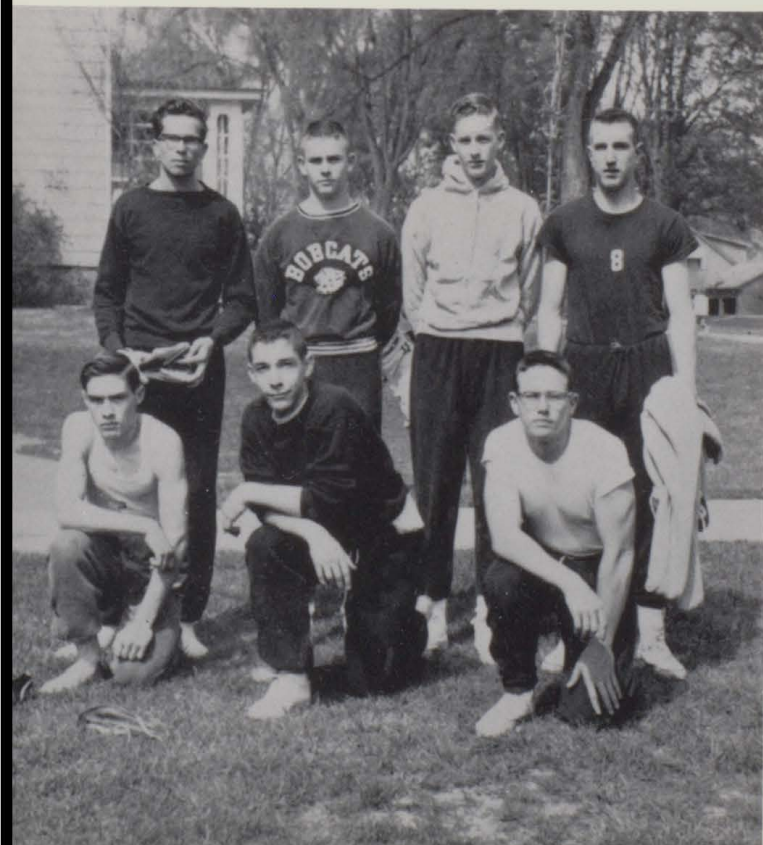

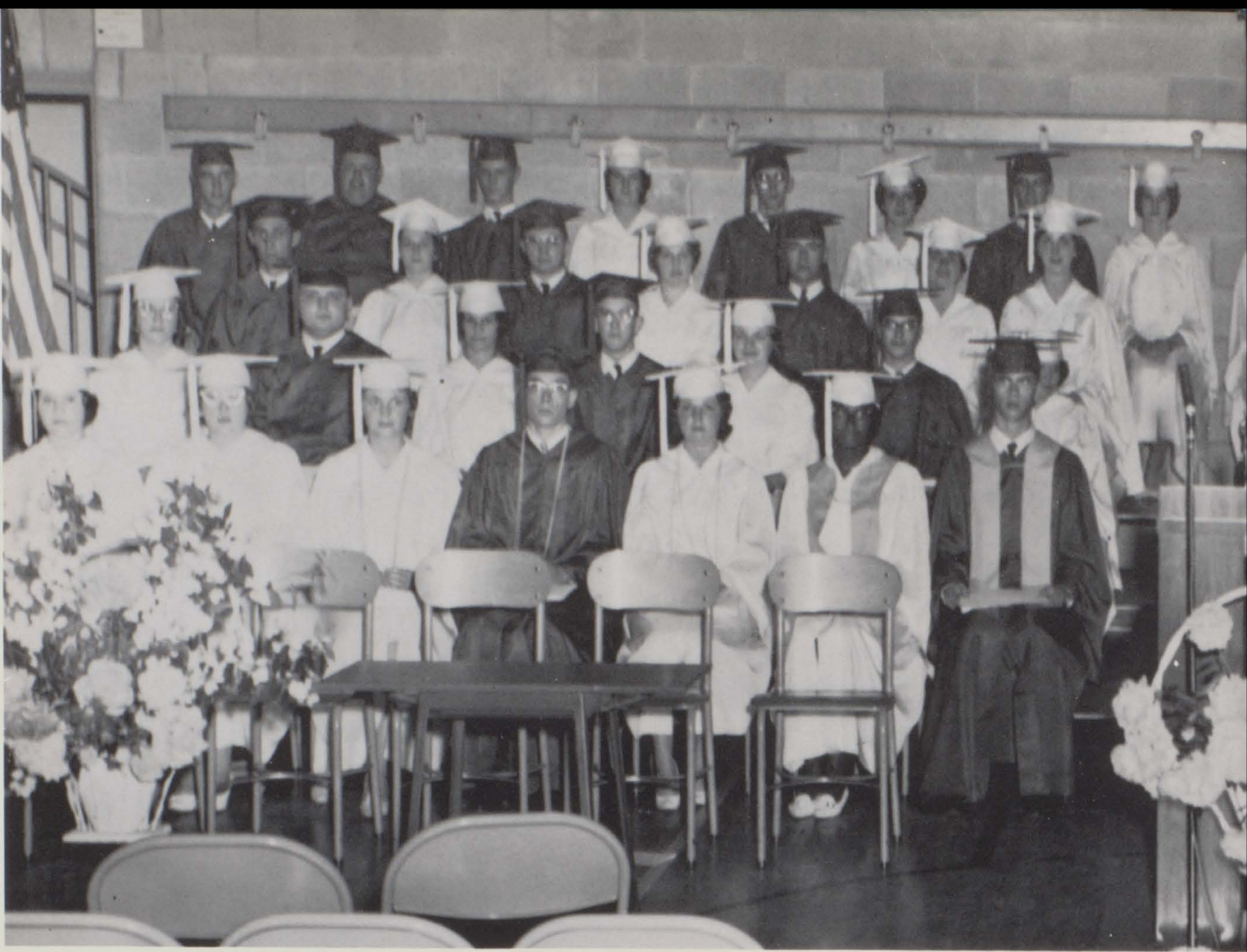

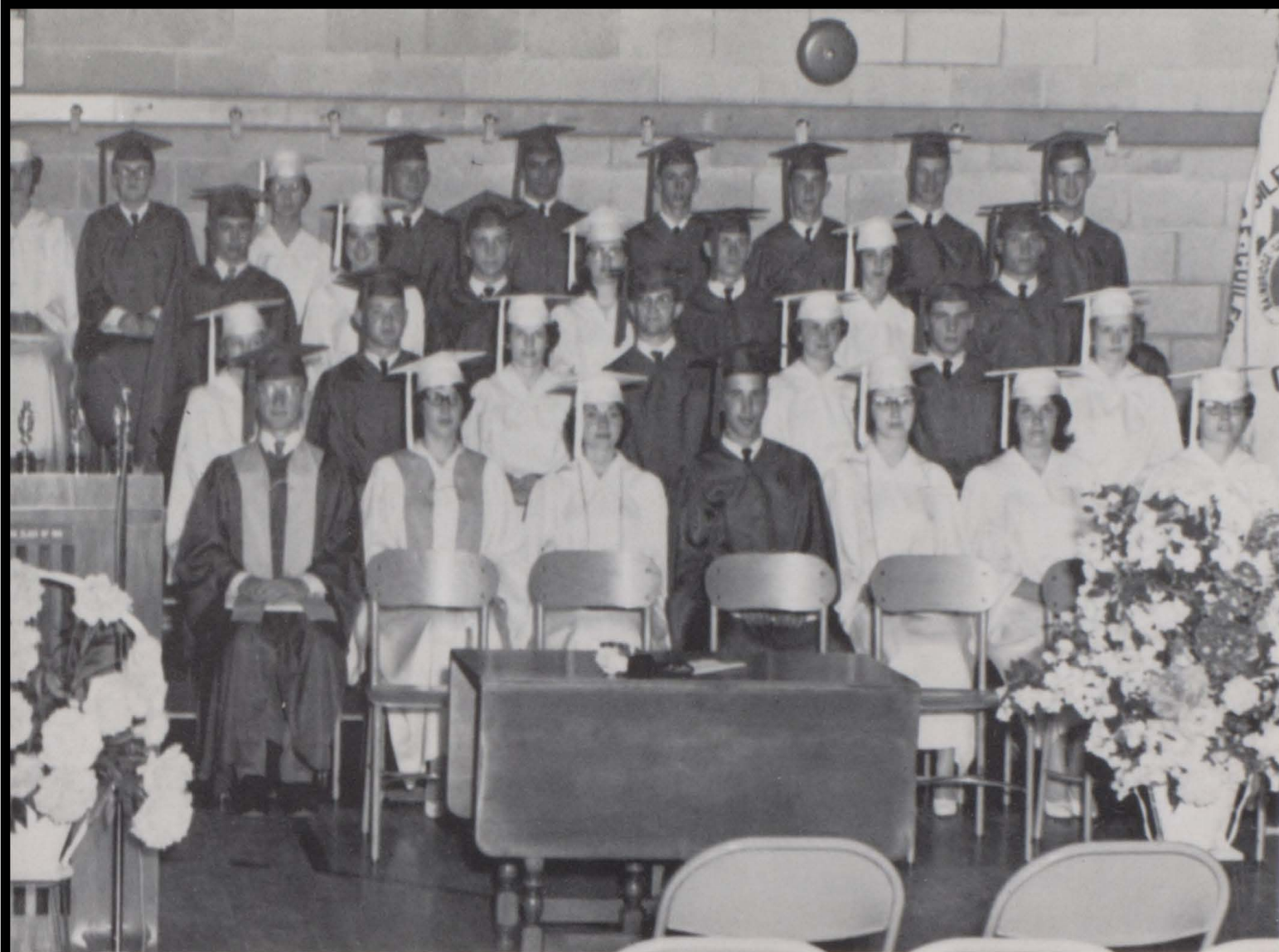

This was it! The long anticipated moment was finally here - graduation.

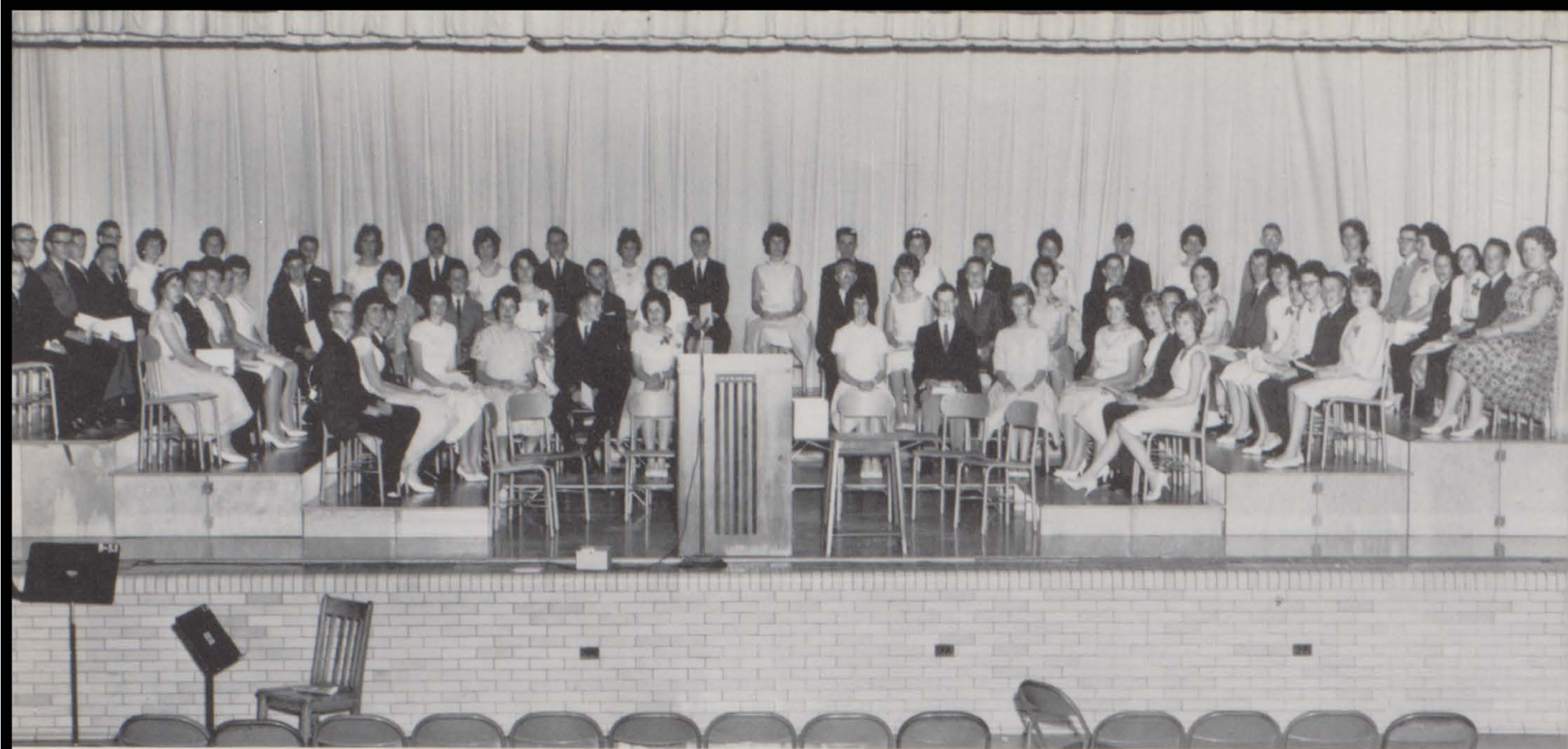

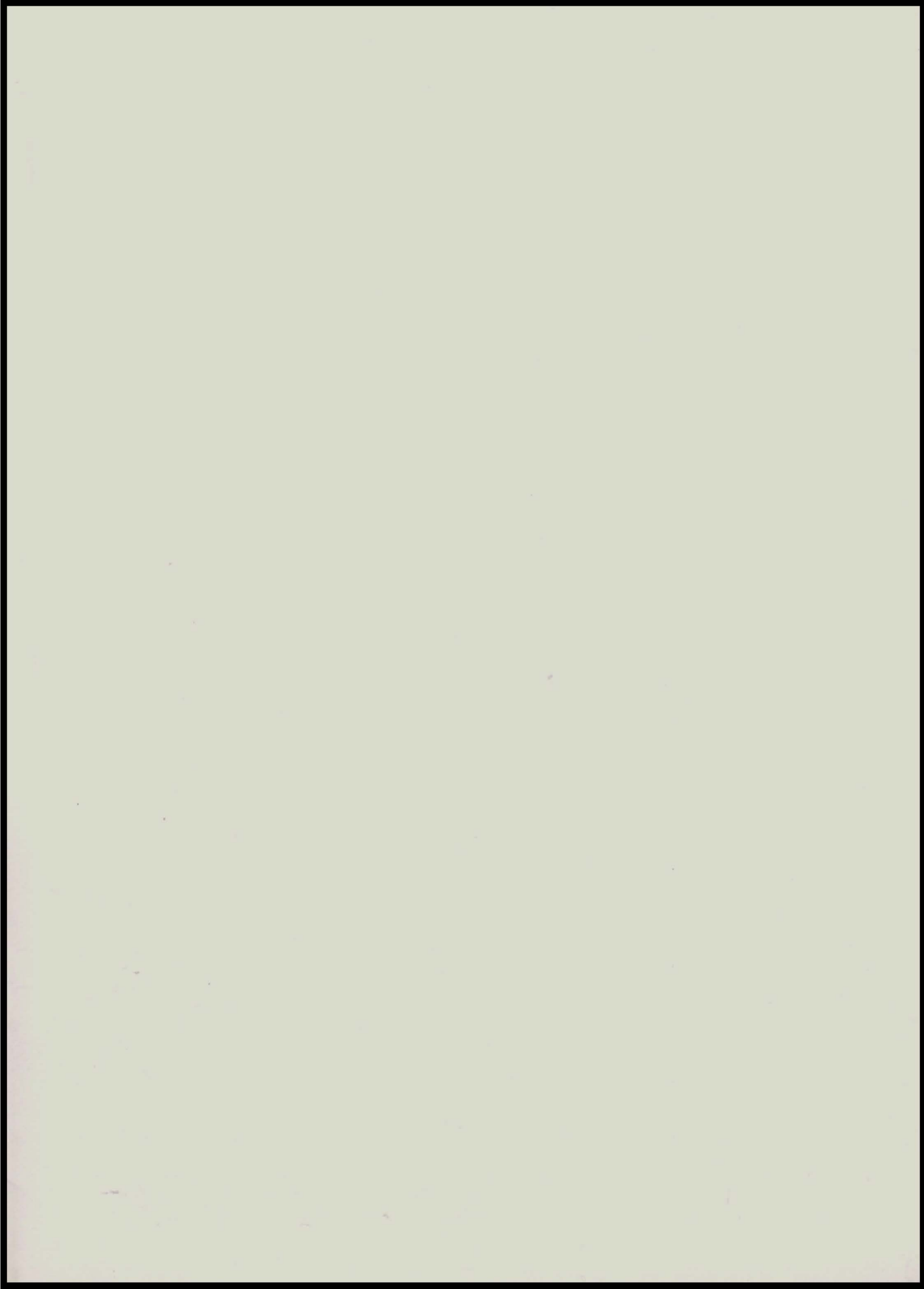
