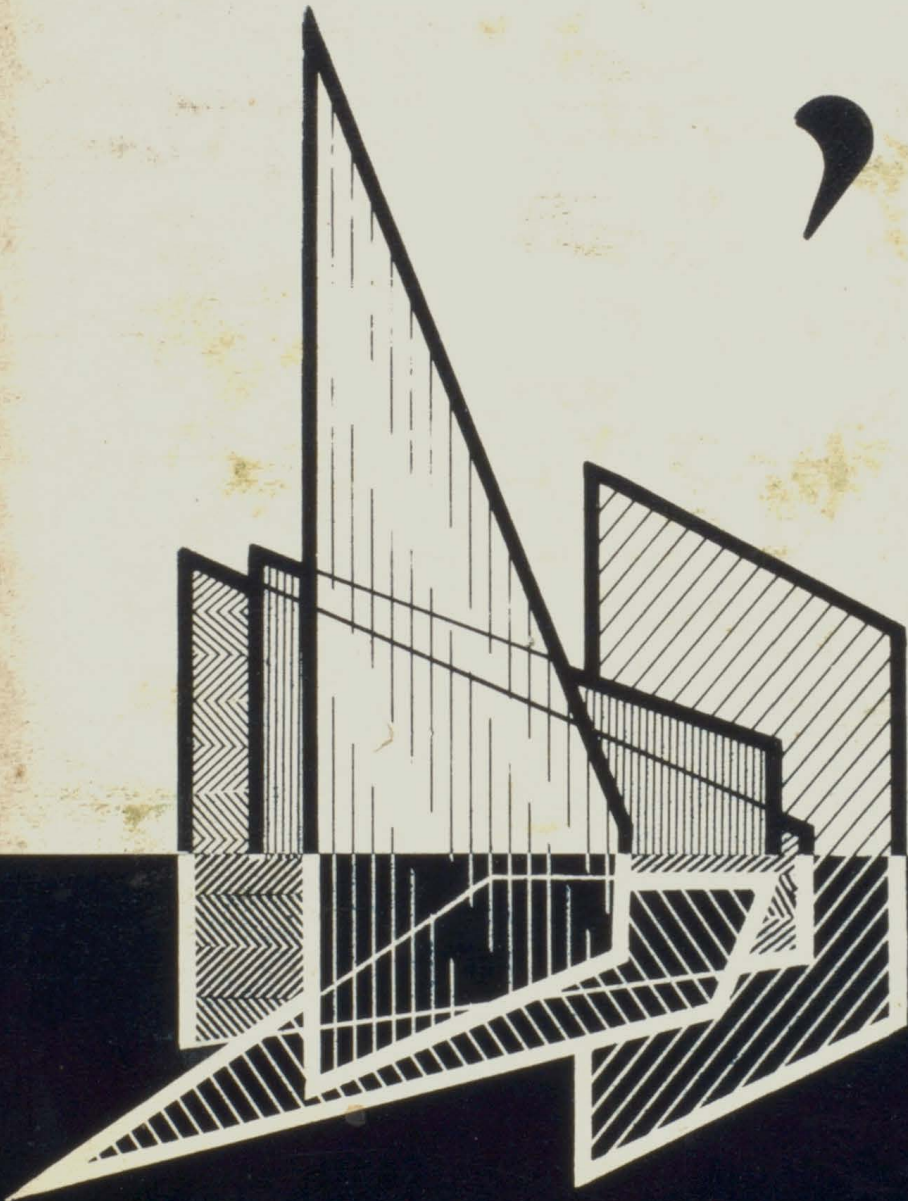


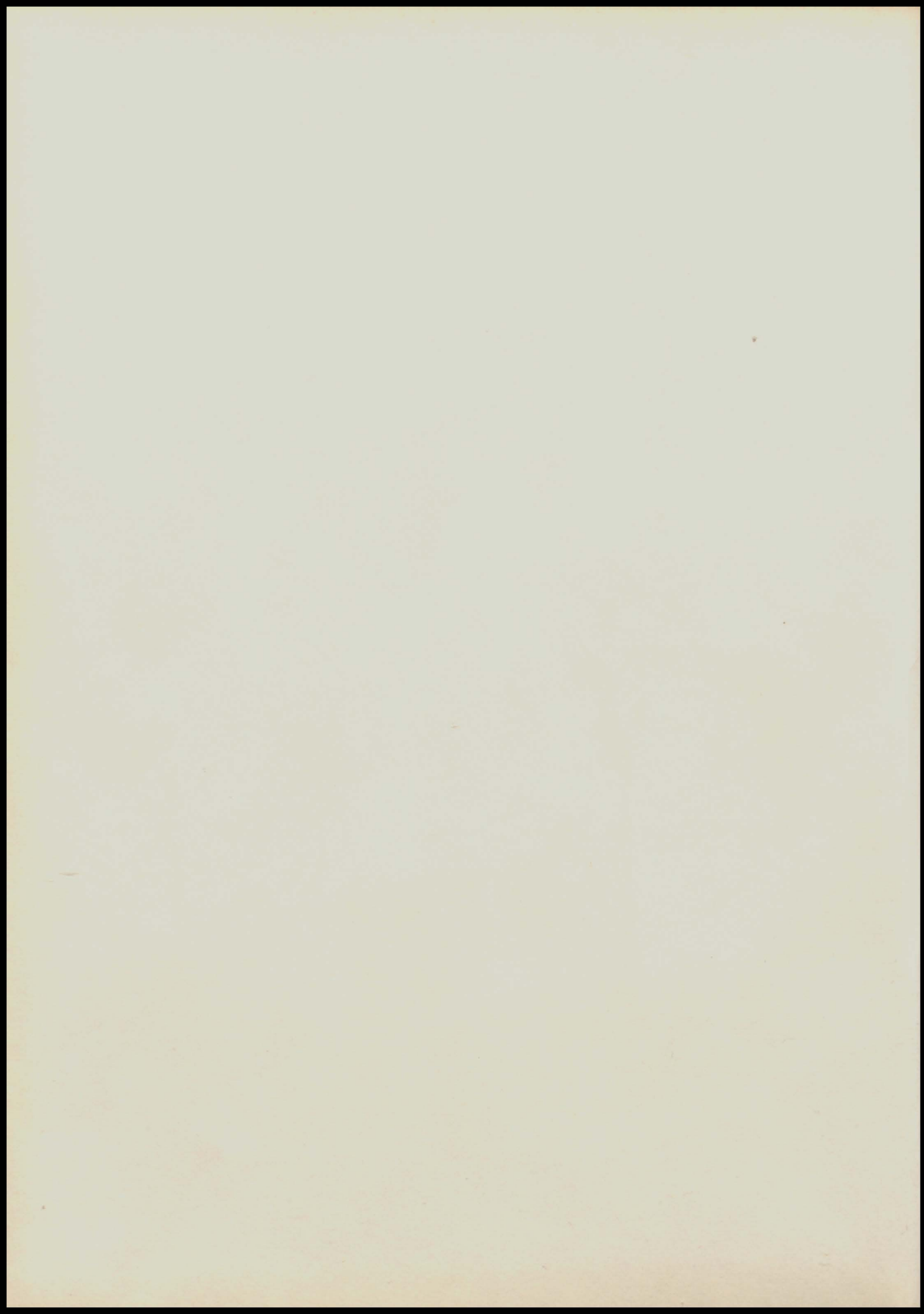

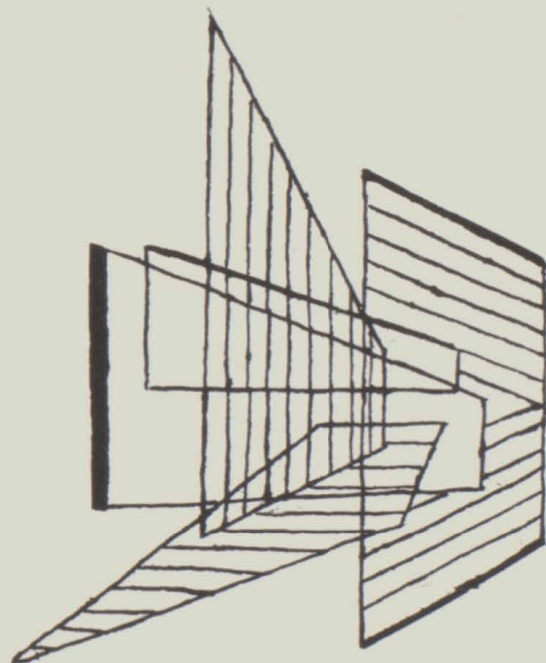

## ***“Sheds Her Rays o***

The Village and Town of Bainbridge at no time in their 175 years of history failed to meet the needs of their children and youth as to education. In the year 1873, after some controversy over a site, the first substantial building was erected. The site selected was an acre of land on Richard W. Juliand's farm, price \$400. At a school meeting on March 22, 1873, the sum of \$8,000 was voted to build a schoolhouse and equip it. On January 19, 1874, the

school was dedicated. The first graduating exercises were held in 1878 with the Misses Anna Juliand (Dickinson) and Linda Freiot (Copley) as the first graduated. In the early years of the school there were about 175 students, 4 faculty members covering high school, intermediate and primary departments. Today there are three modern buildings housing about 1,500 students. It takes the work of many to educate these students. In 1960, Bainbridge

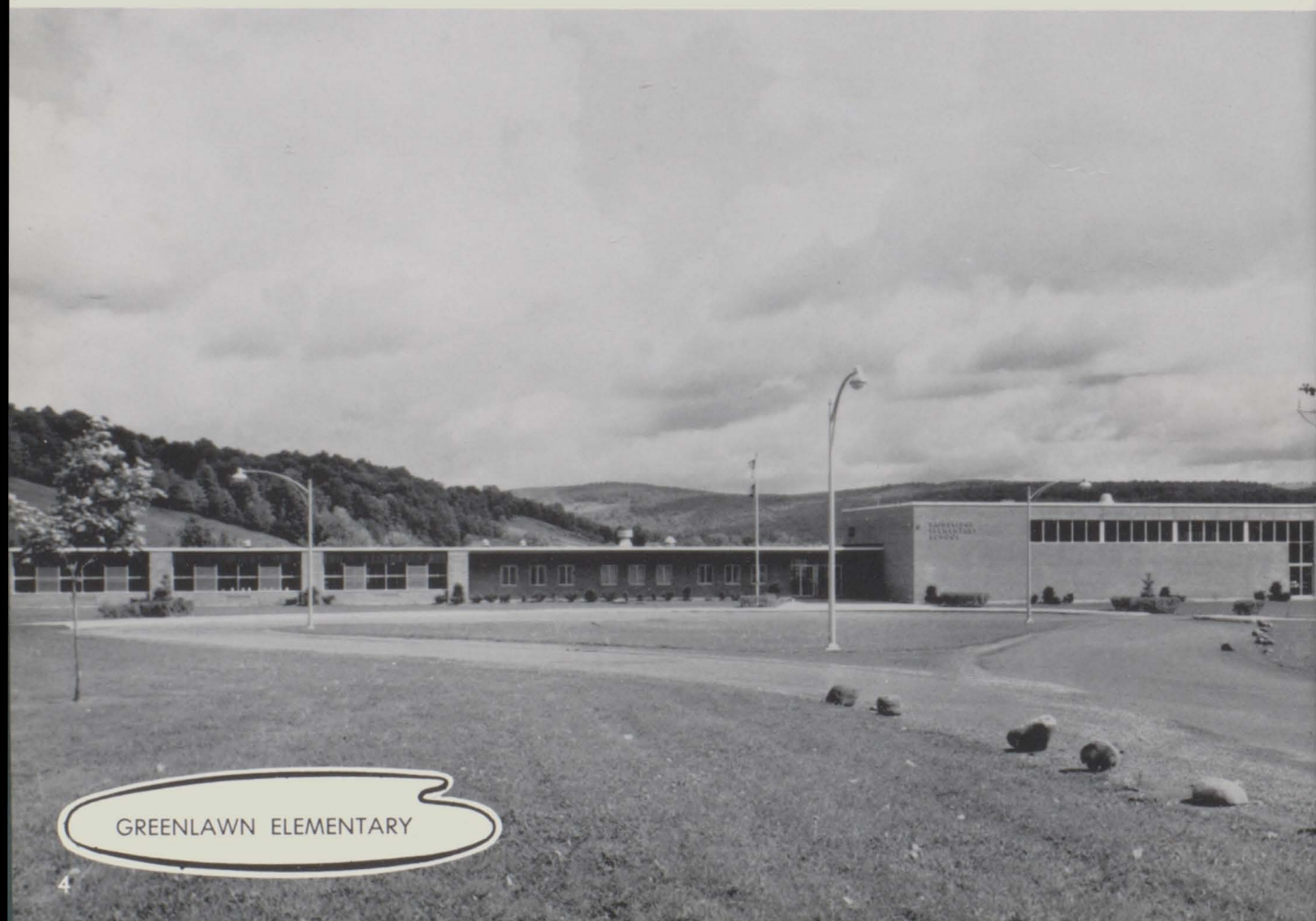
MR. FLOYD PROUTY

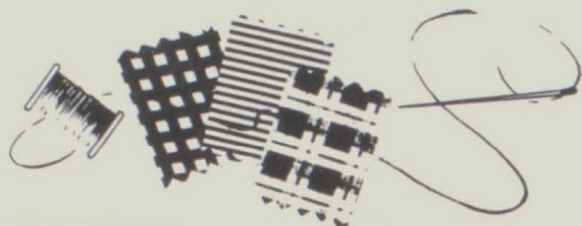

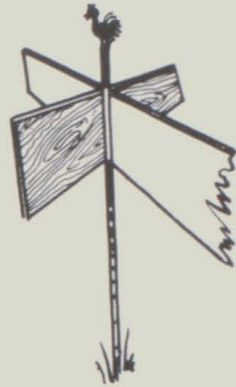
## Guidance Found Here

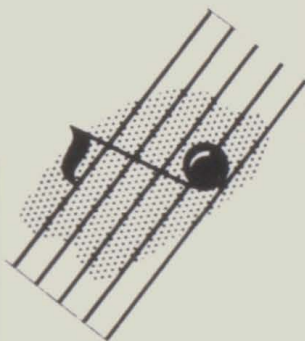
## Sing Along With Merk

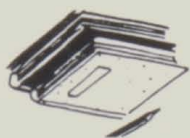

# We in Our Age

The first time I heard of the American Field Service was last year in September when I read in the paper of a group of boys and girls that went to the United States. I was interested too in the United States, and applied for the scholarship. At first it was difficult to decide because one year is a long time and my mother didn't like that separation. I was told last July that I was going to New York State and I received a letter from my new family. I passed the time very anxiously waiting for my departure and preparing the things for the travel.

The 15th of August we left Madrid. We came in a jet—about one hundred and fifty students from France, Monocco and Spain. The travel was very nice and short, only six hours. We live in a flat in the city of Valencia on the Mediterranean coast and we spend the summer in a little town of fishermen in Javea where we have our summer home. I went to a private school in my city, where there are one thousand boys. We play many sports and I used to be on some teams. I would like to thank all the people who made this experience possible for me.

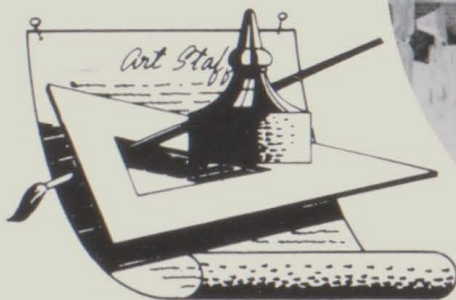
