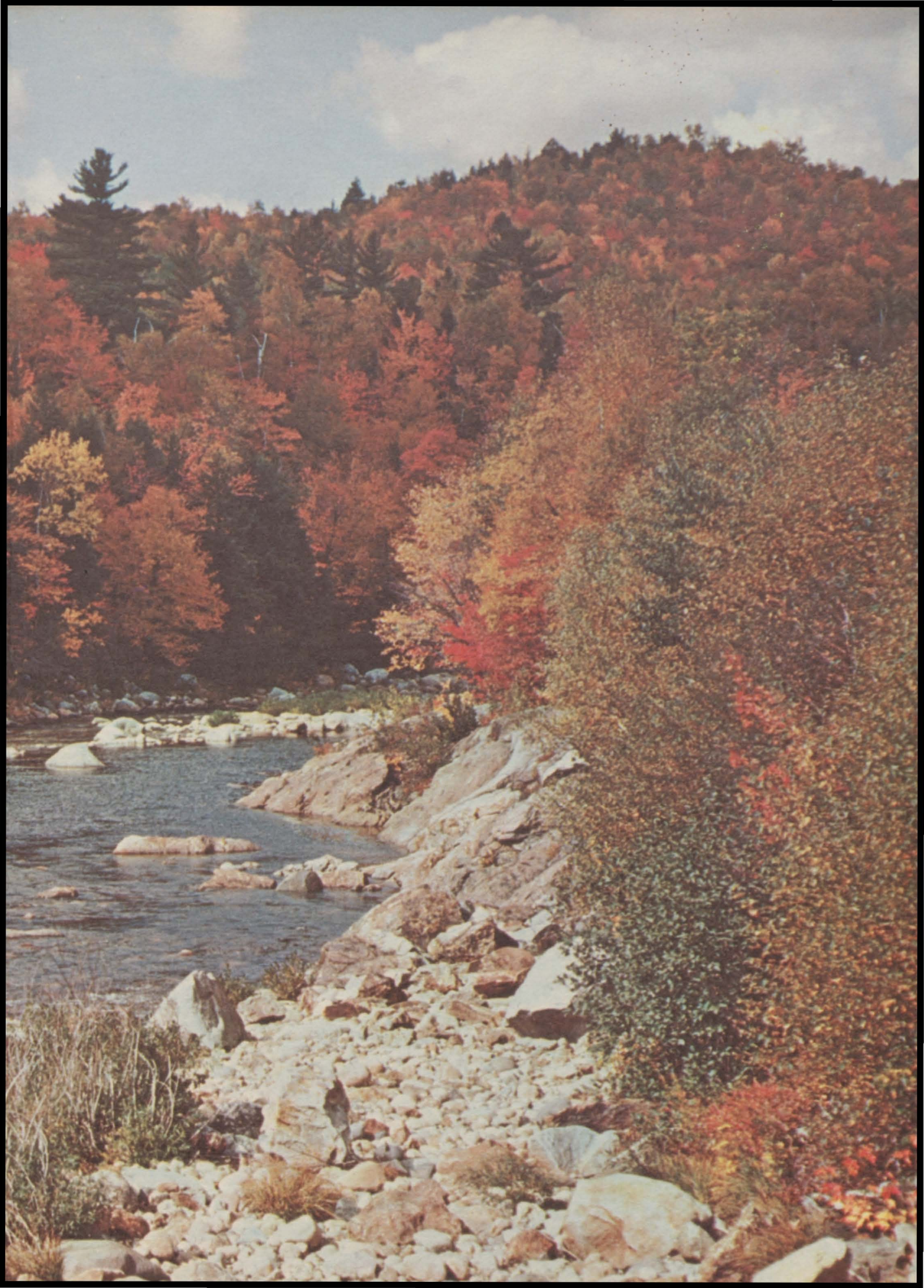


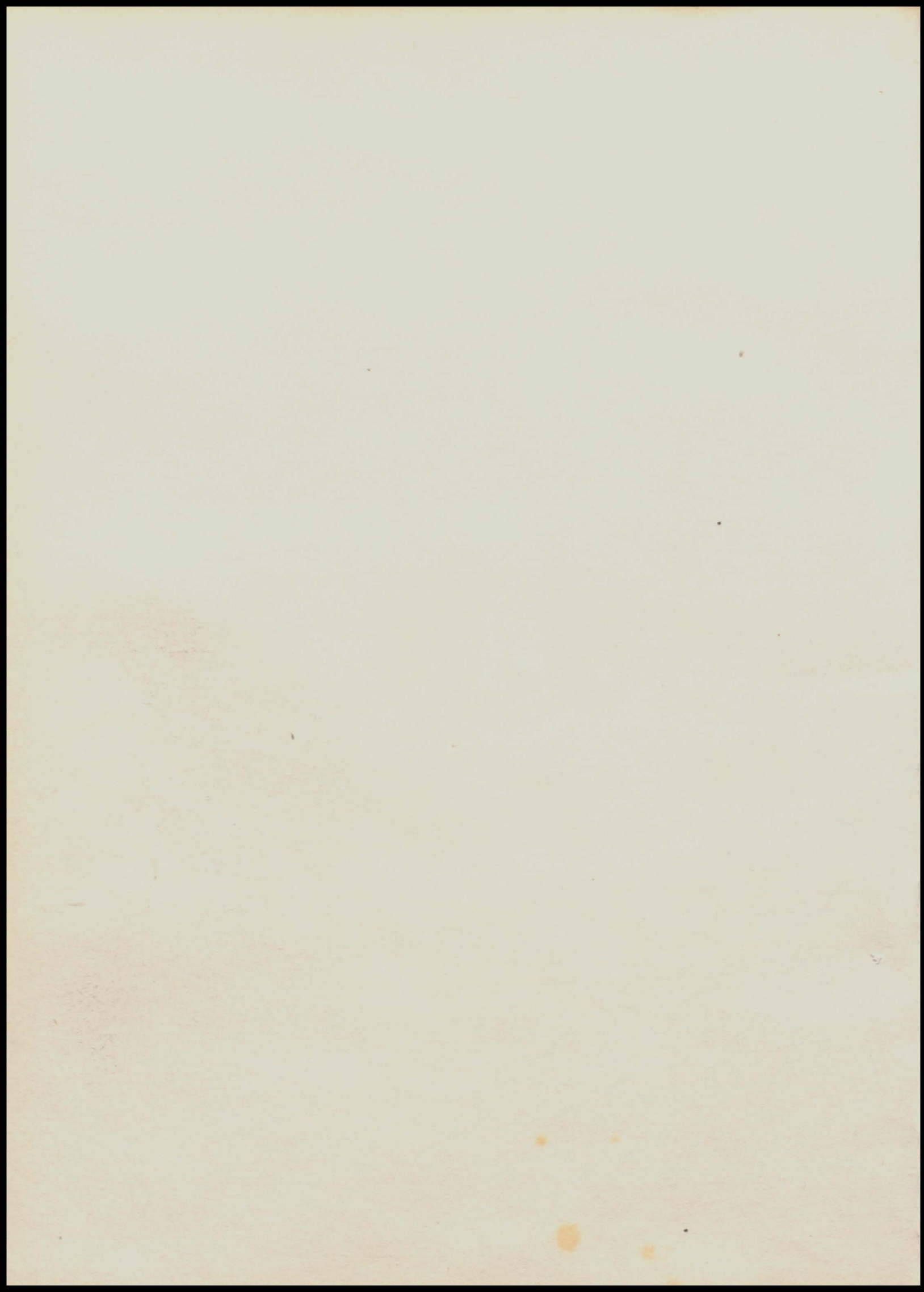

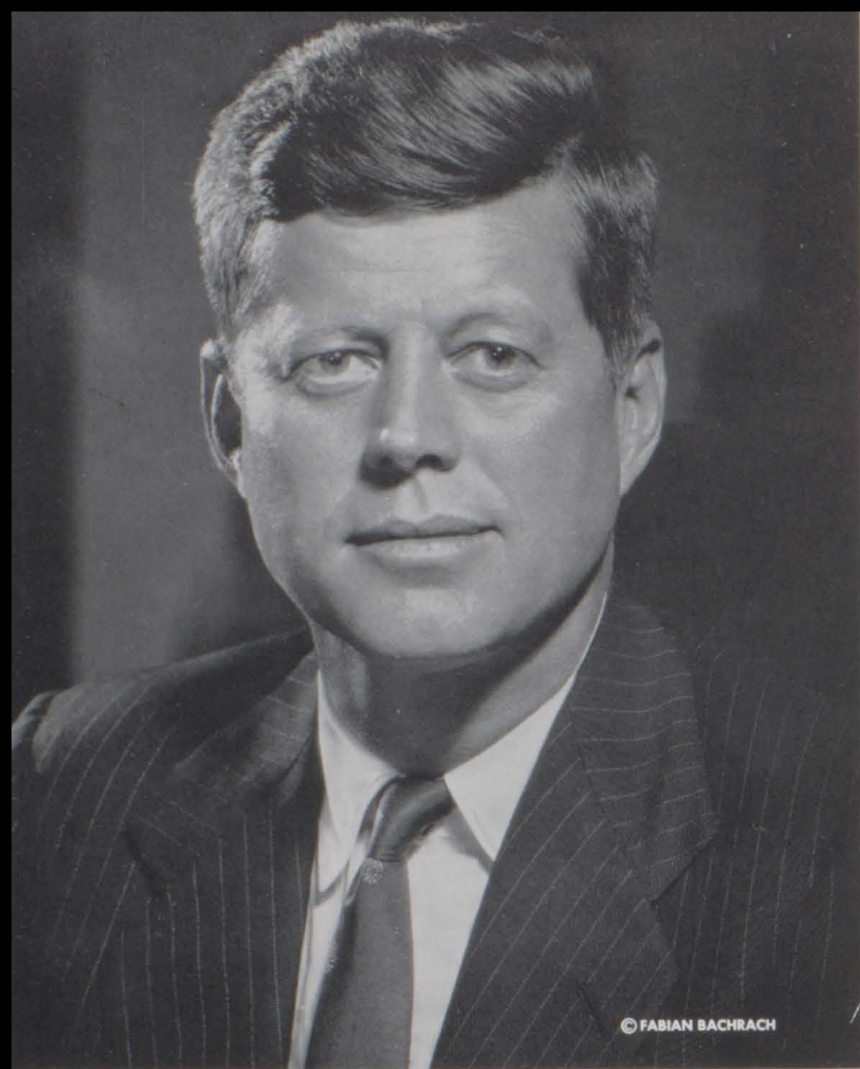

"The Torch is Passed"

Coming at the beginning of a happy holiday season, the sudden shock of an announcement of our President's death seemed impossible to believe. Students and teachers stood numb together—some cried—some were silenced in grief.

We, the students of Bainbridge-Guilford, salute this man who believed in strength of spirit and principle. We are dedicated more than ever to uphold our responsibilities to our country and our school.

High Eagle Falls

High Eagle of the American Blackfoot Indians was not born to this title or many others which he was to receive before his murder. But he was born a very rich little gentleman with a one million dollar trust fund. He went to the best schools and was liked by

all for his wit and humor which masked a great intelligence and understanding of world affairs. A life of ease, freedom and respect lay in front of him. What he wanted, however, was not ease, but a challenge and goal; men of ability are seldom content if they cannot use their potential. A more than distinguished war veteran, he returned to renounce security for the turbulent and uncertain realm of politics. He campaigned for and won a seat in the U.S. House of Representatives and still wasn't satisfied. As a youthful senator he demonstrated what seemed to be his inborn grasp of legal and political affairs.

In a nation of rags-to-riches heroes like ours, a wealthy man is at a disadvantage when seeking office. But, hindered by his youth, wealth and religion, he wanted to go to the White House "Because that's where the power is." He needed a challenge equal to his great ability and on January 20, 1961, John Fitzgerald Kennedy accepted the ultimate challenge as President of the United States and leader of the free world. Pledging to "make a strong America stronger" and to "get America moving again" he culminated his plea to his country, "and so, my fellow Americans; ask not what your country can do for you . . . ask what you can do for your country."

In relations with the Communists our late President knew when to stop and when to go. Berlin, 1961—the wall rose and a blockade of allied access routes to Berlin seemed imminent, but 1,500 troops and special emissary Lyndon B. Johnson resulted in an East German backdown. Cuba 1962—Communist missiles lay aimed at us. For his action here if nowhere else, call our mourned leader great. Ignoring Russian offers to bargain, the President issued an ultimatum of immediate removal and set up a naval blockade to enforce it. Again he was right.

But he could bargain and TIME magazine believes the accomplishment this man would most like to be remembered for is the Nuclear Test Ban signed by 127 nations to date. Others were the U.S.-U.S.S.R. wheat deal, the planning of a NATO Multilateral Polaris Fleet and a dream of a U.S.-Russia joint moon venture. Mr. Kennedy wanted peace above all else but knew when firmness was called for.

At home he supported a tax cut, a civil rights bill and youth.

J.F.K. believed our generation was more than an inanimate resource like oil or uranium. The Peace Corps was one aspect of his policy for us of "involvementism."

His work was not finished, and he campaigned for reelection. On one tour he became an honorary Blackfoot. On another, November 22, 1963, he was assassinated.

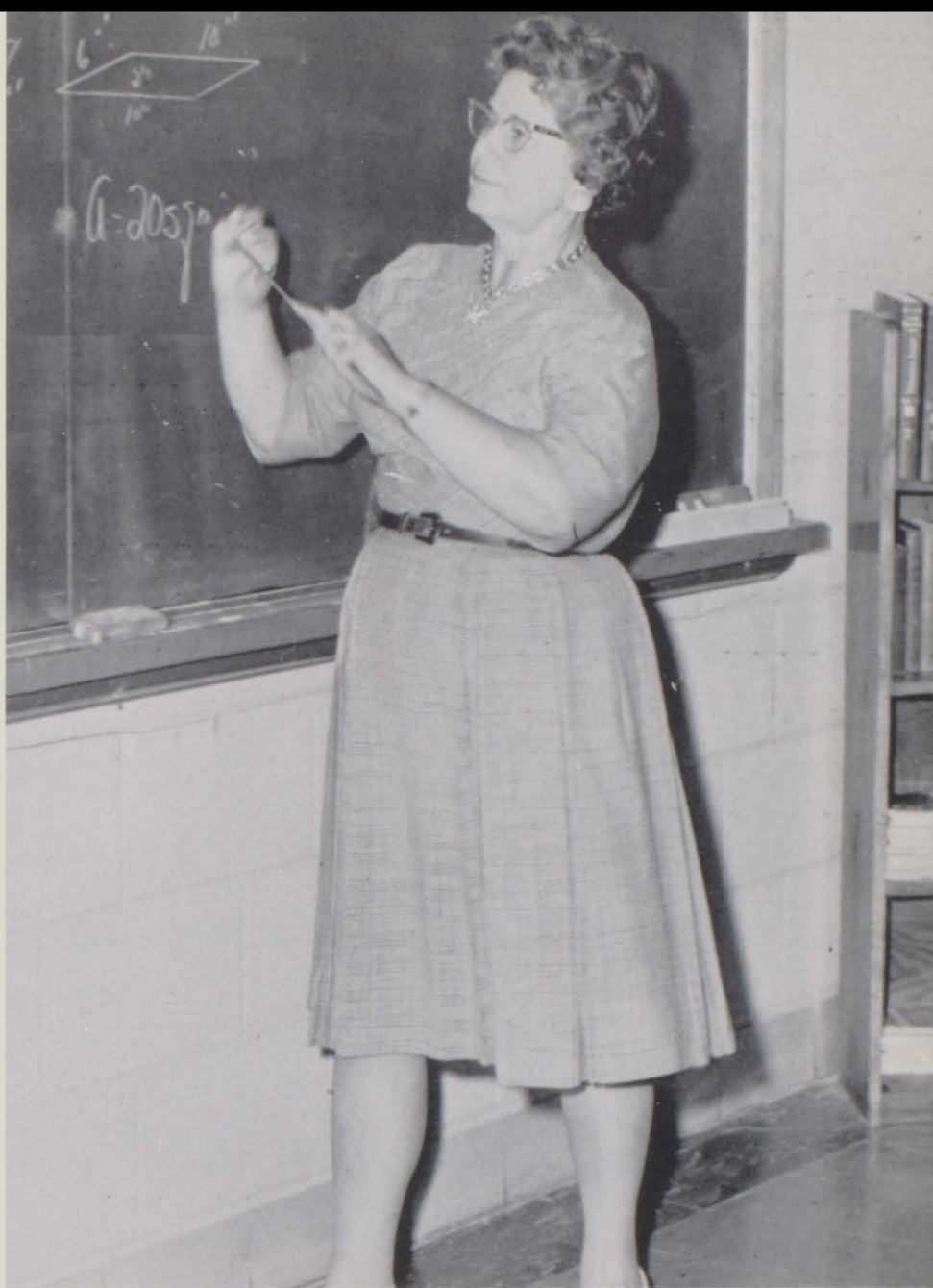

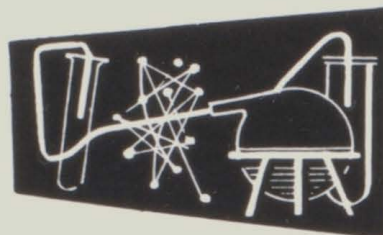
Science Department



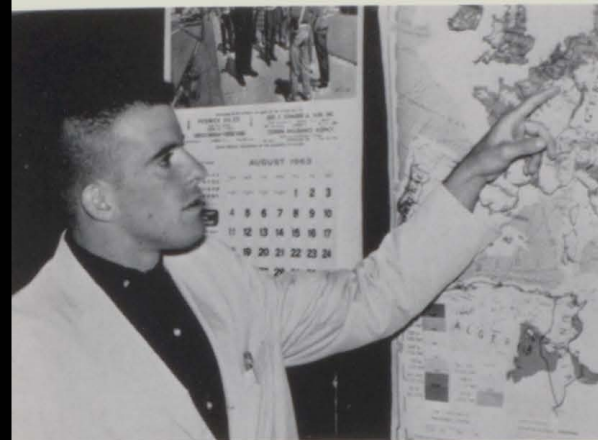
MR. OTTO BEHRENS

Meet Rolf Saligmann

Our Foreign Exchange Student From Bochum, Germany

Three days before my birthday I received the news from the American Field Service that I was going for one year to America as an exchange student. That was the best birthday present I ever got. We live in the big industrial part of Germany, the so-called Ruhr district. My home town, Bochum, lies about 100 miles eastward from Cologne.

On August 5th we left Rotterdam on board of the "Seven Seas," a ship 492 feet long. The voyage took 10 days. There were 700 A.F.S. students on the ship. We had a lot of fun. Finally on August 15th we entered New York. The huge skyscrapers of Manhattan shone upon by the rising sun, that's a view I shall never forget.

My new family had come to New York to meet me there and all at once I began to love them. We spent a couple of hours in New York City. Mike and I climbed up the Empire State Building and we had a wonderful view over the whole town. At 4 o'clock we set off for Bainbridge and got here about three and one half hours later. It seemed to be a very kind and peaceful town and I knew that I would like it here. Mr. and Mrs. Purdy and Mike made me feel right at home.

The remaining part of our vacation my family and I spent at Guilford Lake. It was a wonderful two weeks and I was sad when school began on Sept. 5. There would be so many new people and I knew that the school system was very different from ours so I was looking forward a bit anxiously. But all, teachers and kids, were so very kind and helpful that I soon began to love our school. A great difference of the German high schools is that there every boy and girl has to take 10 to 13 subjects. Some of them are only taught twice a week, others every day. The school lasts only from 8 o'clock to 1:15. In this time we have six lessons. When I go back to Germany I shall have to go to school another 1½ years. Then I will go to a college and study economics.

Jean loved bright colors and in the Junior High hall hangs a gay painting dedicated to her memory.



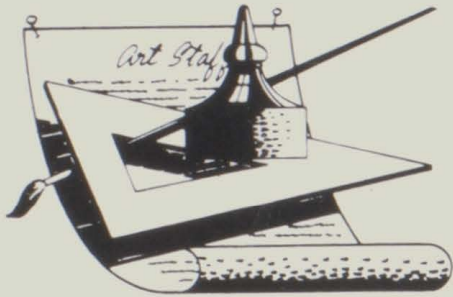

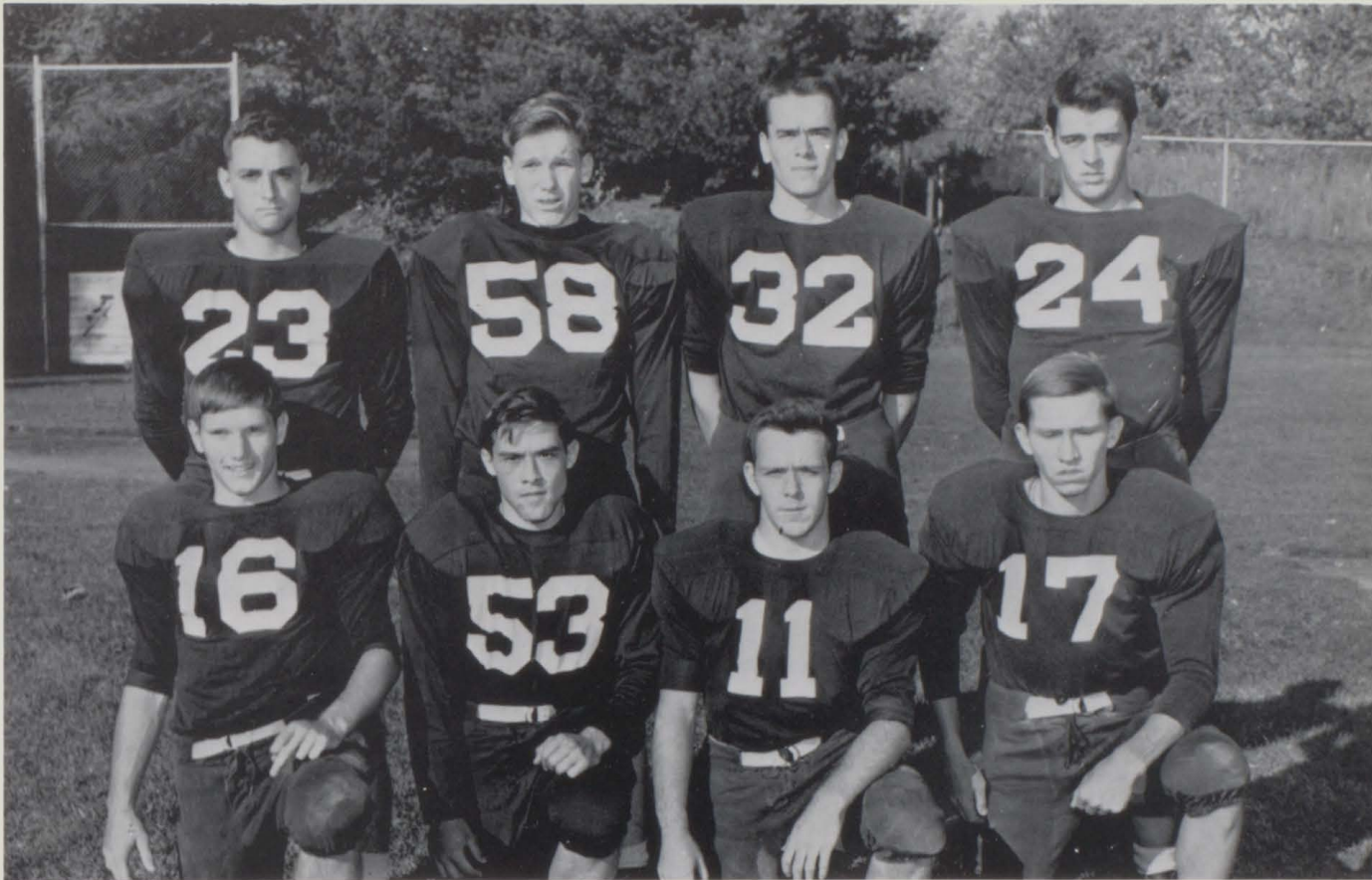

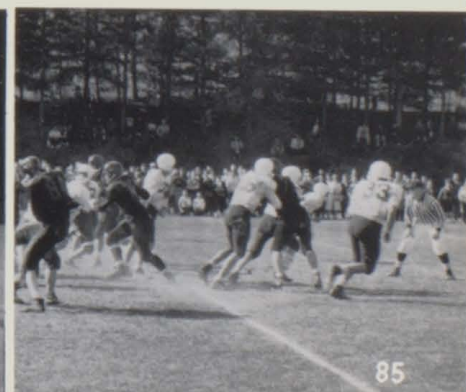

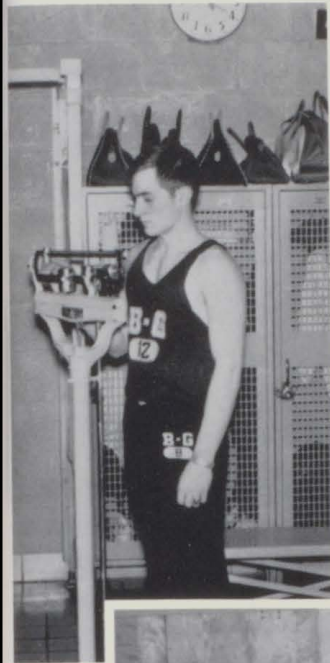

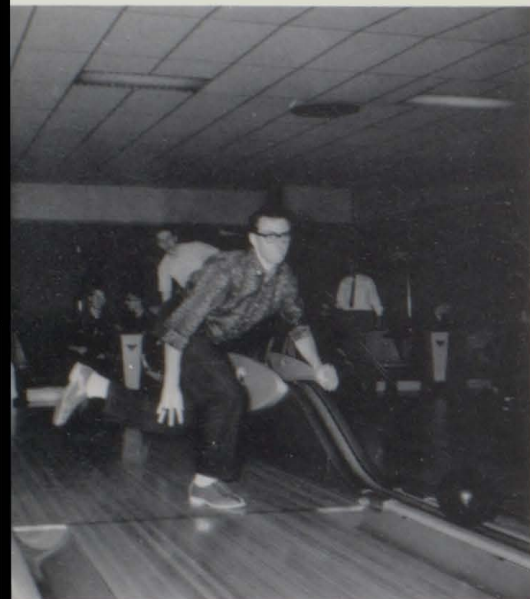

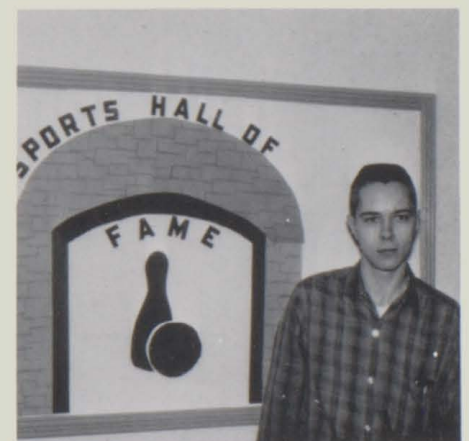

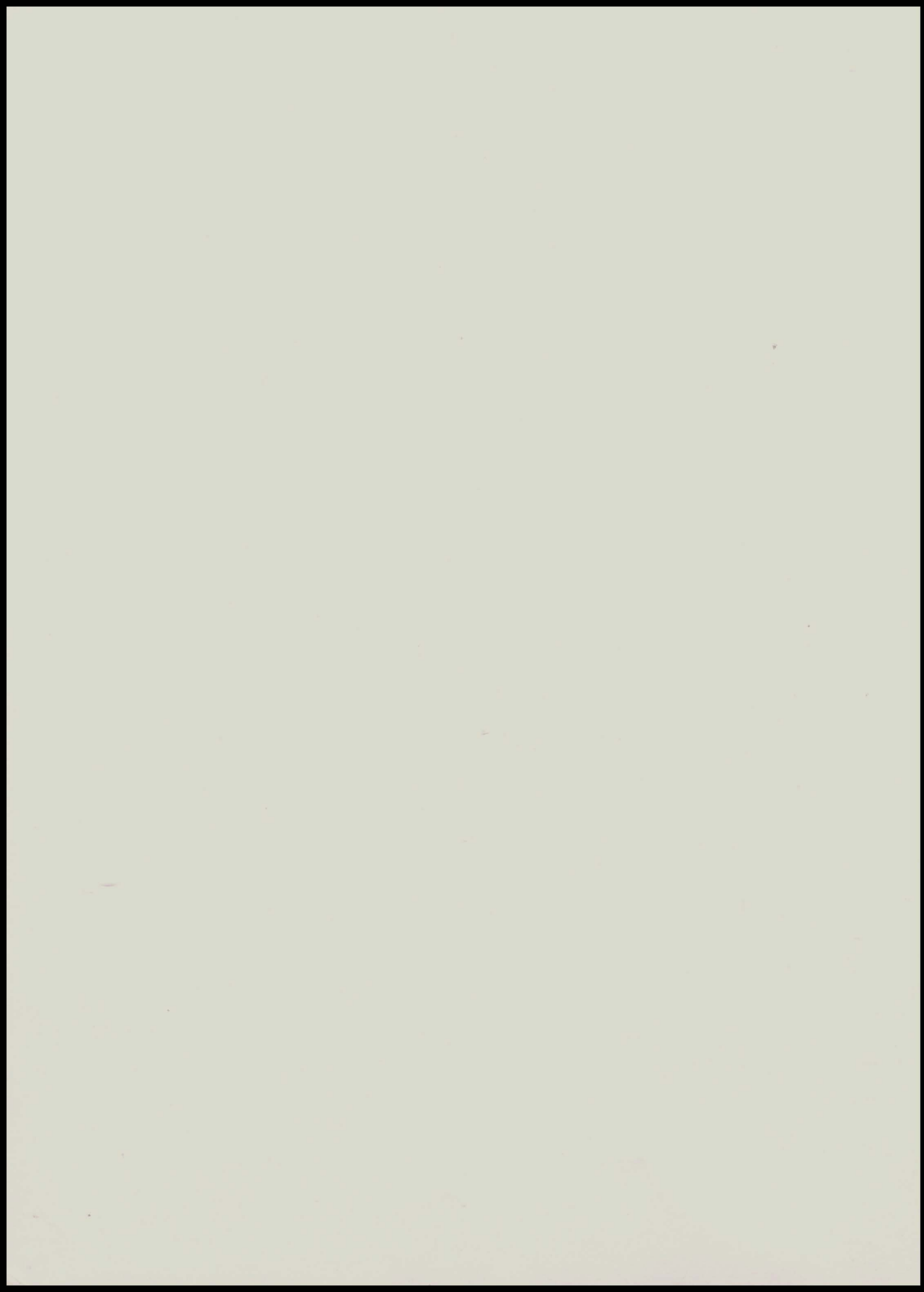

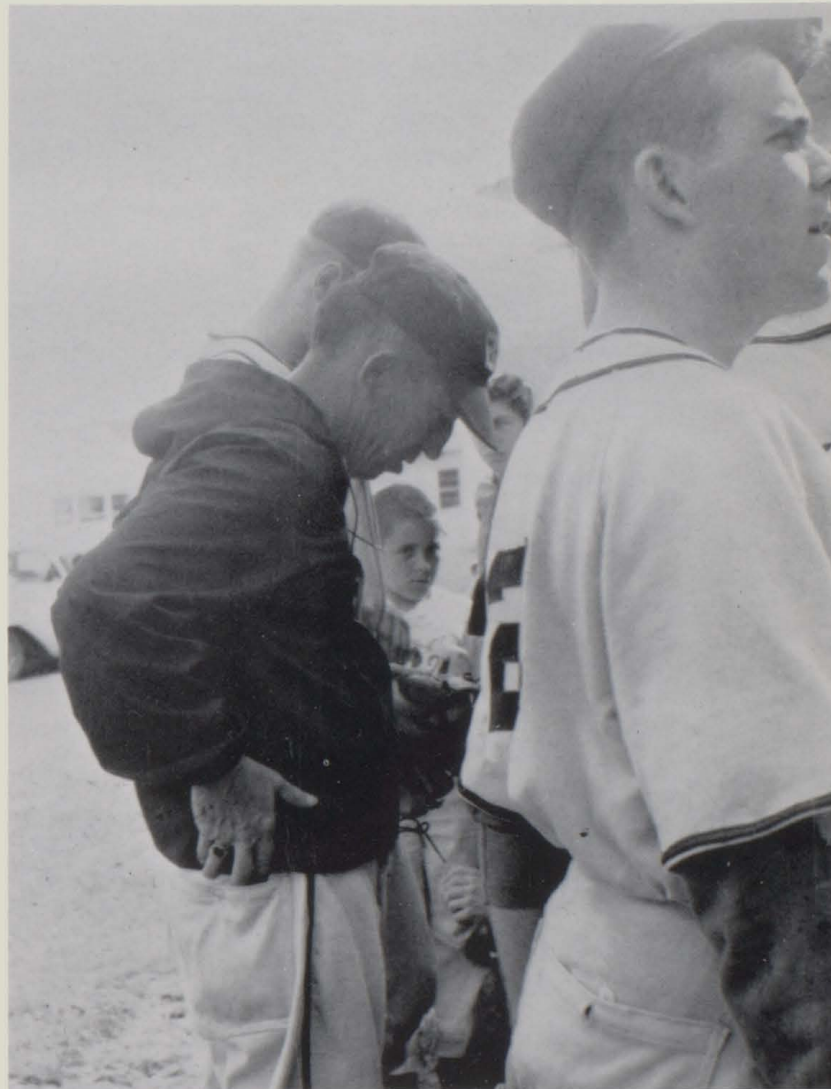
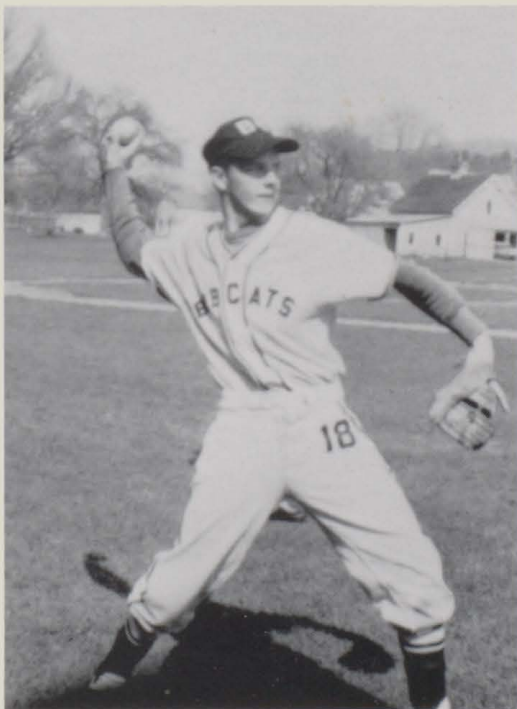
