


















B-G's Newest Sport "Hits the Road"

Another innovation manifested into the B-G's sports program this year is cross country. As the name implies, it's a long distance run of $2\ 1/2$ miles over hill and dale.








Everyone's happy-go-lucky friend, Chick Darling, is one of the most dependable seniors B-G has ever known.






