The selfsame gifts that you possess.

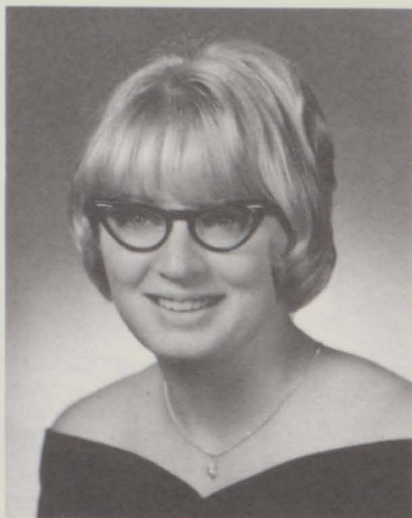

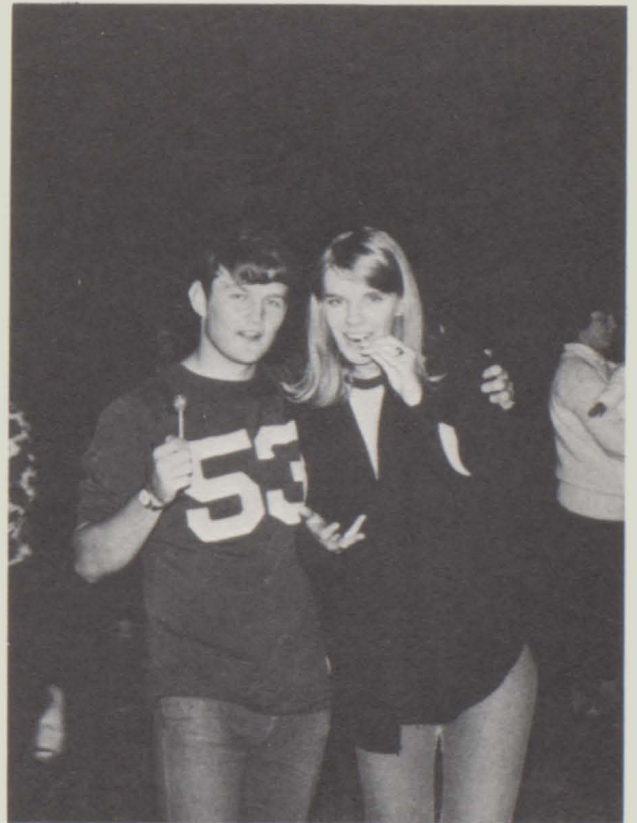

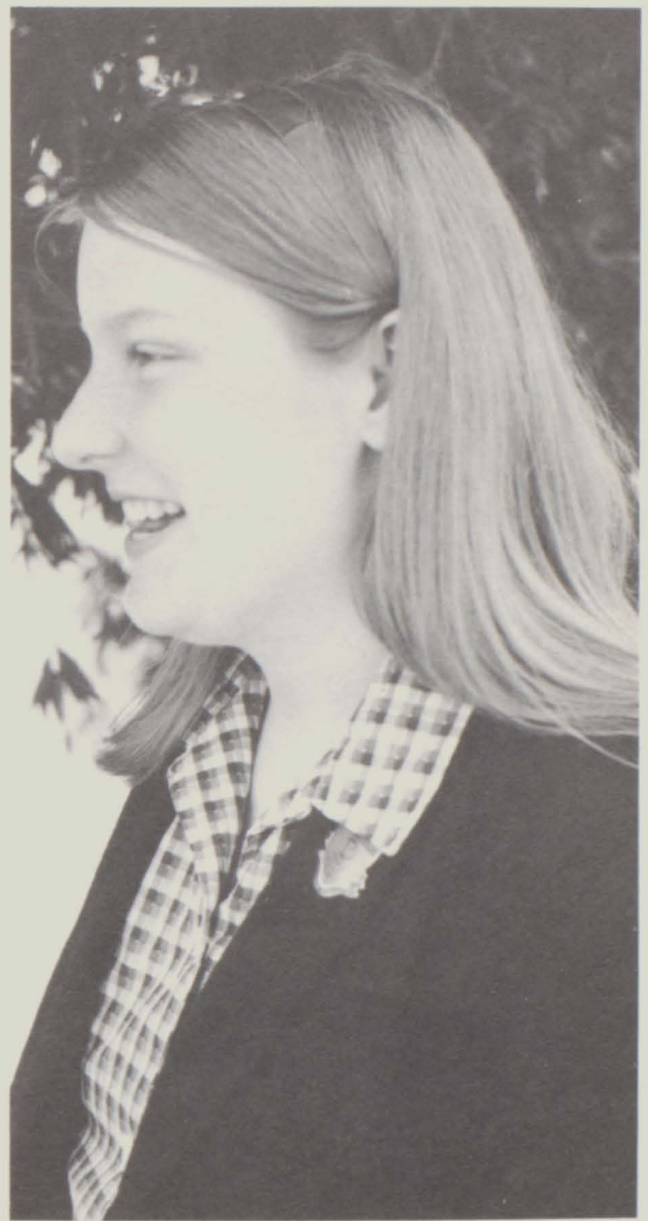
STRENGTHEN TIES MEXICO AND AUSTRALIA

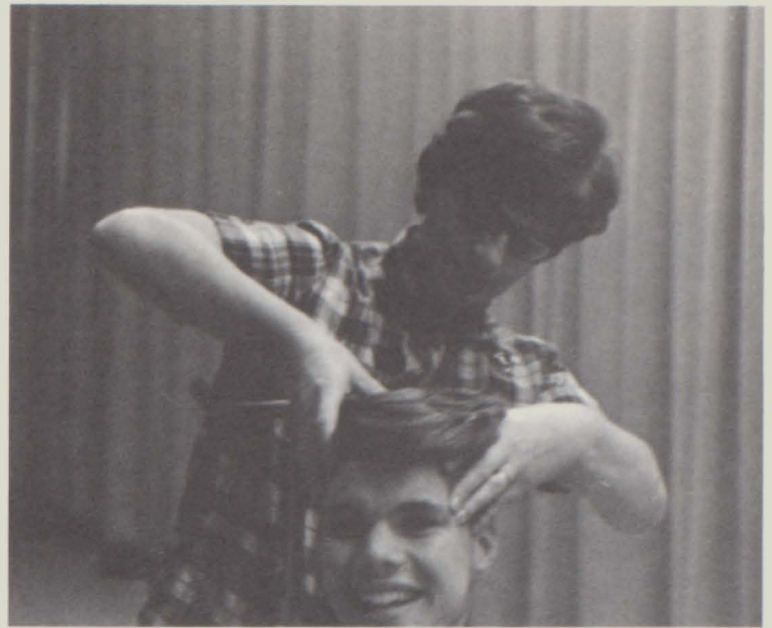
SENIORS PRODUCE A BROADWAY SHOW

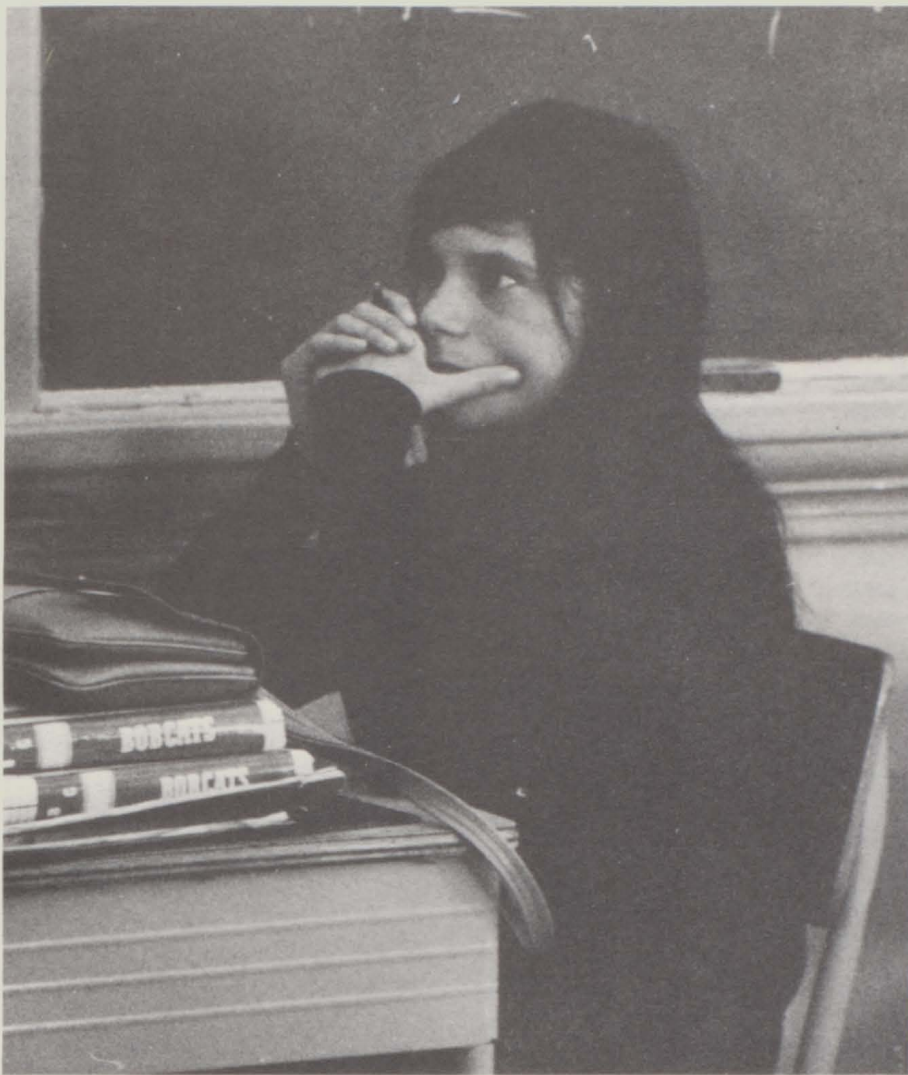

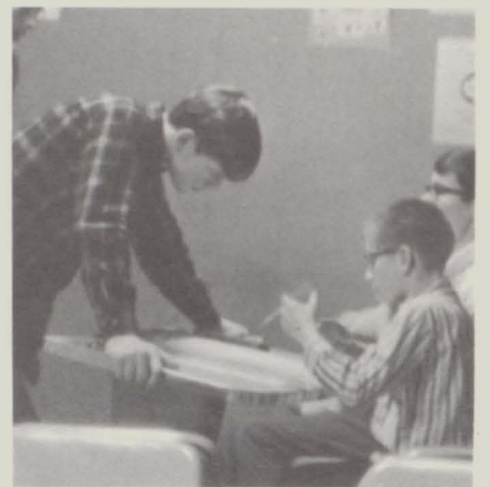

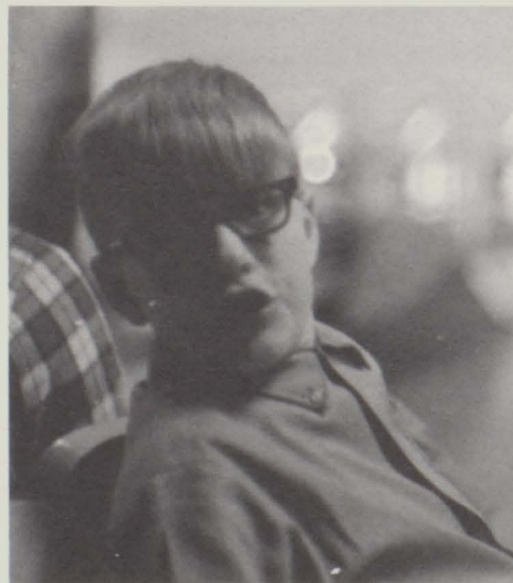

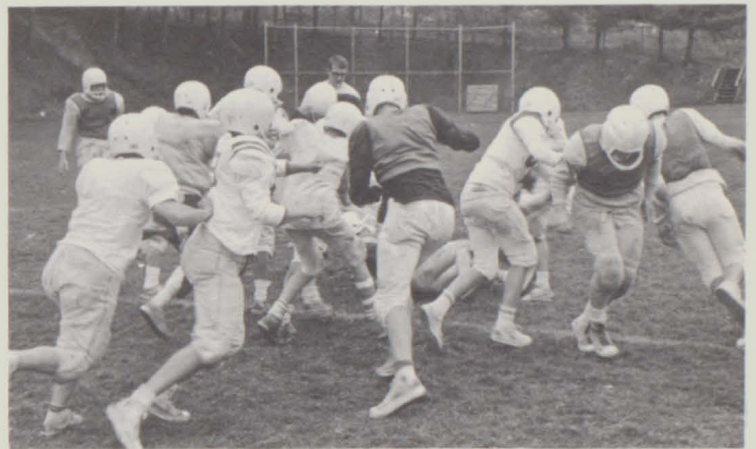

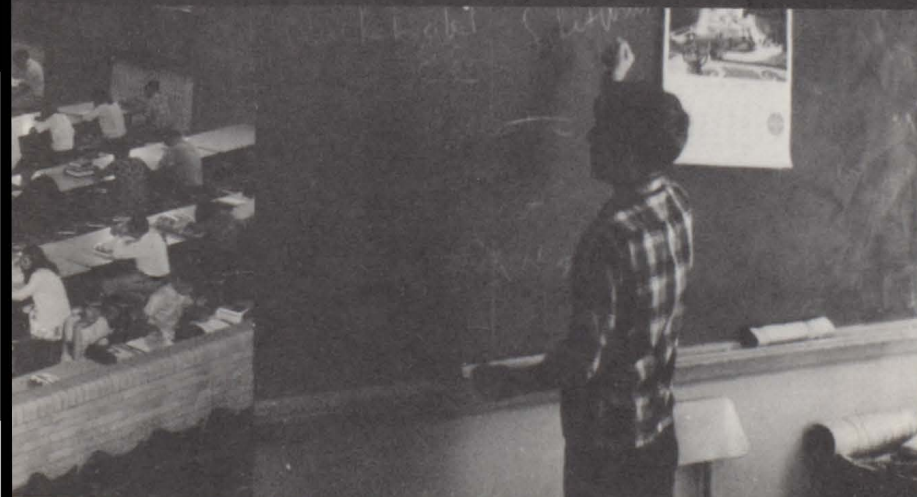






UNDERCLASSMEN

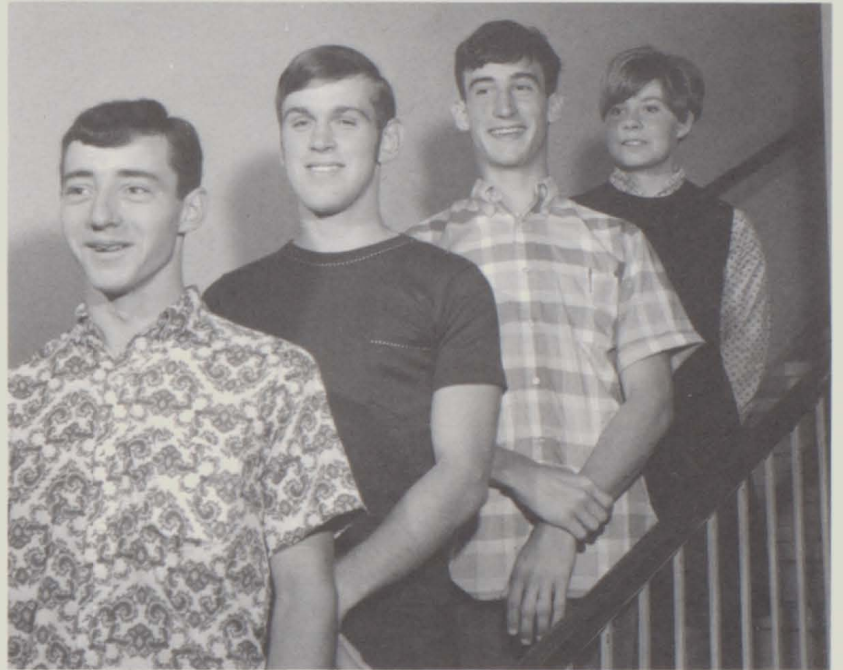

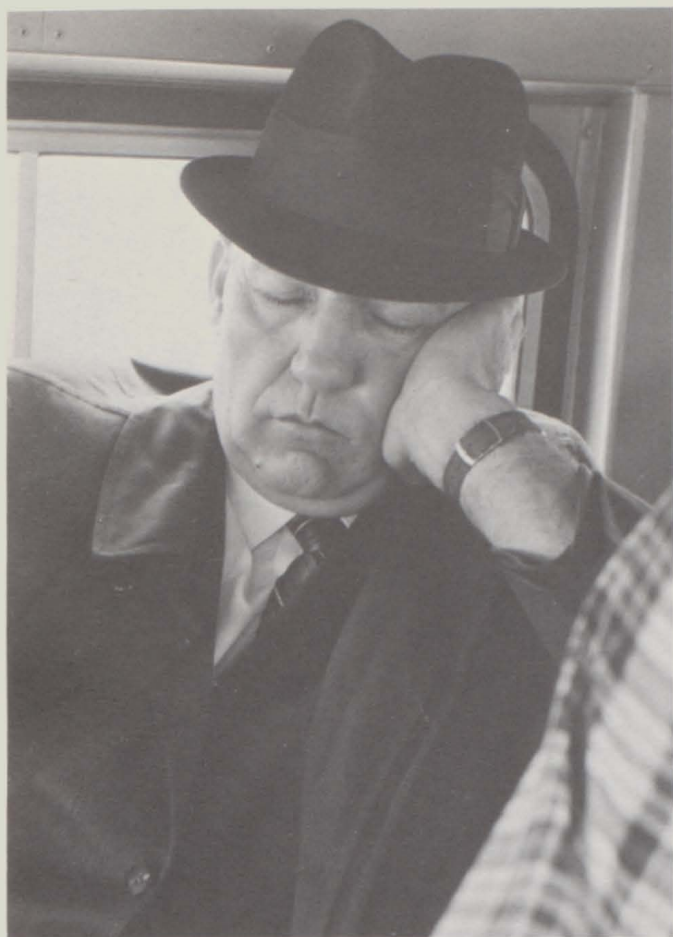

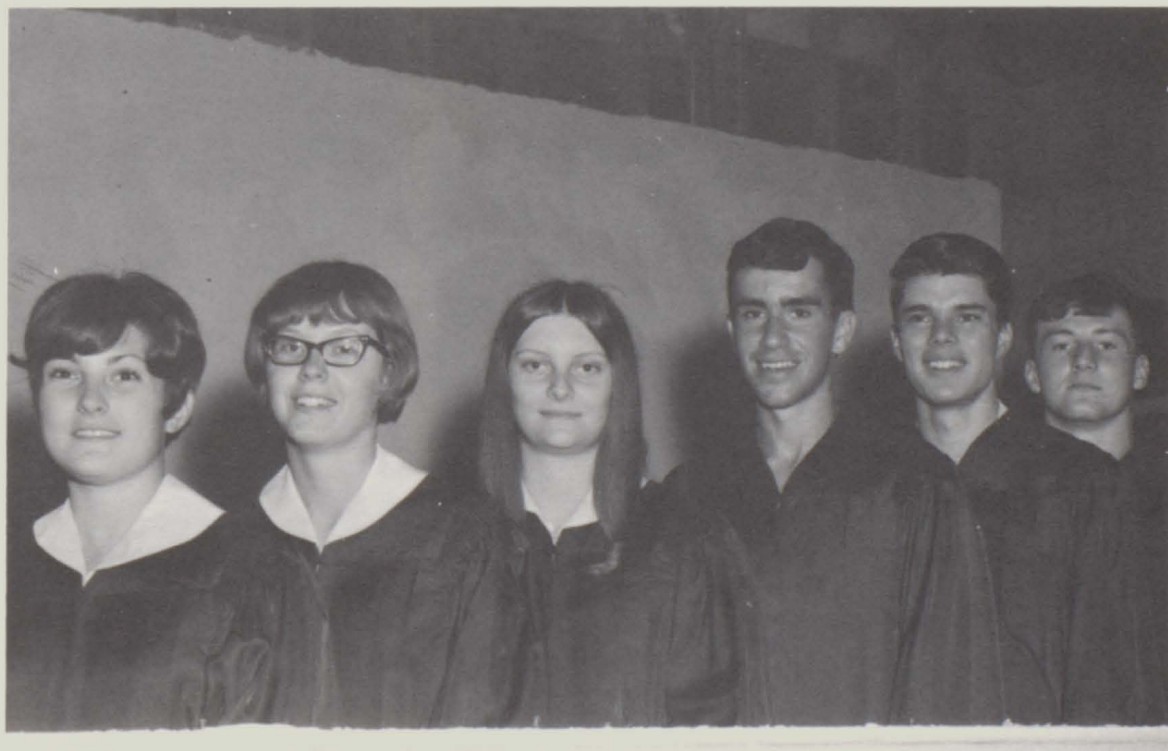

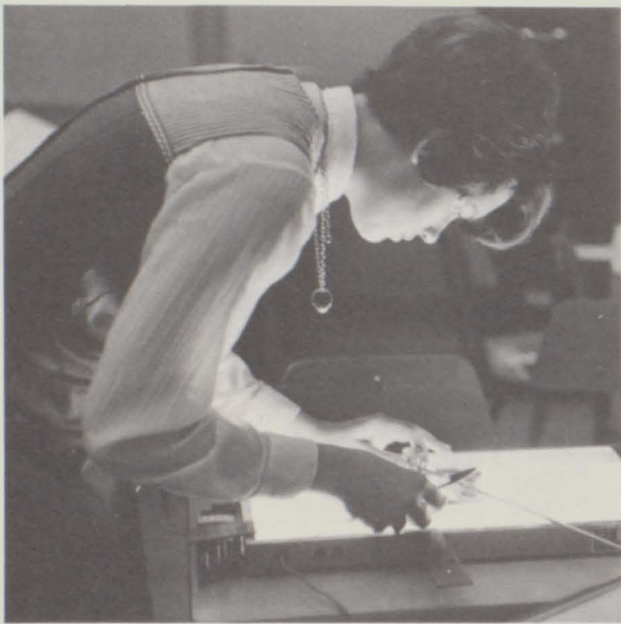

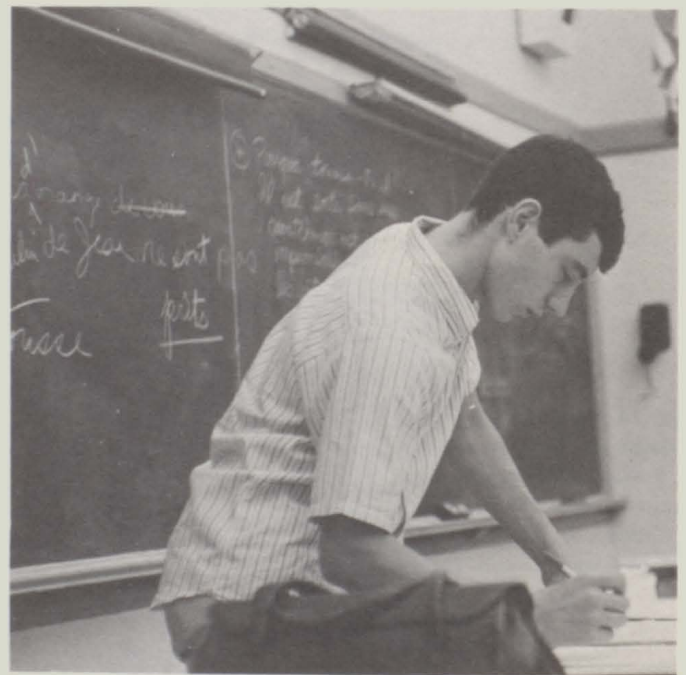

BOBCATS CLAW THEIR WAY TO LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP

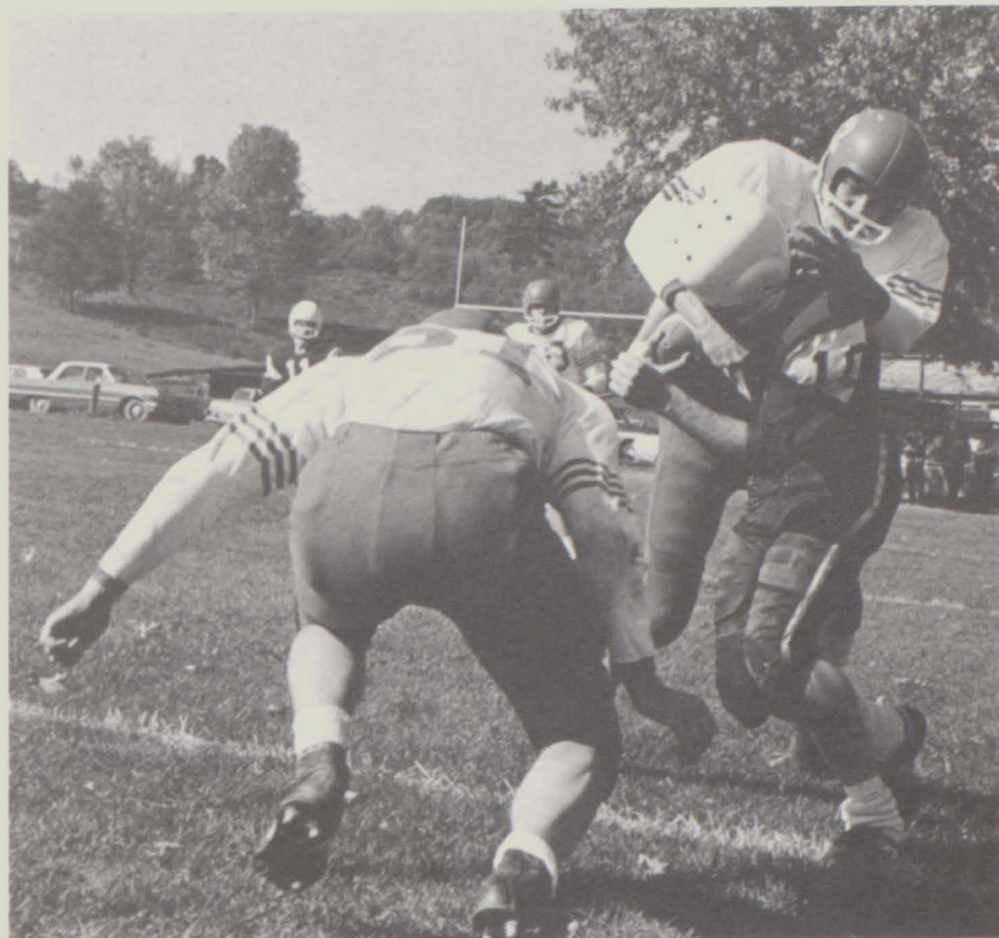
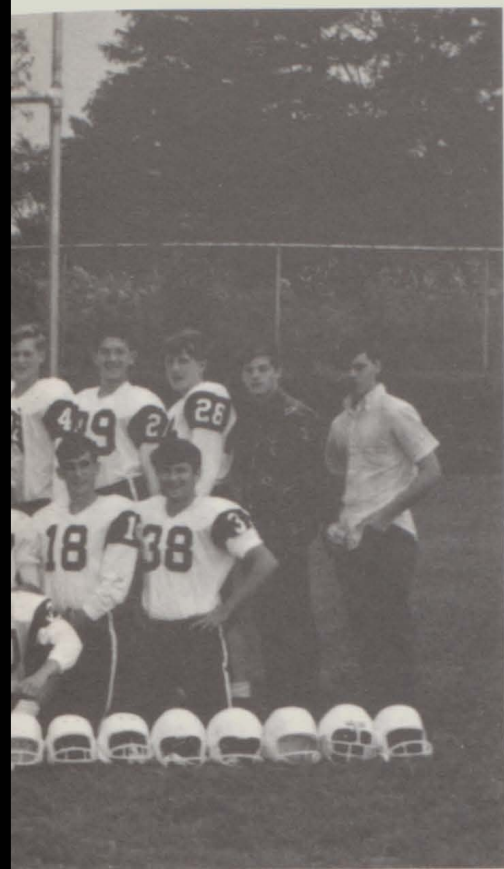

Led by new Head Coach Wallace and a host of seniors, Bobcat footballers had a great season. B-G won five games, losing one, and tying one. They ended up in a tie with Deposit for the league's top spot. B-G won the first four games of the season, and then the roof fell in. A 14-14 tie by Harpursville and then a 20-6 defeat by Lowly Unatego were the only blemishes on the Bobcat record. The Bobcats rebounded, however, with a 35-0 defeat of Oxford on the last day of the season.

B-G had a veteran team; 9 starters on the offense were seniors. The Bobcats led the league in almost every department. B-G led in points scored with 196 and in defense with only 64 points let up in 7 games. The two top scorers in the Pioneer Association were both from B-G: Bill Davis and Jim Foster were both tied for the lead in that department. Davis, a 150 lb., 5'7" senior, led the team in offensive statistics. He had 696 yards rushing and was above the 1000 yard mark in total offense. Foster, on the other hand, was valuable as a pass receiver. He led the team in receptions and averaged a fantastic 28 yards per catch. Doing the passing, was senior quarterback Mike Caracciolo. Mike was one of the area's leading passers. He completed 45 of 90 passes for 802 yards and 10 touchdowns. The defense, led by seniors Ron Miller, Mike Smith, and Bob Parsons showed real aggressiveness all season. The 64 points let up by the defense was the low for the league and again one of the area's best. Bill Davis also played spectacular defense. He was credited with 9 interceptions off the opposition's passers.

Football 1967 was something to see; the Bobcats possessed the ingredient which separates the winners from the losers—spirit. One never saw so much enthusiasm and pep as was evident in the 1967 team. Congratulations to all involved in making the season the smashing success it was.

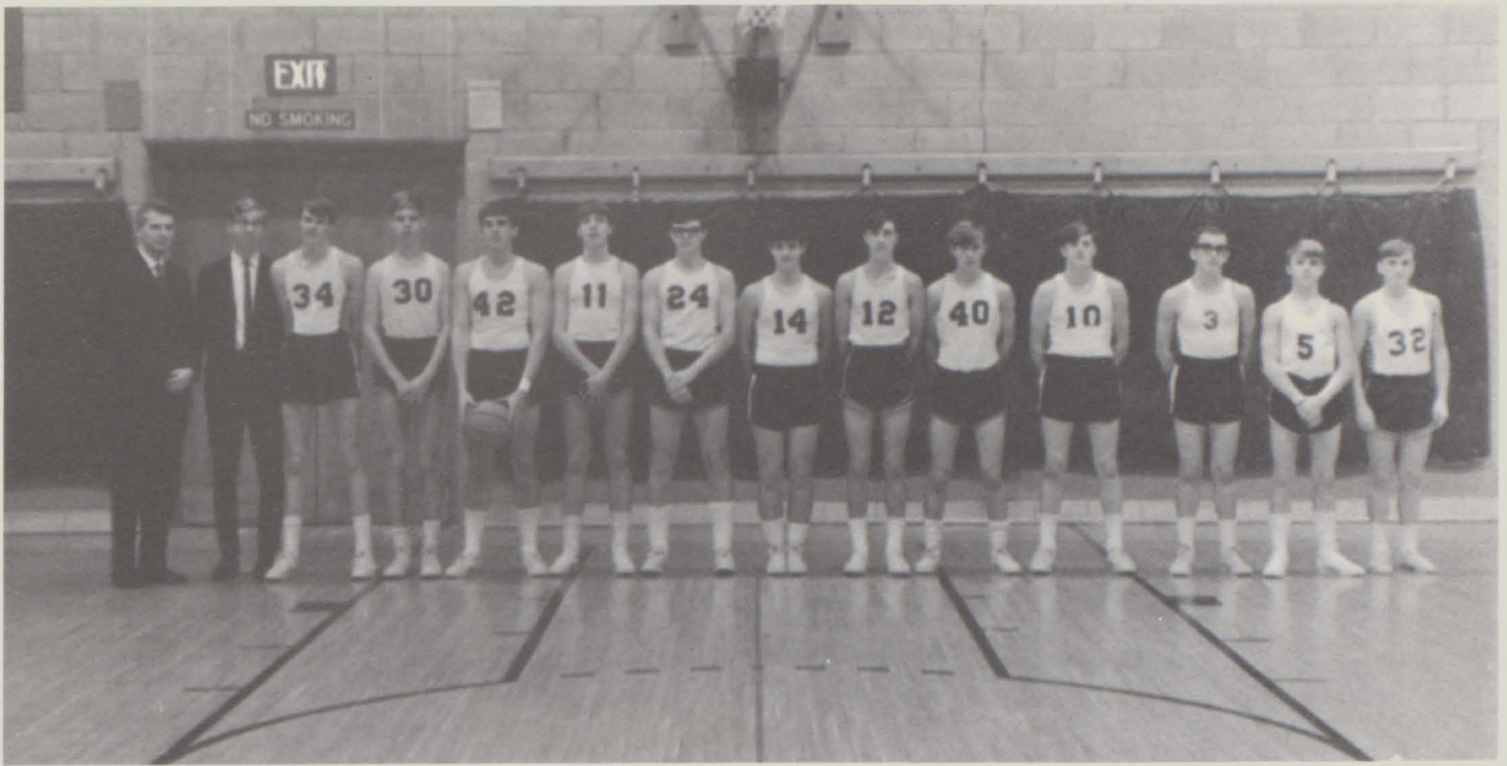
This was the 4th year of cross country at B-G. Each year our teams get better and compile more excellent records. Next year look out for the best team ever produced by B-G in this relatively new sport.

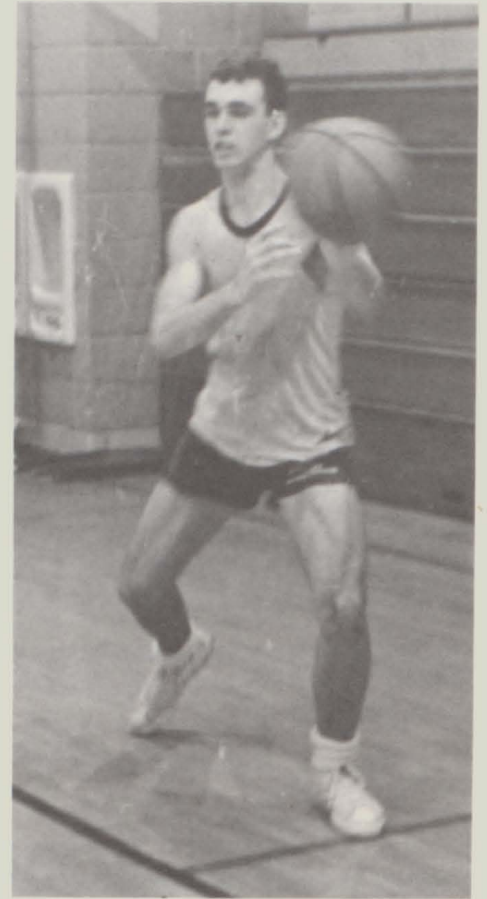

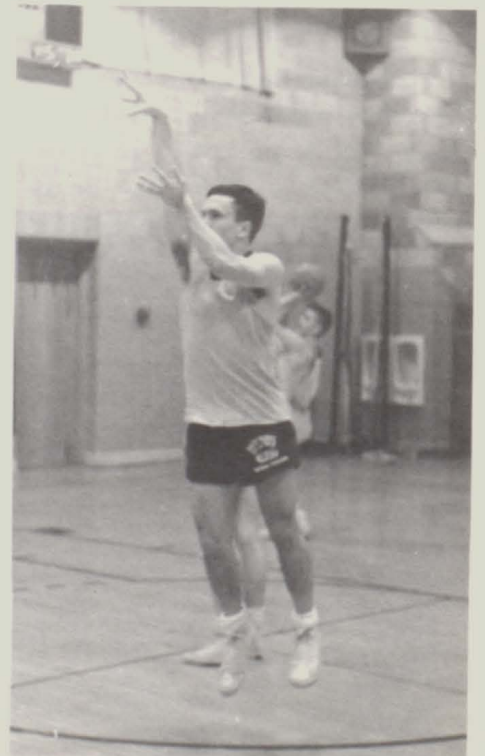

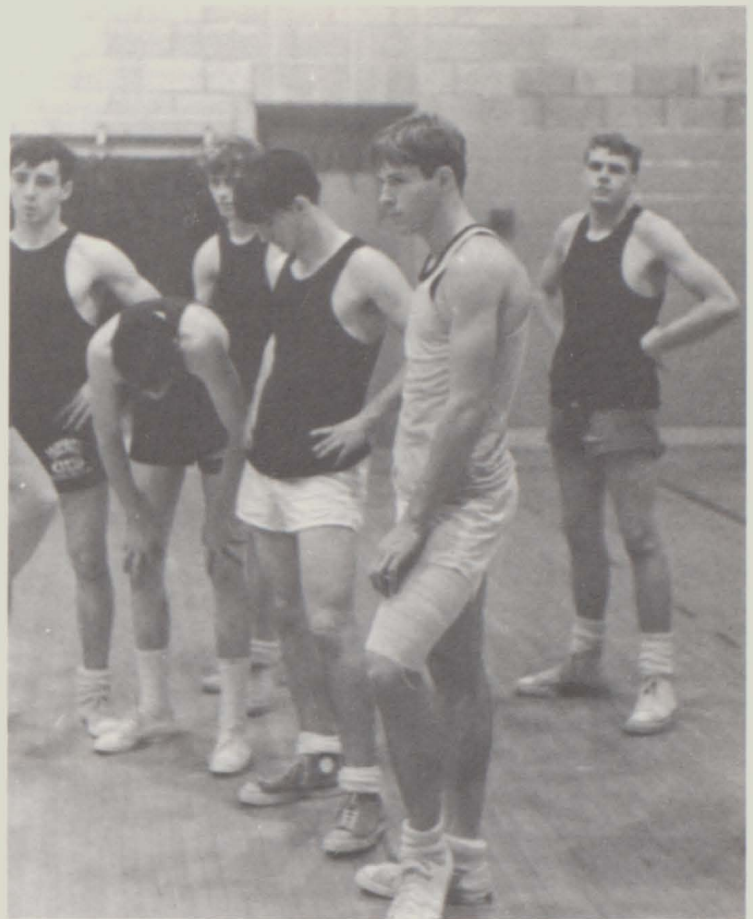

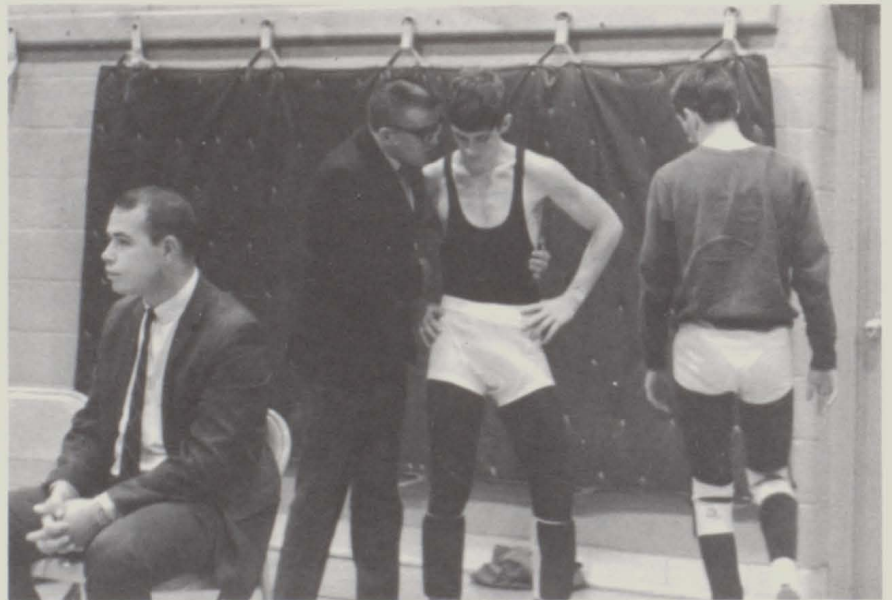

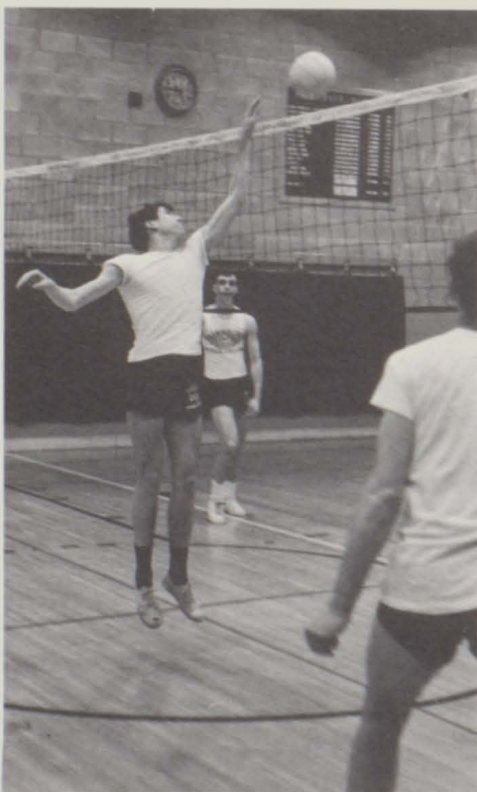

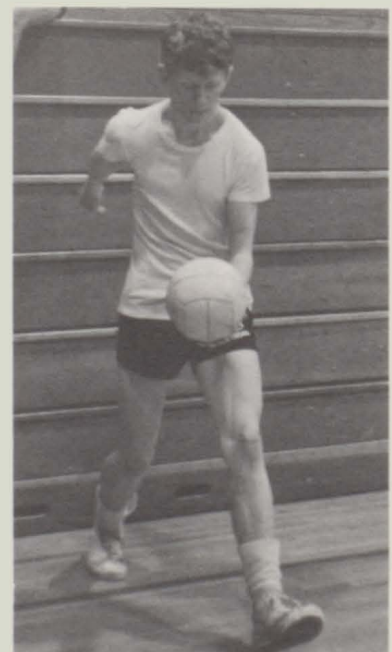

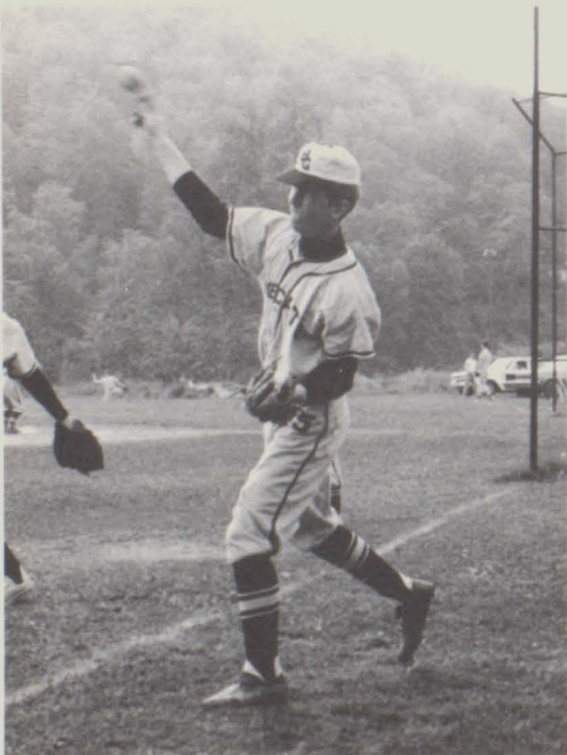

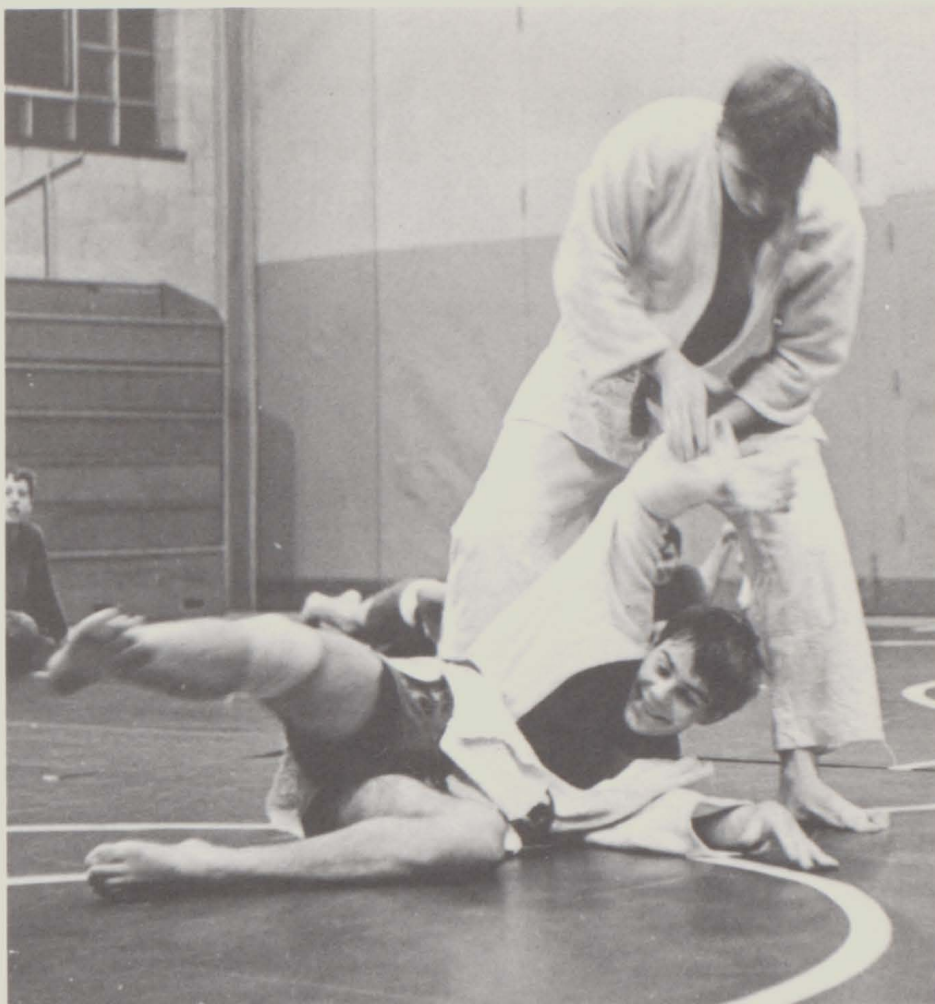

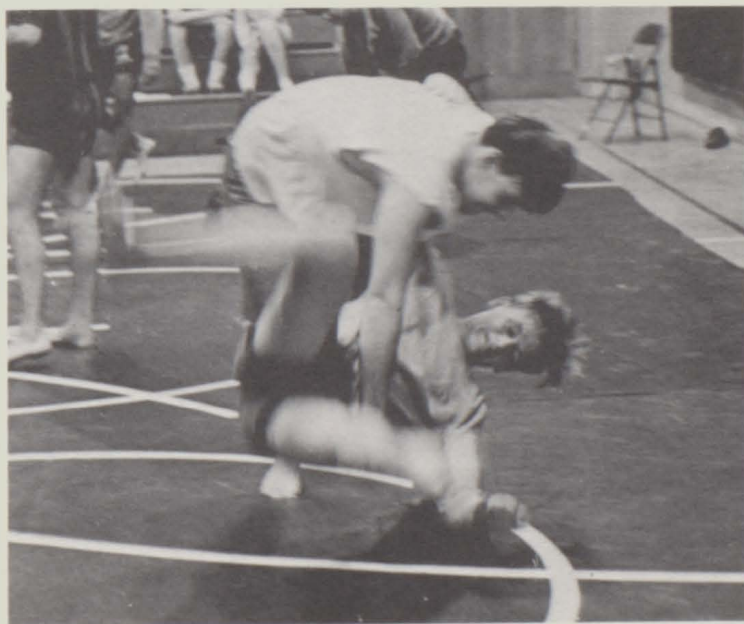


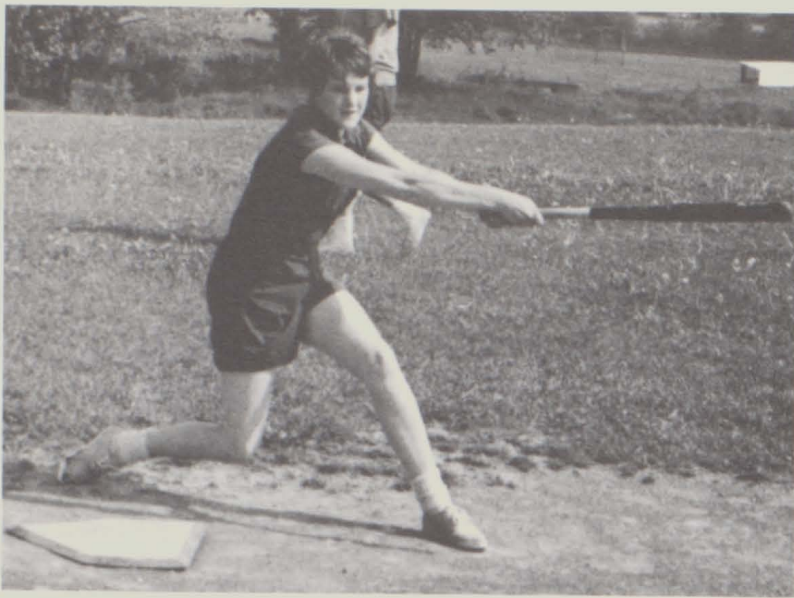
