

This year the English Department will enter into the third year of its new program. This program divides all students of each class into levels, each with a different curriculum. This enables the students who are planning to go to college to take a college preparatory course in their final year. This is proving successful and the English Department plans to continue it.

This year has also been a very important one to our Language Department. Under our reconstruction plan, the department has moved into its new language suite. It has a Listen and Response Lab for thirty students under the supervision of the instructor and an independent study center for five students for Listen, Respond, and Record. This is the multimedia center for independent study which enables students to advance at their own pace.





To insure success in the business world of today, it is necessary to achieve a large commercial and vocational background.



Creative arts encourage self-expression

We at B-G are fortunate to have one of the finest physical education departments in the area. As our school has grown, so has our physical education staff, with Miss Reeves our newest addition to this staff. Basic to all our sports teams are the techniques learned in every gym class. It is here that all of our athletes get their introduction to their chosen sports. Our physical education department is also important in furthering our school's image.

Art plays an important part in building the cultural background of B-G's students. Using various materials they learn self-expression. At Christmastime, they decorate the classroom doors to help increase holiday spirit. In the spring, samples of the students' work is sent to Roberson Memorial in Binghamton for display. The artwork is judged, and any winning pieces are sent on to national competition. 








































