



In life how far you go, and how high you rise

And time slips away in silence — not with a roar.


Man is the only creature aware of his death. He is aware that life is terminable. If he lives with the advantage of such valid knowledge, He can carefully plan his future and make it discernible.

Whether your lot be very rich or very poor, Whether your life be three score or four The use of your time is the secret, you know, For one gets from life what one bargains for.


Seconds tick away one at a time Minutes, hours and days, pass one by one. Years all too quickly fade away, And before you know it, life is done.




### About Our Cover Artist




So if he comes do not flee 'cause a few, you know, will get off free.
