



Balancing Work and Play by . . . THE CLASS OF 1992


The Year of the Class Ring for . . . THE CLASS OF 1993






A Look Toward The Future by... THE CLASS OF 1994


Overall, the freshman year is a time when change is usually looked upon as good, because it signifies that they truly are growing up and taking a "Look Toward The Future."
















The Trials and Tribulations of . . . THE CLASS OF 1996




















... Behind the scenes of the LONG EXPECTED YEARBOOK














hree active academic departments this year were the English, Art, and Business departments. Through these groups many stu-

They were accepted for the program in lieu of in-class activities in government, and completed numerous requirements including reports back to their Social Studies class about their experiences. Colleen VanPelt also spoke to the 12th grade social studies about her experiences as a foreign exchange student in Belgium

Home Economics classes, taught by Mrs.

Margaret Wicks and Mrs. Judy Volkert participated in many projects this year. Mrs. Wicks' Housing and Environment was visited by Mr. Peter Foster of N.Y.S.E.G. who lectured the class on how to conserve energy. He told the class how we can all conserve energy at home by taking showers rather than baths, using fluorescent light bulbs rather than incandescent, and washing full loads of clothes rather than one or two items. Mr. Foster stressed how important insulating our homes is, and that just six inches of fiberglass is equivalent to seven feet of brick. Mrs. Volkerts Clothing and Textiles class made baskets of rope and cloth. Mrs. Wicks' Housing and Environment class made wreaths of dried apples, and decorated them with ribbons and cinnamon.

Students in technology were faced this year with problem solving. Mr. Bartlett and Mr. Lyons gave their students problems to physically solve. Some of these projects included building a container which could prevent the breaking of a raw egg from a seven foot drop, making windpowered cars to race in the auditorium, and making something that can be used daily from a twelve foot block of wood.

BAND we toot our own horn!




Coach Jody Hughes feels the team did well considering the fact that for the first few weeks of the season their tennis courts were being fixed and the team had to practice elsewhere. He
