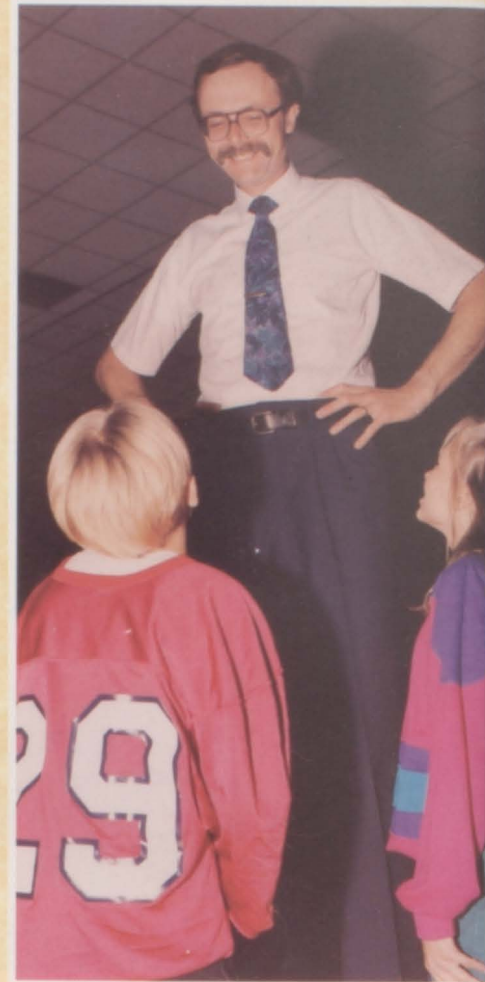
FUTURE

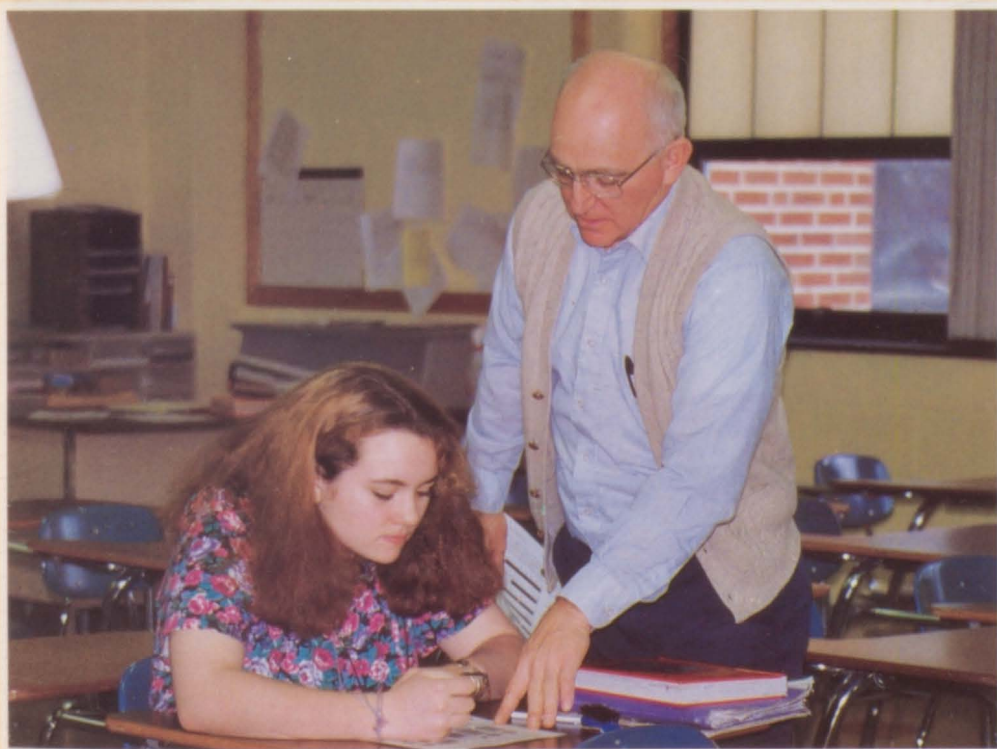

Each activity has its goal to better society and the school. By establishing and maintaining these academic and extracurricular activities, we have enabled ourselves to better our school and our lives.



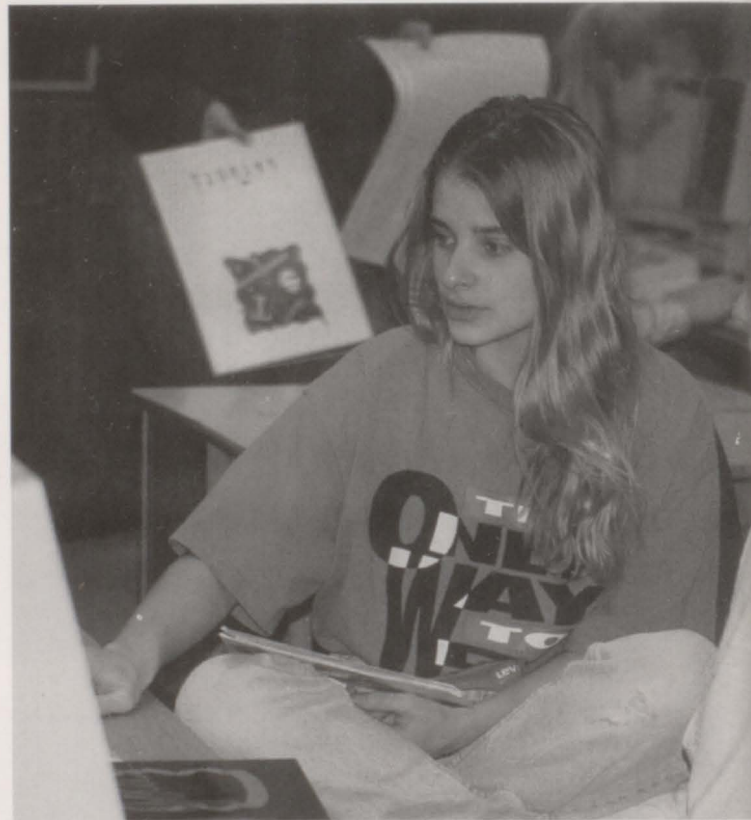

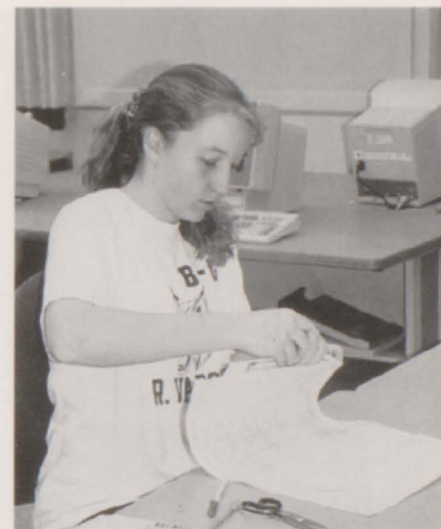
During the month of August, senior portraits were

Each representative for the class gets involved in working diligently to pull off an activity and works even harder pushing their fellow students to partic-

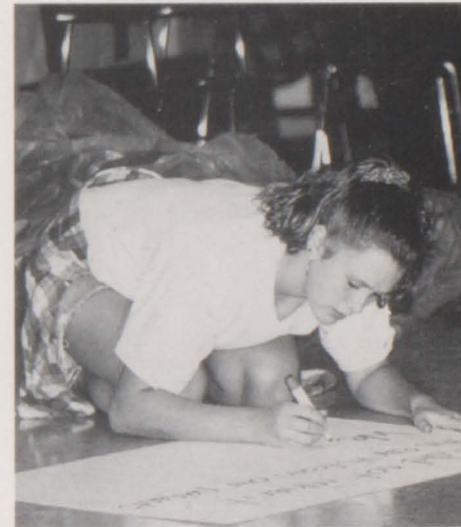
ipate. Every year, the student council maintains its goal to make school better.

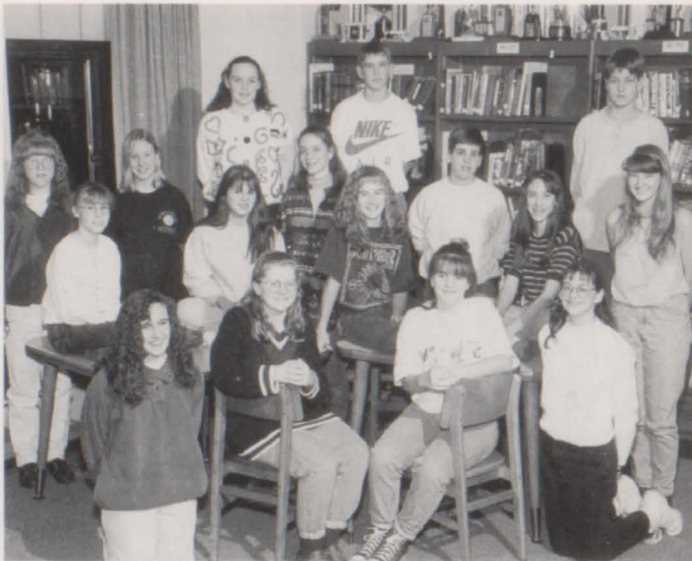

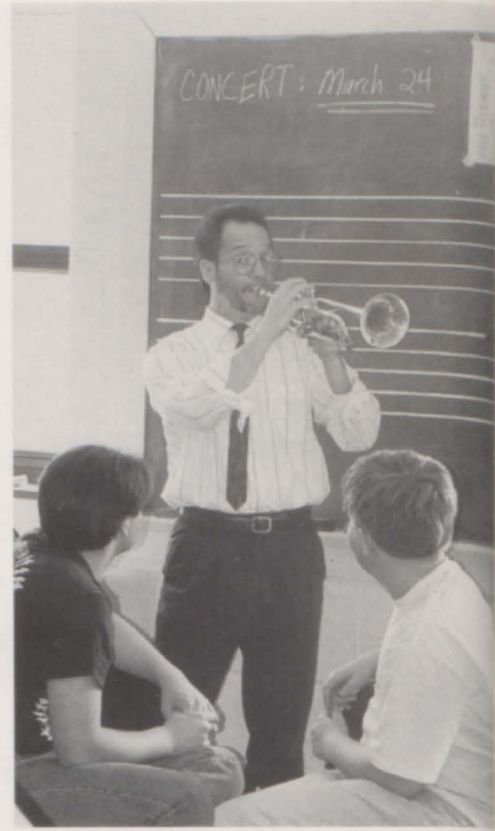

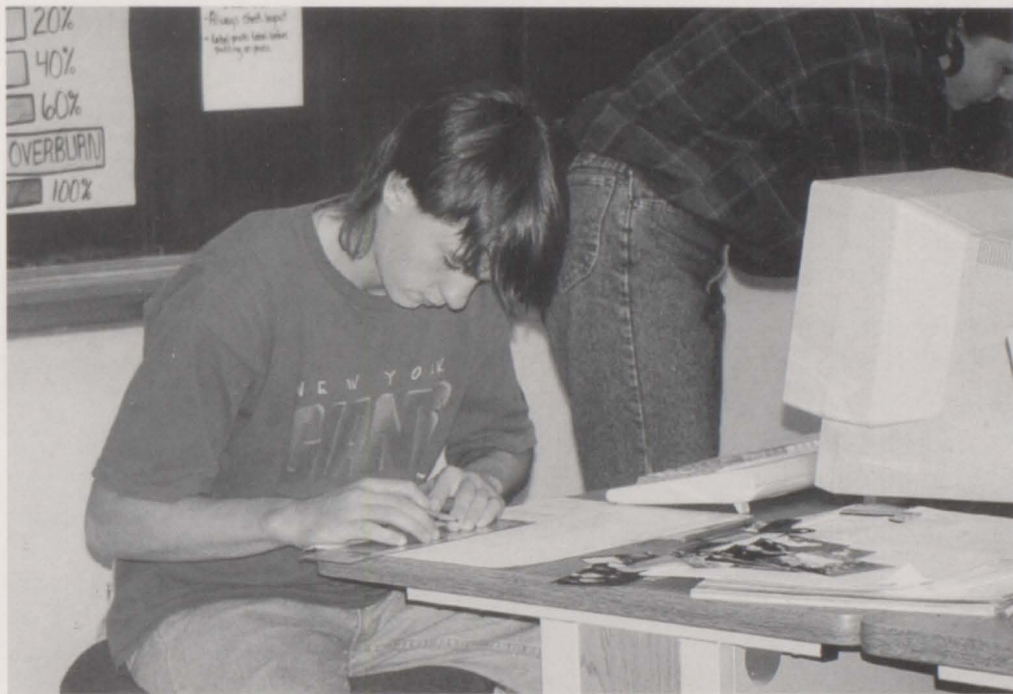

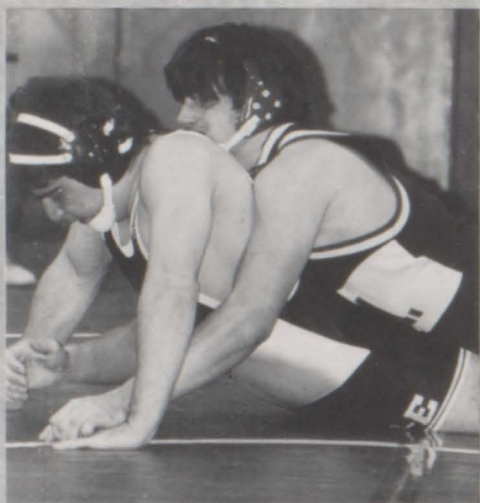

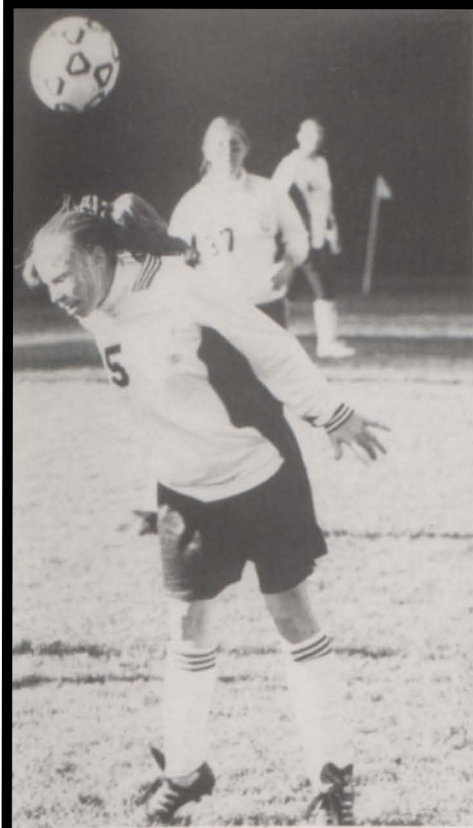

The B-G girls have come a long way since their first Varsity soccer season in 1989. Next year's team looks very promising as there are twelve players returning.

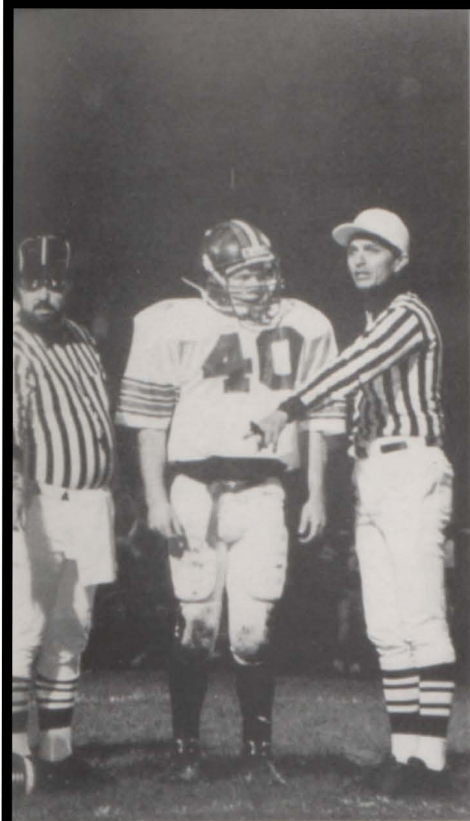

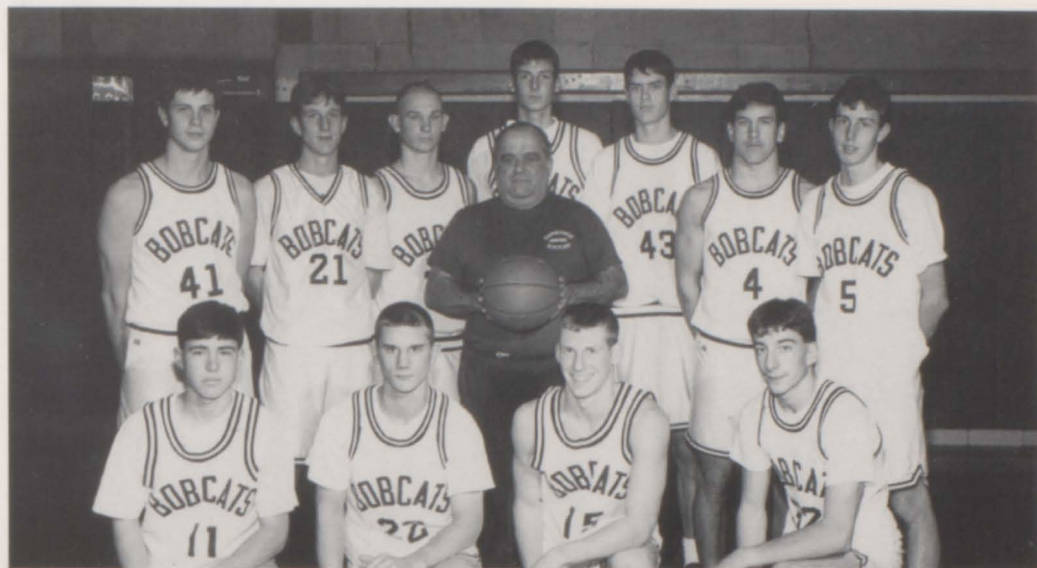

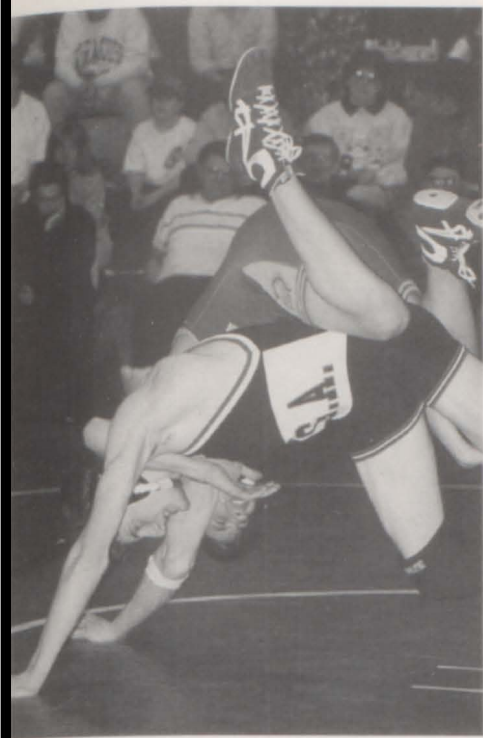

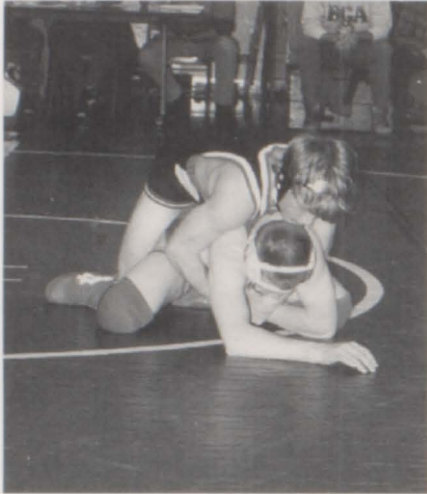

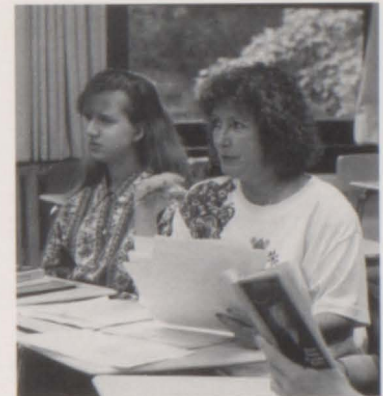
every other team is refreshing and adds volume to the class.

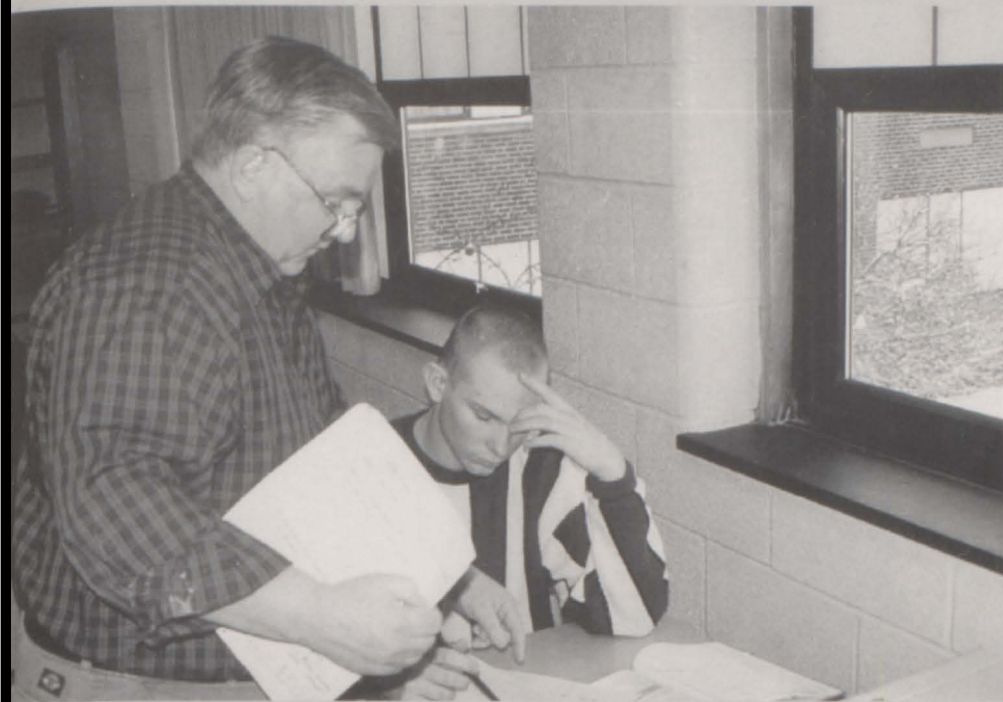

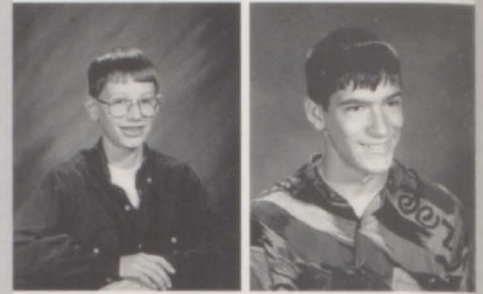
Leaving Their Mark

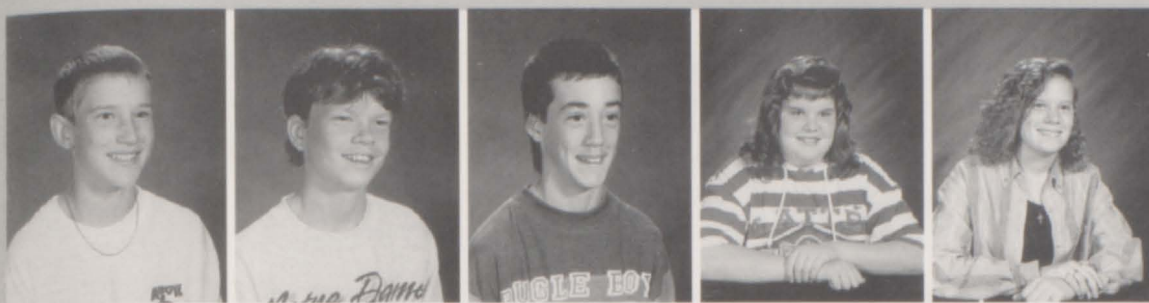

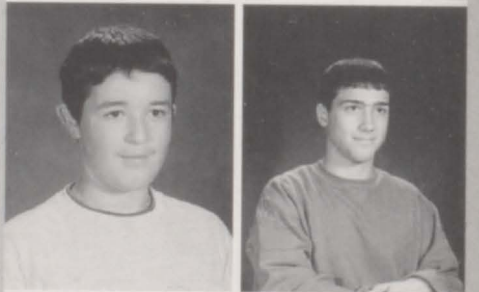
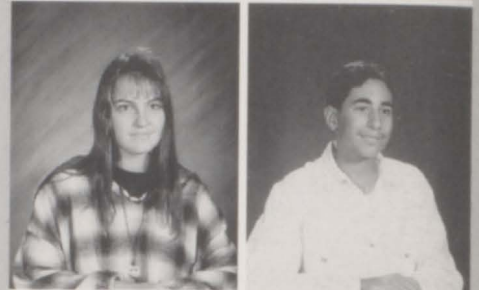
In their first year of high school the freshmen have adapted themselves to their busy schedules and yet they have been faced with the responsibility of academic and extracurricular activities.

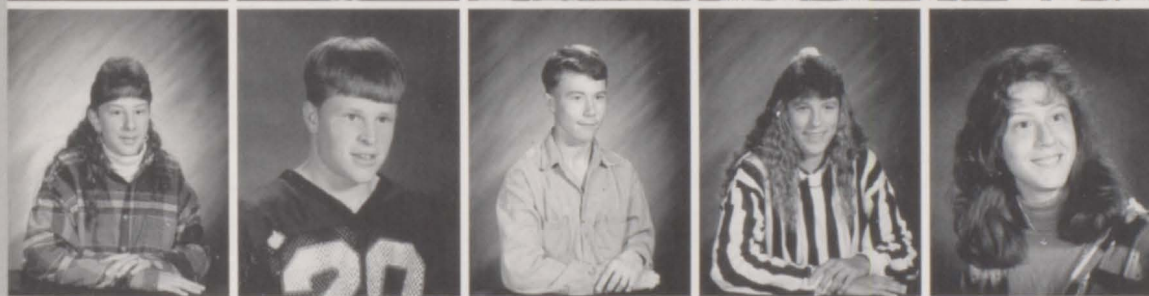

Turning on a Point

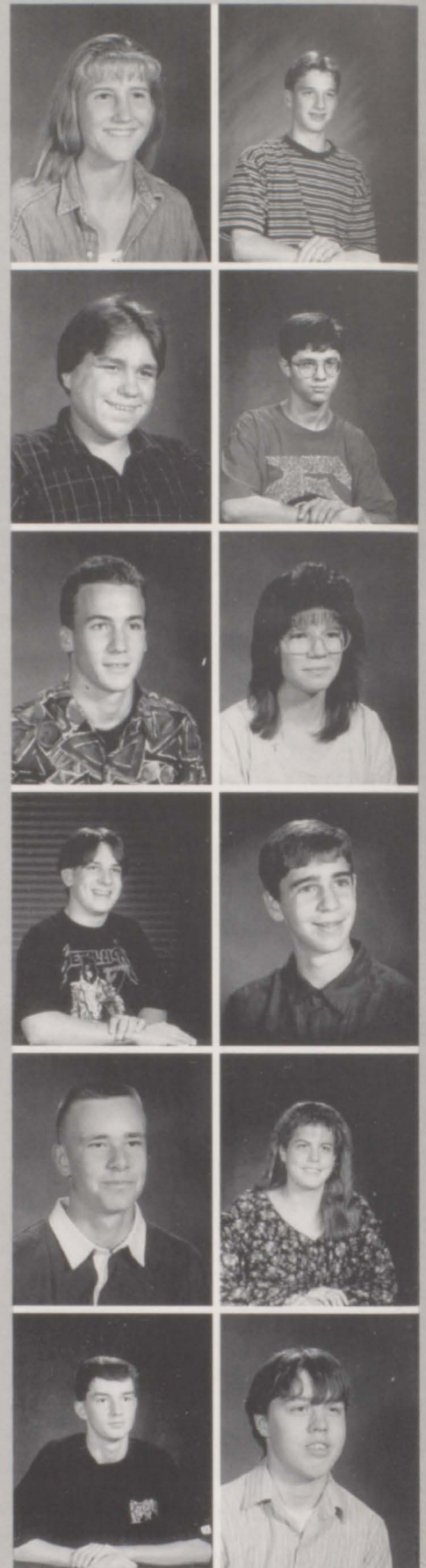
The sophomore year is often considered the turning point in one's high school career at B-G. The sophomores have both, through their activities, enhanced their present status and prepared for the future.

ture. Debating over current controversial topics in English 11 helped them improve their public speaking and logical thinking skills.

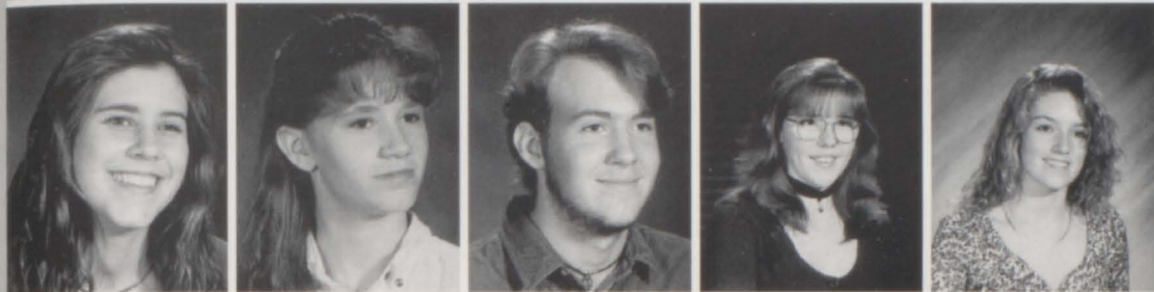
Finally SAT's were taken in May to test all that they've learned this year and to help open doors to colleges as they focus on bettering their own future.
