






us is capable of utilizing more than one stroke, and most of us were able to perform all four strokes well. All of what we were able to accomplish was the result of individual effort and our great coach.










The Houston Comets earn their third straight WNBA championship in September, beating the New York Liberty 59-47 to win in three straight games.






