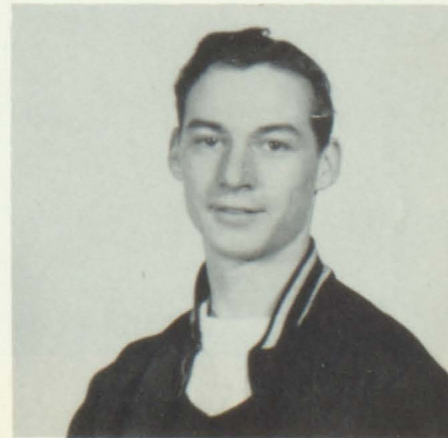
As our yearbook goes to press, baseball is just under way. No results have been seen, but certainly the baseball team will reflect the spirit of the Athletic Association.
