

In the years since Guilford Central School opened its doors, there have been two occasions upon which graduates of this school have been called upon to serve their country.


The 1953 TIGER is dedicated to the three men pictured on this page, who have given their lives that our school, our homes, and our country may still shine brightly in today's world.
