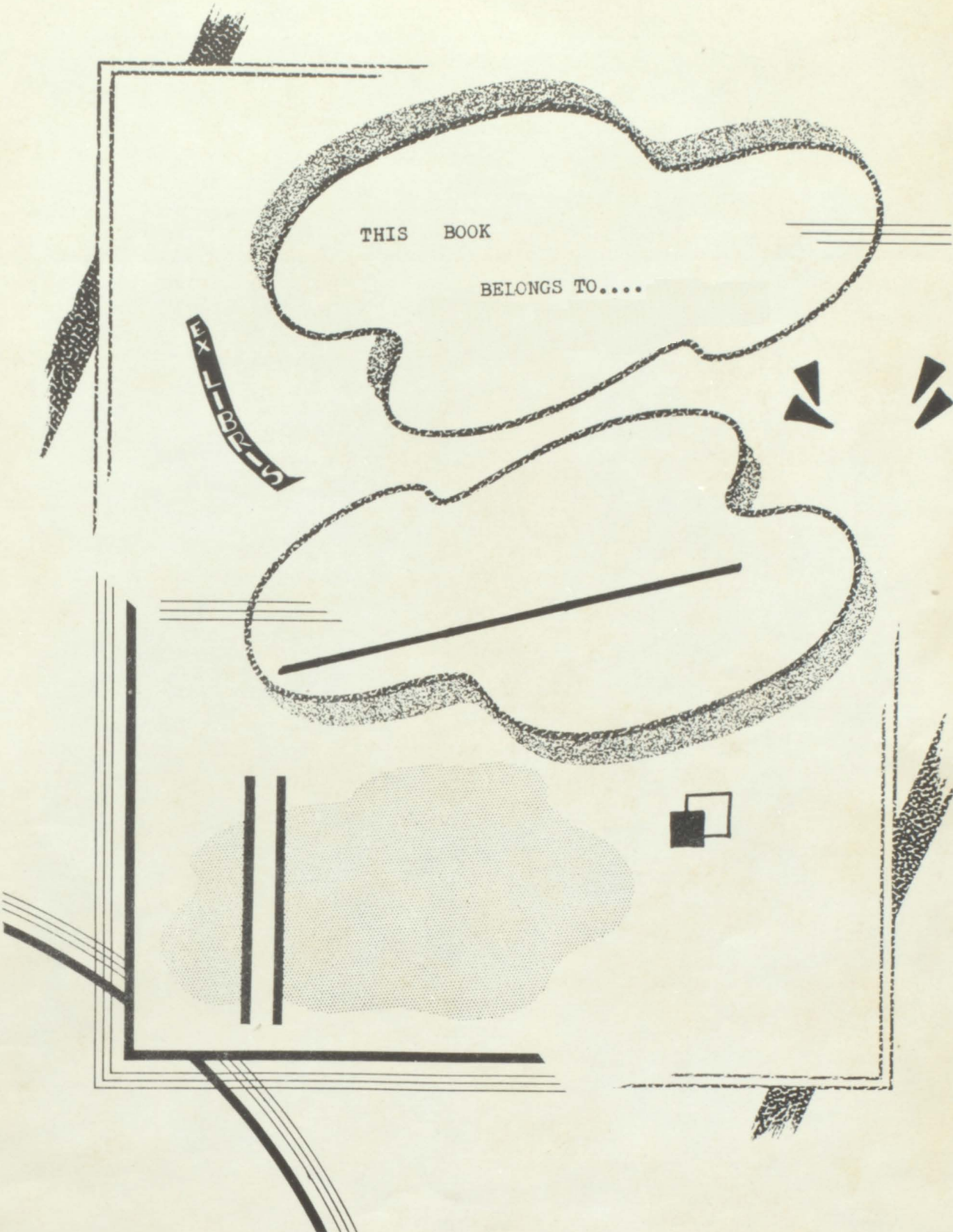


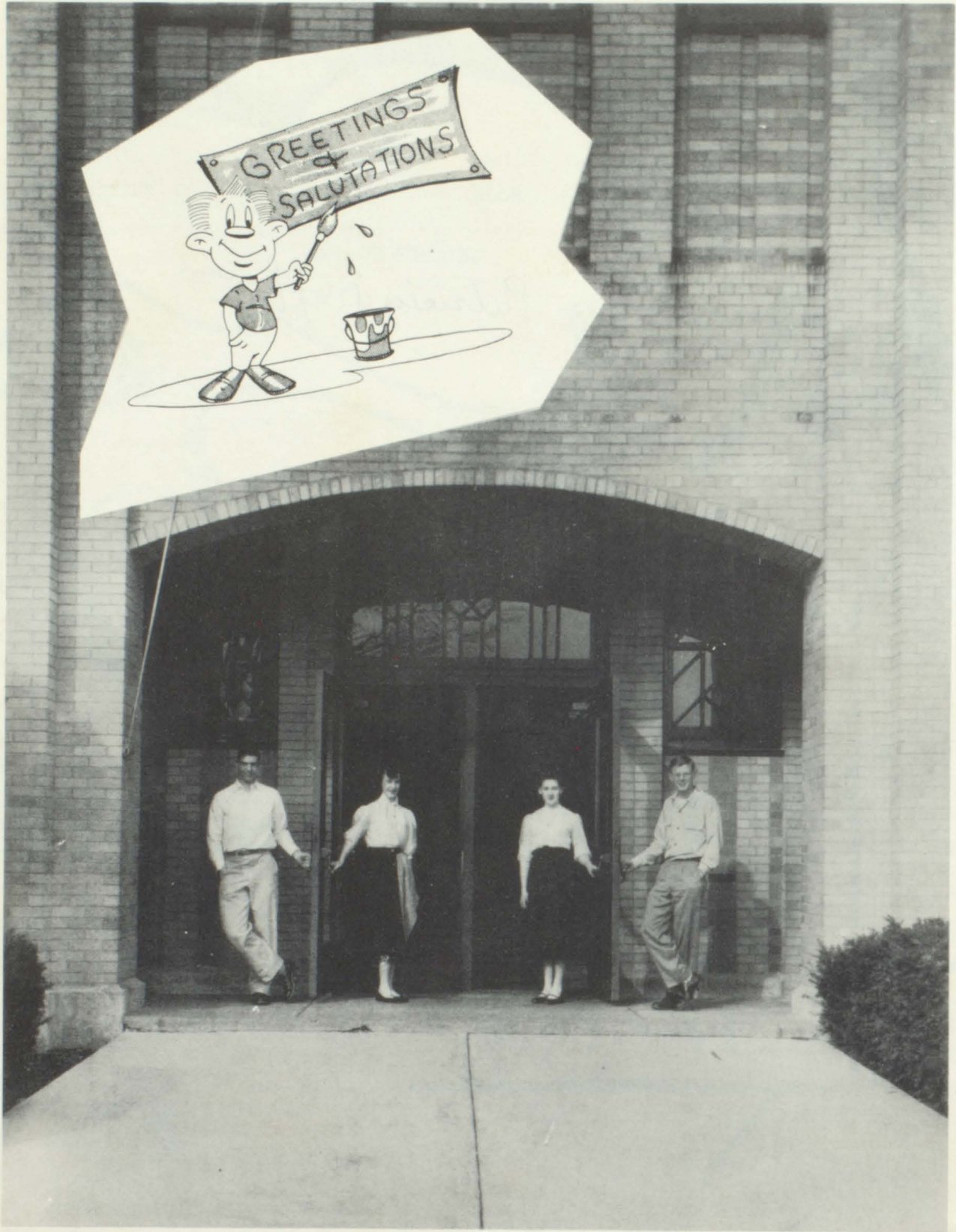

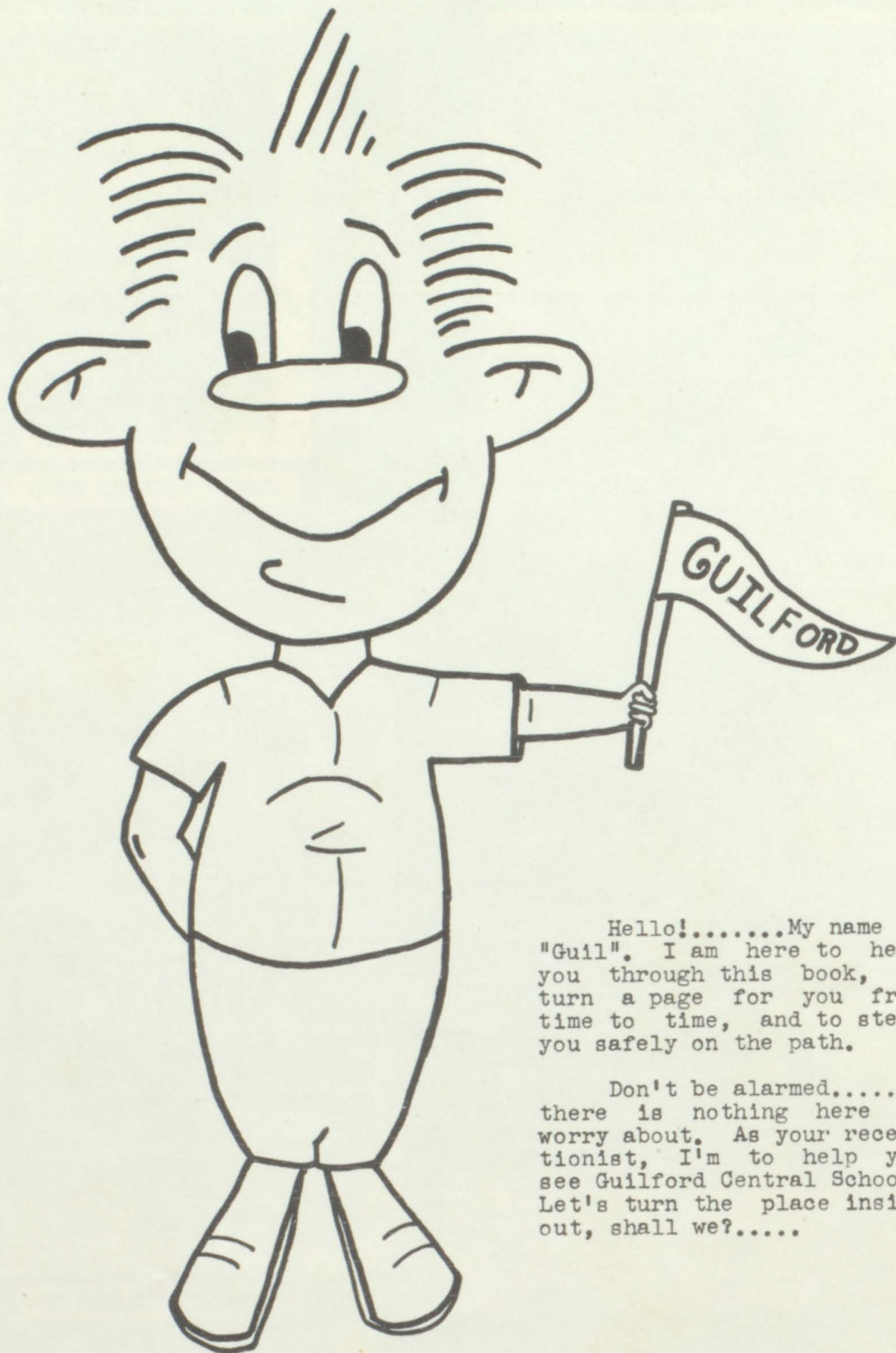
IN MEMORIAM

We started third grade together but in October of that year Doris left us to go to another school. These students went on to the fourth grade with the other members of the class. Then Doris joined us again in the fifth grade.

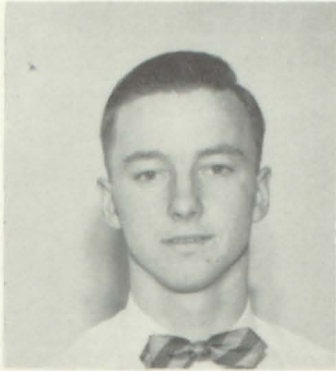
