



As you progress up the ladder from grade to grade you are constantly securing ingredients to brighten your personality. Remember how proud you were to be in "High School"?


Through-out the four years of high school you add to your personality traits, foresight, honesty, earnest working, and co-operation.

Class History

This is an account of the history of the Senior class of 1954. The years in which we have been in school together have been important ones. We have matured through the challenge of our studies, the responsibilities assumed in class and extra activities, our social relationships, and the friendships formed.

Of the present Senior class, Kenneth Ryan, Albert Ives and David Ives, Neal Harrington and Jean Gridley entered the first grade together. Kathryn Braisland and Howard Mayne joined us in the second grade. Arlene Stanley came in third grade and Charles Burt came in fourth grade. In fifth grade we added Richard Demeree, Joanna Miles, and Dennis Sands. Betty Seaman joined us in sixth grade. In the eighth grade we added to our number Pat Pendlebury and Jerry Bates. In our senior year Marjorie Cunningham joined us. Howard Mayne left us to enter the armed forces. Shirley Ricks, Joel Harvey, Douglas Steele, and Connie Lagner were members of the class during high school who left us.

Our seventh and eighth grade years were valuable in shaping the course of senior high school. Mrs. Stapleton carefully guided us toward more adult reasoning and a deeper appreciation of our moral values. We can never forget her interest and encouragement. Our trips to Cooperstown and Albany were wonderful experiences of those years.

1950-51 was a hard year and a happy year. We were in senior high school. Our advisor -- Miss Rumpf, the laboratory with all its opportunities for mischief, the phase of "water in the seats", the fun we had with airplane study, the advice Mr. Stapleton gave us, the Christmas party, the sleigh ride, the kick we got out of our social studies teacher, Mr. Mulligan, and for some of us, the struggles of studying Latin, are all warm memories of that time.

CLASS HISTORY CONTINUED

In 1951-52 we were Sophomores. We moved into the library. Many memories go back to that homeroom with its noise, its cold winters, and its fun. Mrs. Snover began to be an important part of school. We found a new advisor and a wonderful addition to the class in Mrs. Roberts that year. Any class memories of high school must surely include her. Some of the things we remember from that year are the hours spent doing Geometry, the involvement with World History, and the slow beginnings of a treasury. We put on a movie and several bakesales. We remember the tractor-wagon ride and picnic at Ryans' in the spring - - Mrs. Roberts looking as young as any of the girls in her slacks and shirt, Denny baby-sitting with Lowell R., and how good the food tasted on top of the hill. Biology class was an experience to be lived through. On the afternoon the high school went to see the movie "Quo Vadis", the sophomore biology class stayed home for misbehavior.

1952-53. We had come up in the world. We were Juniors. By now we were sure of ourselves if not of our studies. The boys were playing varsity basketball. We had to make money in earnest for our senior trip. We put on bakesales and a chicken supper for which we contributed food for an army. We presented a movie, inherited the candy-selling business from the Seniors, and sold refreshments at ball games. We bought our class rings. We worked with the Seniors to put on two plays. We were assuming positions of leadership in the Student Council, Athletic Association, newspaper, and musical activities. With the Seniors, we staged a political rally on the election of president of the United States. We came out successfully in the school essay and oratorical contest, with David Ives representing the school in higher competition. In June we decorated the auditorium for commencement, anticipating the time when it would be done for us.

1953-54. This was our senior year. We moved in with Mrs. Roberts to make the Language room the Senior (and noisiest) home room. Mr. Ryther and all our teachers aided us in adjusting our schedules and in making plans for after high school. We are grateful to them for their understanding help. In November we put on a play "Let's Face It", with lots of comedy in and out of the script. From rehearsals we remember Denny rolling away in the wastebasket, and Mrs. Snover substituting for absent actors. We built our own props and achieved great success in the performance. In February we staged a donkey basketball game, with the Senior boys playing the Firemen. The large crowd, the many laughs and the excitement made it a never-to-be-forgotten event. In May came our Senior Ball, the first of its kind in the school for some time. As Seniors, we saw things in a different perspective. The time was approaching ---. Maybe we felt more serious and acted more like the grades who mobbed us in the halls. We sold candy, lost some to the mice, decay, and other elements, and gladly turned it over to the Juniors. We had some wonderful and hilarious times selling magazines and cards, what with sales trouble and car trouble. The boys began to go places in sports, and the senior homemaking class discovered the intricacies of that subject. The Washington trip with all its experiences, and finally graduation, climaxed our last school year.


Marjorie Cunningham....Dean of the School of Dentistry in Rochester. Holds the crown of the Champion of Lady Wrestling.
