


RANKING #4

Superintendent's Message

It is hard to believe the school year is winding down. It has been a great year for the Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District. Our students and staff have accomplished great things this year.

Congratulations to our graduating seniors. This time of year is bittersweet for us. We are excited for our students to head off to college, or a career or the military, but we will miss all that they have brought to us as a bobcat. The district is confident our students are graduating college and career ready. We are proud to have five students graduating from B-G with associates degrees from Tompkins Cortland Community College! Congratulations to Abbi Miller, Olivia Garror, Rachel Hinkley, Caitlyn Diamond and Griffin Fisher. An impressive feat to say the least. Hats off to these students for their hard work and dedication.

During the school year taxpayers were asked to vote on our proposed capital project. An overwhelming response of "yes" was heard from our voters. I thank you for your support of our district, students and mission. A year from now work will start on our campus as we embark on improving all of our facilities for our students and staff.

Starting in the fall with the 2017-2018 school year, all families will be asked to designate no more than two drop-offs for their child traveling home on the school bus. We are having an extreme amount of difficulty getting students delivered to the correct location at night because families change where the child is being dropped off, sometimes on a daily basis. We have several families that request a different drop off each afternoon which is very confusing for the bus driver. This confusion escalates if there is a substitute bus driver.

While I anticipate this taking some juggling for families, it is my hope that with three months' notice families can make preparations ahead of time. Our goal is to get your child home safe. Many districts in the area have moved to this process for safety reasons. In fact, we are the sixth district in the DCMO BOCES to implement this policy. Thank you for your understanding with this change.

In the coming months we will be planning our school Agricultural Fair to be held at the end of September. Students will display crops they have grown, crafts, foods and live animals. We will be looking for volunteers to help with the fair. If you are interested please email me at the school at tryan@bgcsd.org.

And finally, thank you for your tremendous support with our school budget. We were proud to offer a budget to our tax-payers that was down 3.5% from last year. The school greatly appreciates the community support we receive.

(Endicott, NY) Senator Fred Akshar and YES Safe Choices were joined by local parents, teachers and school administrators to honor 650 Broome, Tioga and Chenango YES LEADers at the YES LEADers Change Lives Recognition Reception.

YES LEADers are middle and high school students who visit classrooms and use hands-on activities to teach local elementary school students about the dangers of substance abuse, the importance of self-esteem and the value in making healthy choices as they grow up.


"The amount of time, effort and energy that YES LEADers dedicate to our community is amazing," said Senator Akshar. "They're touching countless lives by teaching invaluable lessons to younger kids about committing to making safe choices."

Mr. Feltham earned his Bachelor's degree in Psychology from Geneseo in 1983, his teaching certification in Industrial Arts/Technology from

Oswego in 1984 and his Master's degree in Education from Elmria College in 1987.

Mr. Feltham began his teaching career in Plaistow, New Hampshire where he taught for a year. He taught in Dundee for six years before joining the staff at Bainbridge-Guilford in 1991. During his career as a Technology Education teacher Mr. Feltham has seen many changes, from dovetail joints and using the block plane to holograms and 3D printing. Mr. Feltham always believed that students learn best when they are having fun. Some of the major projects students completed under the supervision and guidance of Mr. Feltham include: Skate Park designs for the Town of Bainbridge Skate Park, Pentacycle (a street-legal human-powered car), Roller Suit (coveralls with 31 wheels attached so the operator could roll in any direction), The O'Haracaster (Unique Ukulele), Water Jug Bass, and a DaVinci-inspired garage door spring powered car. These projects are just a few examples of the love for learning and inspiration Mr. Feltham was able to foster in his time as a teacher at B-G.

In 1993 Mr. Feltham spearheaded the inception of the Boys' Soccer Program at B-G. In a few years the soccer program expanded to include Varsity, JV and Modified along with a flourishing youth program. Mr. Feltham has developed the Boys' Bobcat Soccer program into a perennial contender for the league championship. In 2014 Mr. Feltham guided the Bobcats to their first MAC league championship and earned the MAC Coach of the year. 

B-G Earns Saftey Excellence Award

Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District is one of 136 school districts and Board of Cooperative Education Services in the state to receive the 2017 "Titanium with Honors School Safety Excellence Award," the highest level of recognition offered by the Utica National Insurance Group.

The honor, presented annually, recognizes school districts' safety efforts as they work to help keep students, staff and visitors safe. Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District received its award at Utica National's 37th annual school safety seminar in Binghamton, NY. For over 40 years, Utica National has kept kids and school staff safe and currently insures more than 300 school districts in upstate New York alone.

Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District officials accepted a certificate to commemorate the district's safety efforts and a \$500 award for use in furthering those efforts. This is the 14th time B-G has received this award.

Utica National's School Safety Excellence Award Program has three levels—titanium, platinum and gold—in which schools can earn a meritorious distinction by meeting specific criteria to enhance overall saftety. Through the program, schools with their own transportation, schools with contract transportation, and BOCES are evaluated. Categories covered include bullying prevention programs, playground safety and other areas, and are measured using specific quantifiable surveys. "Safety and health concerns continue to be a priority in our school districts," explained Brian Saville, Resident Senior Vice President in Utica National's Educational Institutions Unit. "Districts that go above and beyond to provide a safe, healthy and focused culture for learning are to be applauded, and we're pleased to count Bainbridge-Guilford Central School District among them."

The school district would like to specifically thank Director of Facilities II, Howard Thompson, and the members of the Health and Safety Committee for their ongoing efforts to make Bainbridge-Guilford a safe place for faculty, students and staff.

Students Earn Associate's Degree




Earth Day Fun

Multiage and third grade students had fun—and made a difference—while celebrating Earth day! Students worked in groups to learn about earthworms and compost, make their own terrariums, create crafts using recycled materials and pick up garbage outside around the school.









- 1. Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible.
- 2. Pull upward with steady, even pressure to remove the tick.

 Avoid twisting or jerking.
- 3. Clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol, iodine scrub, or soap and water.

Notes:

- · Remove the tick as soon as possible.
- If tick mouth parts remain in the skin, leave them alone. In most cases, they will fall out in a few days.
- Don't use nail polish, petroleum jelly, or a hot match to make the tick detach.
- If you develop a rash or fever within several weeks of removing a tick, see your doctor. Be sure to tell the doctor about your recent tick bite, when the bite occurred, and where you most likely acquired the tick.
